

1. That during the six months immediately preceding such examination there had been confined at different times 188 prisoners, charged with offenses as follows:

8. Are prisoners arrested on civil process kept in rooms separate and distinct from prisoners held on criminal charge, as required by Section 8941, Howell's Statutes? Yes.

9. Are male and female prisoners confined in separate rooms as required by Section 8942, Howell's Statutes? Yes.

10. Is there a proper jail record kept, and is it kept properly posted and does it comply with Sec. 9664, page 2320 Howell's Annotated Statutes of Michigan? Yes.

11. What, if any, evils, either in construction or management of jail are found to exist? Ventilation somewhat imperfect; bedding, etc., not as clean as they should be.

We would respectfully recommend that twelve (12) wire hammocks be furnished for the lower tier of cells in lieu of the old wooden bedsteads now in use.

Also that there be furnished ten (10) single iron bedsteads, with wire mattresses, for use in the woman and boy departments.

Also that prisoners (under proper guard) be employed to perform work of cleaning in and about the jail.

All the remainder of said county included in the city of Ishpeming and the townships of Ishpeming, Ely, Humboldt, Champion, Michigamme and Republic, and having a population of twenty thousand and fifty-four according to the last census or enumeration, is hereby set off into one representative district which shall be known as district number two.
Resolved, that the clerk of this board be and he is hereby directed to file in the office of the Secretary of State and in the office of the clerk of this county, within thirty days after the adoption of the foregoing, a description of each of said representative districts, specifying the number of each district and the population thereof, according to the last preceding enumeration.

GENTLEMEN:—Herewith I submit my annual report as Inspector of Mines for the County of Marquette which will be found upon blanks specially prepared for that purpose, showing, the date of the accident, name of person, occupation, nationality, cause, and nature of injury. While the number of men employed in the various mines of the county is but eight thousand as against twelve thousand for the preceding years, the ratio of fatal casualty is considerably reduced, showing that the improved equipment and method of the various companies is attended with favorable result. In this connection it affords me the highest satisfaction to be able to report, that in no instance has there been a violation of the Laws contemplating protection to the lives and health of employes. All demands of the law are promptly complied with.

Without being able to offer suggestion for the betterment of management as regards safety to employes, this report is respectfully submitted.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette County:—

GENTLEMEN:—Your committee to whom was referred the matter of considering the advisability of building a county hospital beg leave to submit the following report:

Your committee have by communication and conference with the citizens of the county, obtained a fair consensus of opinion bearing on the matter, and though there has been and is a decided opposition to the scheme from honored and respected citizens of the county, the greater majority is in favor of a county hospital, and your committee unqualifiedly, therefore, report favorably for the erection of such an institution, believing:

First—That its workings are practicable. Second—That it would be a means of economy for the tax-payers of the county and prevent imposition thereon.

Third—That the safety and preservation of the public health demand such an institution.

Fourth—That opposition is side-tracked on the contract plan with local hospitals, and if this plan is wise, the principle remains, that you can do your own business more satisfactorily and economically, than by delegating it to some one else.

Fifth—That public opinion is almost unanimous that 90 per cent of the poor can be taken care of at such an institution.

Sixth—That such an institution, large enough to accommodate 75 patients, built of solid brick, can be erected for from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

Seventh—That among an inconsequential number, the idea of transportation is considered inhuman, but among the greater number and this is almost unanimous, it is considered a humane plan.

Eighth—That for the year between January, 1891, and January, 1892, this board has paid and have under consideration claims amounting to, in round numbers, \$10,000, and in addition to this your committee find upon inquiry of the superintendents of the poor that the first poor district pays per contract annually, \$900, the second district, \$1,600, the third district \$1,000, amounting to \$3,500, or a grand total of \$13,500, which is all disbursed for the care of indigent people and the preservation of the public health.

Ninth—That by contracting with a staff of physicians, such as are found in the mining cities in the center of the county, the institution could be turned to profit and be a means of contributing towards the cost of maintaining the same.

The report of the special committee appointed to consider claims against the county arising from contagious diseases was accepted and was adopted by the following yeas and nays vote:

The report is here given:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors:
Report of the special committee appointed by your honorable board at its meeting in December, 1891, to investigate bills contracted on account of contagious diseases.

GENTLEMEN:—Of the claims contracted on account of contagious diseases referred to your special committee for investigation, aggregating five thousand six hundred and fifty-seven dollars and fifty-four cents (\$5,657.54), we have returned to you, and recommend the payment of those herewith submitted, aggregating two thousand seven hundred and eight dollars, and thirty-eight cents (\$2,708.38).

From the city of Ishpeming we had an aggregate of \$653.18, of which we recommend the payment of \$638.77.

From townships outside the cities we had an aggregate of \$1,301.02, of which we recommend the payment of \$1,116.00.

