







EAGER TO HEAR CLEVELAND

The Ex-President's Wise and Patriotic Address Before the University of Michigan.

"SENTIMENT IN OUR NATIONAL LIFE" HIS THEME

Educated Men of Patriotism Needed in Public Life—Sentiment the Vital Force of Free Institutions.

HUGE UNIVERSITY HALL PACKED

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Feb. 22.—The university town was agog today over the presence of ex-President Grover Cleveland, ex-Governor Campbell of Ohio and other prominent democrats.

These are the elements of American sentiment; and all these should be found in the minds and hearts of our countrymen.

When Mr. Cleveland stepped from the car he was met by Mayor W. G. Doty of Ann Arbor and the aldermen of the city.

It is because George Washington completely represented all the elements of American sentiment that every incident of his life from his childhood to his death is recalled.

The fame of your institution has spread throughout the country and every rank among the best educational institutions in the world.

Mr. Cleveland addressed the students in University Hall at 3 P. M. Every empty one of the 3000 seats was taken and standing room could not be secured.

The subject of Mr. Cleveland's address was "Sentiment in Our National Life." After speaking of Washington's great influence in the formation of the constitution, an influence often forgotten in the enthusiasm for other phases of his work.

There is a great need of educated men in our public life, but it is the need of educated men with a patriotic sentiment.

I speak today in advocacy of this sentiment, exclusive mental culture, neither is it found in the busy markets of trade, nor in the confusion of bargaining, nor in the mad rush after wealth.

When we are told that we are a practical and common sense people we are apt to receive the statement with approval and applause.

A little reflection ought to convince us that this may be carried much too far. It is a mistake to regard sentiment as merely something which, if indulged, has a tendency to tempt to idle and useless contemplation or retrospection, thus weakening in endeavor and diluting the capacity for national achievement.

Sentiment is the cement which keeps in place the granite blocks of governmental power, or the destructive agency whose explosion heaps in ruins their scattered fragments.
