Educated Men of Patriotism Needed in Public Life-Sentiment the Vital Force of Free Institutions.

I am not afraid to assert that a multitude of men can be found in every part of our land, respected for their probity and worth, and most useful to the country and to their fellow men, who will confess their indebtedness to the story of confess their indebtedness to the story of the character and sentiment of a great people.