From the city of Marquette we had an aggregate of \$3,703.34 of which we recommend the payment at this time of an aggregate of \$1,013.61, and have referred back to the Marquette city board of health bills aggregating \$377.55 for their further consideration.

The bills from the city of Ishpeming we have found in the main correct, carrying with them prima facie evidence of having been contracted on the authority and by the direction of the board of health of that city, and upon careful investigation we have found them to be so, excepting in the case of one bill, which was clearly not a proper one to emanate from the board of health, and which we have referred to the superintendent of poor as it was not contracted in a case of contagious disease dangerous to the public health, and therefore not within the jurisdiction of the board of health which certified it to us.

As to the bills from the townships of Michiganme, Champion, Ely, Republic, Richmond and Forsythe, which were among those submitted to us, you will note that we have rejected an aggregate of \$195.02, part of which has been referred to the superintendent of poor for the same reason cited in the Ishpeming case, and a small portion was rejected as being clearly an excessive charge.

Your committee has found many of the bills referred to it very unsatisfactory and ambiguous in form, and has had to call upon claimants for itemized statements, and information to help it in its investigation. These requests have been met cheerfully and promptly, excepting in a few cases. Upon taking up the bills from the city of Marquette your committee found a number of such bills, and upon requesting itemized statements, and such information as would be useful in its investigation, was met with prompt and satisfactory responses, except in the cases of Dr. A. Dr. J. A., and Mr. F. H. Desjardins, who refused your committee any information and whose replies to our request are herewith submitted, marked "Exhibits A," "B," "C." Your committee was therefore compelled to employ a man to look up for it such information. It soon became apparent that there were some grave errors or irregularities in some of the bills in hand, and upon the facts being brought to the attention of the board of health of Marquette, that body expressed unanimously a desire to have the bill thoroughly investigated, as they had certified them largely upon the authority of their health officer, and upon his assurance that they were just and proper claims against the county. They at once called a meeting, and passed a resolution, reconsidering their action on these bills, and at the invitation of your committee met with us on the 15th and 16th of January, 1892, at which time the principal claimants appeared before your committee and the results of your committee's investigation were presented. For this meeting your committee employed the services of Mr. George C. Higbee, circuit court reporter, who has a full stenographic report of the proceedings at that meeting, and who furnished your committee duplicate copies of an abstract of such proceedings, embracing the principal points of interest to us, a copy of which abstract is herewith submitted, marked "Exhibit D." The entire report is in the hands of Mr. Higbee and may be extended in full for your honorable body if desired.

At the conclusion of this meeting of January 15th and 16th, and at the request of the Marquette city board of health, all of the bills in our hands from that city were

returned to them for its further consideration. Of the bills so returned to the board of health, aggregating as aforesaid \$3,703.34, that body, after a careful and conscientious investigation and consideration, have certified back to your committee bills aggregating \$1,391.16, of which your committee recommends at this time the payment of bills aggregating \$1,013.61, and have referred back to the Marquette city board of health for its further consideration bills aggregating \$377.55, accompanied by a letter setting forth our reasons for so doing, a copy of which letter is herewith submitted marked "Exhibit E," and will explain to your honorable body our reasons for so referring them back.

That our county has experienced during the past year an extraordinary epidemic of typhoid fever, there can be no doubt. That we may not have another such in years is altogether probable. We are informed by physicians from various parts of the county that there are now very few cases existing. And yet your committee cannot refrain from commenting upon the apparent lack of proper information on the part of boards of health, as to what is necessary in order to make claims of this character proper charges against the county. In order to make this class of claims legal charges against the county, they must emanate from the boards of health. The indebtedness must have been incurred by its direction and upon its order, acting in its official capacity in the interest and for the preservation of the public health, and not, as seems to be the general impression, promiscuously incurred on the credit of the infected persons themselves, and afterward turned in to the county if the parties prove to be unable to make prompt payment themselves. The difficulties which confront an auditing committee which is asked to audit and recommend the payment of such claims, where the claims do not carry with them the evidences of having been properly incurred by the authorized agents of the public, may be readily understood. The Marquette city board of health has been advised by the city attorney that all claims which have been so properly created by the order and direction of the board of health, are legally binding upon the county, regardless of whether or not the infected persons themselves, or those who are liable for their support, are able to pay them. And this view seems to be supported by decisions of the supreme court in the cases of the People ex rel Bristow, vs Supervisors, 3d Michigan 475, and Ray vs Flint, 51st Michigan 526, and Elliott vs Kalkaska, 58 Michigan 452.

In view of the extensive authority vested in the various boards of health for contracting this class of indebtedness which the county must pay, it can readily be seen how expensive it may become for the county should this power of these boards chance to fall into the hands of unscrupulous or incompetent agents.

