In the matter of \$500 allowed as help to compensate the Judge of Probate for other expenses incurred by him, said Judge during his period of service as Judge which was referred to you as a special committee to report thereon, I would respectfully state; that for the last two years past my health has been such coupled with advanced years (76 years) I have been compelled under such disability to seek aid to assist me in the duties pertaining to my office so that our duty claiming from the Probate Judge should suffer, and would be incumbered by my ailments, those other expenses there being a personal matter in its foundation in detail was left by me, consequently I cannot give you as asked for a detailed statement of same, and such therefore must depend upon a guarantee of honor with myself and I will add (and my egoism) did I not think that my request was honest and just and deserving, it would not be made, I will further say that there are two other points that may be used in support of the same, viz:

1<sup>st</sup> On the 11th before last of my service at the Annual Meeting of the Board of Supervisors at that time no action was taken fixing the salaries of County officers or Probate Judge, but they did at their meeting in January following fix the salaries in question (Mr. Rowland, taking a part therein) and reduced all the salaries except that of Mr. Rowland, and that was increased from \$1200 to \$1800 and the Probate Judge reduced from \$1500 to \$1000. afterwards raised to \$1200. It is true I had my remedy under the ruling of the Supreme Court but did not avail myself of it - for the reason Mr. Rowland said

it should be arranged satisfactorily and I therefore delayed the application for relief; the proceeding was once more decided again and again by our Supreme Court viz. that the pay of a Judge of Probate cannot be reduced during the term of his service or after he has entered upon his duty. which ruling is familiar to one of your Commissioners - P. C. Clark, Esq. and such deficiency in pay has never been paid & now, I admit that had the amount of salary been stated at the annual meeting of the board and before I was called upon to enter the office then had I entered upon the duty under that provision I should be bound as I am that was the compensation.

The Annual Allowance of \$1200 for the purchasing of blanks, Stationery & Postage etc has not been sufficient to meet the requirements in that particular and has been deficient to supply the demand for several years past

If I did not or do not consider my claim to be one of Justice I should not present the same

Humboldt townships, the former asking aid from the county to the amount of \$1000 in constructing a bridge across the Wm. H. H. river, in that township; the latter asking that Wm. H. H. township be reimbursed for by the county to the amount expended by that township in protecting the bridge across the Lake-to-see river, respectfully report that they have personally inspected both localities.

In the case of Humboldt Township, they find that township engaged in building a road across the western end of the township, a distance of fifteen miles. This road when completed will connect the townships of Crystal Falls and Franklin with the northern part of the county with the M. & C. railroad at Republic.

The expense assumed by the township in building the road is large. Such a bridge as it is proposed to build at the point where this road crosses the Wm. H. H. river will cost from fifteen to twenty hundred dollars and will be of benefit not only to Humboldt Township but to the entire western end of the county.

In the judgment of your Committee the requirements of the law have in this case been met; the case is one which fully justifies this board in granting aid; and it therefore reports in favor of granting the petition and that the sum asked for be paid from the money now in the highway fund.

In the case of Wm. H. H. Township, your Committee find that the county aided originally in the construction of the bridge mentioned in the petition; and that the cost of the road done in protecting the bridge did not, or should not have exceeded, one hundred and fifty dollars; and that this was the chief expenditure of the township for highway purposes during the year.

Williams, late Circuit Judge of said County by word of report state they have had the same under consideration and find that, in November A.D. 1876, just before the commencement of his term as Circuit Judge, the Board of Supervisors by resolution fixed the compensation to be paid him by the County at \$1500 per annum, payable quarterly, that it has always been the custom of the various Counties to pay the Circuit Judge a salary additional to the \$1500 per annum paid by the State, and that so far as your Committee is informed such custom has continually existed in the other Counties; that unless such extra compensation had been paid it would

had been impossible to have indorsed any one of the requisite ability and intelligence to accept said office.

We find that the sum of \$1500. per annum voted as above said was regularly paid Judge Williams for two years and four months only, and is unpaid for the balance of his term of three years and eight months; we cannot find on records any resolution or order of this board discontinuing the payment of said salary, nor do we see why on any equitable grounds payment may stop. In view of the fact that considerable time has elapsed since the expiration of Judge Williams term of office, and that he has not previously applied to the board for address, your committee respectfully state the board should allow his bill for the sum of \$3000. and that the chairman and clerk of this board be authorized to draw an order on the general fund of this county payable to the order of Judge Williams, and deliver the same to him upon his signing a receipt in full for all sums rendered to the county.
