The Board was called to order at ten o'clock A.M. by the Hon Joseph S. Stevens Chairman and the roll being called by William Rowland Clerk, there were present Messrs Broad Dwyer, Ellis, Harvey, Gilbert, Koch, Houston Kirkpatrick, Maas, Mulvey, Read and Chairman 12. Absent Messrs. Commers, Gleason, Ball, Mahan, James Pascoe, Peter Pascoe, Pickands, Dedgwick and (Wren), 9.

Unanimous Consent being given Mr Houston offered the following resolution which was adopted.

To the Board of Supervisors of the County of Marquette.

The undersigned freeholders of the townships of Dorothy, Chocolay, Richmond, Negaunee, the City of Negaunee, and the City of Ishpeming, respectfully represent to and petition your Honorable body to appropriate a sum sufficient to construct a wagon road from Little Lake in the Township of Dorothy to the City of Negaunee said road to run near the track of the Chicago and North Western Railway and as nearly parallel therewith as practicable. That at present there is no means of communication between the settlers along the line of said Railway and Negaunee and Ishpeming except by rail and though there are a large number of settlers along said line, there are no means of transporting or marketing their produce by means of



their own convenience, your petitioners believe that the construction of such a road would also tend to produce a rapid settlement of and development of the country through which such road would run, and we believe it to be only an act of simple justice to the residents along such line that the prayer of your petitioners should be granted and the road built.
