THE WESTINGHOUSE MACHINE

Ishpeming's New French Catholic Church Will be Dedicated on That Date.

Description of the Handsome and Imposing Structure-Got Ill Tidings From Ironwood.

THE NEW FRENCH CHURCH.

A recent visit to and an inspection olic church enables the reporter to give the MINING JOURNAL's readers somethat they will find of interest. The plans and specifications were prepared by Mr. J. S. Mennie, architect for E. E. Grip & Co., builders and contractors of this city, the contract for building the church having been awarded to that firm. The building outside is 109 feet 7 inches in length, by 67 feet 6½ inches in width, and its height is 46 feet from the ground to the base of the spire. From the ground to the top of spire. From the ground to the top of spire in the main tower on the southeast corner the height is 132 feet, while the smaller tower on the opposite side, the northeast corner, is 75 feet high. The base of the larger tower is 16 feet square and of the smaller 12 feet.

Entering the building from the front the vestibule is reached. This is 7 feet 8 inches deep, and extends across the entire building, forming a connection with both towers. From the inner vestibule doors to the altar platform is 62 id.

The display of latest styles hats in

tibule doors to the altar platform is 621/2 feet, and from the altar platform to the back of the altar is 26 1/2 feet. The auditorium is 623 x48 feet, and has a seating capacity of 400. There are three aisles, the center one being 7 feet wide, with a the two side ones are each 3½ day morning of inflat feet wide. The altar is 16x22 feet, circular at the back, with a handsome arch afternoon at 2 o'clock.

123/2x153/2 feet. The gallery, over the vestibule, is 21x48 feet and in case of recessity 26 pews can be put in place there, making a comfortable seating capacity for over 100 persons. The height of the interior of the auditorium from the floor to the centre of the arch above is 38 feet. There is a small altar at each side of the main altar, and directly in front of the sacristy on the posth and the voltage of the main altar. north and the robing room on the left. The windows in the auditorium are 81/x6 feet, and on three of these will be painted figures of natural size. The line two on the south side of the building will have statues of St. Ann and St. Joseph, while the window on the north side will carry the "Sacred Heart." The windows are all of leaded, stained cathedral glass. Directly under the main altar is a cellar of ordinary size,




