TRAINING CIRCUS HORSES.

Green Animals Broken Into the Trick of the Ring with Difficulty. "Yes, sir," said Dan Leon, the celebrated four horse rider of Robinson's show, "in my time I have ridden hundreds of horses

in the ring but none the least of my work is the training of green animals." Mr. Leon then explained that the break-ing in of green horses is a hard job and sorely tries the "grit" of the riders. "As rule we turn the horses into the rin loose, after first teaching them to gallor

oose after first teaching them to gallop under the saddle. The next thing is to get them accustomed to lady riders. This they learn in a few hours, and now a tedious process of training is started and kept up until the animals acquire a smooth, easy gait, that will keep up for half an hour. It is hard work for a horse at first, but they soon grow accustomed to it and gallop from the start.
"These bales of hay that you see sur-

rounding the entire ring are placed there to keep the horses in the ring. The trainer stands in the center of the ring with his whip, and hence the horse is compelled to keep in a certain track unless he wants to try to climb over the barrier of the hay in the track the bales of hay are removed, one at a time, until none are left, and the horse is running in a plain, open track which he never thinks of leaving. As I said, only the best riders are allowed to ride green horses, owing to the great danger it entails.



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
