UNLESS the additional condition imposed by Mr. Finn should prevent, the columns of his paper, the Lake Superior Democrat, will now be made more interesting than ever by a discussion of the tariff issue in that sheet.

WHEN railway managers begin to express themselves regarding the possibilities of electrical power as applied to hauling railway trains as General Manager Ainslee, of the Wisconsin Central road, is quoted as having spoken on the subject in the appended paragraph, it is time to expect something new and startling in the way of the application of electrical energy to moving railway trains.

HAS JUST FOUND IT OUT. A Lansing dispatch to the Detroit News gives this interesting information: Auditor-General Stone has issued a document supplementary to his annual report for 1891, calling attention to divers defects in the new tax law of 1891, and attacking the provisions under which the delinquent tax department of his office is abolished.

This is a strange admission to come from a democratic state official concerning a change in the law that was made by his party, and which the newspaper organ said campaign speakers of that party had for years been telling the people were demanded by considerations of economy, and which they assured us would also conduce to a prompter collection of taxes as well as a more accurate keeping of the records.

IN REPLY TO "NOIT CETORP." "A Democrat" Devotes a Chapter of Tariff Discussion to His Second Adversary.

In Which He Considers the Effects of Protection on the Iron Industry and the Wages of the Workingman.

CALUMET, Feb. 2, 1892.

EDITOR MINING JOURNAL.—In my letter published in your issue of January 27, I have already referred to the communication of "Noit Cetorp," who apparently deemed it necessary to fly to the rescue of the cause, and whose attack is so elaborately violent as to make it seem advisable to devote a letter to its disposal.

In beginning, I wish to emphasize the truth that the tariff has no tendency to raise the rate of wages in protected industries. Wages are controlled by the relation of the supply of labor to the demand for it.

To show that it is not the tariff, but other causes, which are responsible for differences in wages between different countries, we have only to compare this country with those of Europe. Wages are lower in England than here, but they are still lower in other countries on the continent, France, Germany, Italy and Austria, where a protective tariff is in full swing.

The United States can produce the great bulk of the iron consumed within its borders at a lower cost than it can be supplied by any other country in the preceding question of supplying the markets of the world, provided we sell at the lower price which the removal of the tariff would allow, and permit other nations to send their products to us free of duty.

The cost of foreign ore at point of shipment has averaged for several years about \$2.50 per ton, the expense of transportation making the cost at Philadelphia or Baltimore from \$4.75 to \$5.25 per ton, which precludes competition of these ores with Lake Superior ore at Pittsburgh.

The very fact that "Noit Cetorp" saw foreign ores in Pittsburgh some years ago testifies to the fact of an inadequate supply of native Bessemer ore at that time, which led to the use of those ores in spite of the ordinary prohibitive freight rates.

According to the statement of the Iron Trade Review, practically none of the ore then on the docks was unsold. Under normal conditions, 2,000,000 tons would be no more than needed to supply the furnaces of that district until

the opening of navigation the following season. The removal of the duty from iron ore would not only have no effect to decrease the home production of ore, as the foregoing tends to prove, but would, on the contrary, increase the demand for native non-Bessemer ore, because the imported ore, on account of the small percentage of phosphorus contained, can be mixed with ore containing a large percentage in making steel, and every ton imported creates a demand for about a ton of such ore for mixture.

"Noit Cetorp" asks if it would not have been better for the American workingmen if we had kept at home the \$50,000,000 sent abroad in 1890 for imports of iron. If he will tell me what the \$50,000,000 consisted of, I can answer his question more definitely. Was it wheat? I think there was no lack of wheat for the workingman to purchase. Was it cotton goods? I have heard of no scarcity of cotton. Was it gold? If so, how much of it would the workingman have had? Perhaps "Noit Cetorp," in the fullness of his knowledge, can inform us.

It matters little to the American laborer whether the tariff is in the hands of his friends or his enemies, provided it is in the hands of his own friends, and the workingman is rapidly finding out that the tariff reformer is more of a friend to him than the protectionist. When "Noit Cetorp" or any other protectionist figures how cost can be lessened, if prices must come down, the first item is wages. "Wages must be lower" is the universal cry. I want to make it plain that we, as tariff reformers, are not fighting against the laboring man, but for and with him, but we are at war with the organized capital engaged in protected industries, which secures for itself all the advantages there may be in the higher prices exacted by the tariff.

In the history of this country there have been so many other circumstances to influence the condition of prosperity, that we cannot refer every change in that respect to the tariff. However, regardless of causes, I repeat that periods of low tariff have not been uniformly periods of adversity, nor periods of higher tariff periods of greatest prosperity. The nearest approach to free trade or a tariff for revenue only since the war of 1812 was during the period from 1846 to 1861, which is admitted to have been a period of as great prosperity as the country has ever seen.

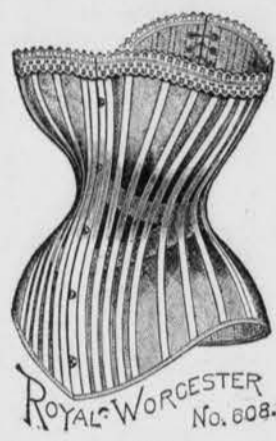