We have placed in the hands of the clerk of this board all reports, memoranda, etc., for the use of the county should it need them. That have been acquired during this investigation and would respectfully ask that we be discharged from any further consideration of the bills referred to us.

GENTLEMEN:—We herewith hand to you for your further consideration the enclosed bills of "F. H. Desjardins," "A. Kline Thiell," "J. A. Desjardins" and "A. Desjardins."

Regarding the bills of F. H. Desjardins we call your attention particularly to the testimony of F. H. Desjardins taken before our committee on January 15th and 16th 1892, and which appears on pages 19 and 20 of the abstract furnished you. From this you will see that Mr. Desjardins testifies that he furnished none of these articles on the credit of the board of health; that he charged all the articles to the persons obtaining them, and expected they would pay for the same, and that he never thought of making them a county charge until after he had failed to collect from the parties themselves.

The same objection applies to the bill of Dr. Thiell, see his testimony pages 1 and 2, where he states that he had no idea of sending those bills in to the county at the time

he performed the services, that he was never directed by anyone on the part of the board to perform them, and had no arrangement with the board of health whatever in relation thereto.

In relation to the bills of Dr. A. Desjardins for services performed for John Honkin and McKelvie, we call your attention to the doctor's own testimony on pages 9 and 10, of the abstract, where he says that he had rendered each of these men bills and made efforts to collect from them.

In relation to the bill of Dr. J. A. Desjardins for services performed for Alex. Paquette, we call your attention to the testimony of Dr. A. Desjardins on page 18 of the abstract, where he says he presented this bill on behalf of his father to Mr. Paquette for payment.

In view of these statements of Dr. Desjardins that he looked to the parties for whom the services were rendered for payment and made efforts to collect from them, we are at a loss to understand what he means by his official certificate that he performed the services under his own authority as health officer, and that the services are a proper charge against the public.

The charge was primarily against the county as certified by your board, we cannot understand why Dr. Desjardins was making efforts to collect from parties who, according to his official certificate, owed him nothing, even in one case going so far as to put the claim in the hands of an attorney for collection.

There seems also to be a direct conflict between the official statements of Dr. Desjardins, that the services rendered by Dr. Thiell and the medicines furnished by his brother, F. H. Desjardins, were performed and furnished under his authority and direction as health officer, and the statements of the claimants themselves that they were not so performed and furnished.

As the statements of the claimants are against their own interests we cannot help believing that they are more trustworthy than the official certificate of the health officer. It may be that in the hurry of official business he has overlooked the statements of the claimants and that if they were especially called to his attention, they would convince him that his official certificates had been issued in error and ought to be withdrawn.

For all these reasons, we have again returned these bills to you, and ask that you give them further consideration.

In pursuance of my duties, I visited your jail and poor house May 31st, last, and found them in some respects much improved. The lack of room in our insane asylum, makes it necessary to detain in jails certain insane persons. Three of this class were in your jail at the time of my visit. I would respectfully suggest that padded cells be prepared for such inmates, and that the steam pipe where the insane are confined, be covered with a wire hood; this to protect from harm those unfortunate inmates. Also that you continue the improvement, made in the lower part of your jail, to the basement of the sheriff's residence, and replace the wooden bunks with wire woven bunks. I would also suggest that at the poorhouse an addition be constructed in the rear extending the full height of the building in which the water closets may be placed, thus removing these nuisances from the dormitory and hospital where they now are.

We propose to your honorable board to receive at our hospital, furnish care, medical attendance and medicines, to all patients which may be sent to us on the credit of Marquette county for the sum of eight dollars per week for each person, and upon the acceptance by your honorable board of this proposal will agree to receive and care for all such patients properly accredited to us by the county, save and excepting from this proposal persons afflicted with the following diseases, to-wit: small pox, cholera, yellow fever, typhus, delirium tremens and confinement (this latter meaning women in childbirth).

We would be pleased to have your honorable board visit our hospital and inspect the same before accepting this proposal.

The expenditures in the First district (which includes the poor house) covers the following supplies on hand: 300 cords of wood, 300 bushels of potatoes, 200 heads of cabbage, 30 bushels of turnips, 8 bushels of carrots, 6 bushels of parsnips, 5 bushels of beets, 12 tons of hay and 35 tons of coal.

Notwithstanding the fact that the cost of maintaining the poor in the First district for the year ending September 30, 1892, was somewhat less than the preceding year, the aggregate amount expended in the county was considerably in excess of last year, which is easily accounted for in the fact that many of the mines have closed down, thereby throwing a large number of people out of employment, causing much poverty and distress in the Second and Third districts where these mines are located, and in view of the present outlook I feel justified in respectfully recommending that the sum of forty thousand (\$40,000) dollars be appropriated as a poor fund for the ensuing year.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, Mich.: GENTLEMEN:—Herewith I submit my annual report as inspector of mines for the county of Marquette, Mich., as per information gathered from the various mines of the county, and the reports rendered me by said mines, said reports being a part hereof and which I herewith hand your honorable body.

