"The winters in America have changed wonderfully since I was a boy," said Edward O'Neill, the insurance man, "and while Pittsburgers complain with greater canse of the changeable, now warm, now cold weather they get in the winter months, they are not alone in the enjoyment of the discomforts of a treacherous, shifty climate. I remember going to school in weather that was simply arctic, with the ther-