By the reports above referred to can be seen the date of all accidents, name of person so injured, cause of such accident, occupation and nationality.

It will be found that the total number of men killed in the different mines of the county was twenty-six, of which only six have occurred during the past five months, or the time the present incumbent has filled said office of mine inspector, and only two permanently disabled, one of which happening in my term. The total number of visits made and mines inspected in the last five months, during the term of the present incumbent was 89, as per reports already rendered to your county clerk.

The total number of men employed in the various mines of the county was 7,230 per month, as against 8,000 the preceding year, the ratio of fatal casualty being about the same as in the twelve months ending October 1, 1891, and during my term (the past five months) it affords me pleasure as well as satisfaction to report that I have not met with one instance of violation of the laws concerning protection to the lives and health of employes, and all demands made on the different mining companies have been promptly and faithfully fulfilled. Your special committee to whom was referred the matter of making contracts with the several hospitals throughout the county for the care of all persons requiring of the county medical attendance and nursing, beg permission to submit the following report:

We have been unable to make contracts with the Champion and Republic hospitals as these hospitals are temporarily closed with the mines at these places, but we have contracted with Felch & Vandeventer, proprietors of the Ishpeming hospital, for the keep, care, board, medical attendance and medicine of all county patients who may be sent to them by order of the local health officer or the superintendent of the poor of the district, for ten dollars a week for each person while remaining in charge of said hospital.

This agreement was this 30th day of Aug. A. D. 1893, by and between Messrs. Felch and Vandeventer, party of the first part and the county of Marquette, in the state of Michigan, party of the second part, witnesseth, that the party of the first part hereby agrees to receive in Ishpeming hospital or some other appropriate place, all persons requiring medical attendance or nursing who shall be sent to it upon the order of any superintendent of the poor or any health officer of the county of Marquette, and to keep, board, furnish proper care, medical attendance and medicine for such persons for the sum of ten dollars a week for each person while remaining in charge of first party, with exception as is done by the Sister's hospital, Marquette, small pox and insane.

First party further agrees to discharge said sick persons from said hospital or other place where they are kept and cared for, as soon as their physical condition and humanity will permit.

Said second party agrees upon its part to pay to said first party ten dollars per week for each person so placed in charge of first party by any health officer or superintendent of the poor of said county and cared for as aforesaid. Provided that the health officer of the townships and cities of said county shall only have power to bind the county when the person so placed by them in charge of first party is afflicted with some disease dangerous to the public health. There shall be delivered to first party with each patient received, a written or printed order for the reception thereof signed by the proper officer, and such order shall be returned to the county clerk with the bill for care of said person.

In witness whereof first party has signed this agreement, and second party caused the same to be signed by the chairman of the board of supervisors, and this committee appointed to make this contract.

GENTLEMEN:—Your special committee to whom was referred the improvement of the old state road in Chocoley township, beg permission to submit the following report: Your committee has been over the ground and found it in an almost impassable condition. We find that there is about 7,000 cubic yards of dirt to be moved, which we think will cost about \$700, and it will take about 50,000 feet of 3-inch hemlock plank to plank the roadbed, which will cost when laid \$575, making a total cost of \$1,275, out of which there is work to be donated to the amount of \$130, leaving \$1,145 to be provided for, and your committee would recommend that the sum of \$800 be granted to the township of Chocoley towards making the said road in a good passable condition, and that the said township of Chocoley raise the balance, \$345, to complete the same.

The following report of the Inspector of mines was received and placed on file.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of the County of Marquette, Michigan.

Gentlemen: It is my honor to submit for your examination, in this my second annual report, an accurate account of my official acts during the year ending September 30 1893.

The individual reports of the several mines doing business within my jurisdiction are also presented as a part of this report.

Accident No. 1. Erick Fish, by occupation a miner, was killed at the Davis mine, October 20, 1892. Deceased was one of a gang engaged at the fifth level of the mine in removing a pillar. Operations had been pursued to the second tier from the bottom of level, when the sets gave way, a portion of which struck the deceased and death ensued, timbering here was from sets of small dimensions which were insufficiently braced.

No. 2. At the Escanaba River Land & Iron Co's mine, John Jewel met death by a fall of ground November 3, 1892. Jewel and his partners were running ground against orders from the back of level No. 3, when a portion of the back lost its cleavage to a slip and fell upon the spot where deceased stood. Death was instantaneous.

No. 3. On the 16th of November, at the Buffalo mine, Henry Lathe, cage tender, after giving signal to hoist, essayed to leap upon the moving cage. He lost his balance and fell with head projecting toward the shaft, when back of level was reached the head was torn from trunk of body, causing of course instant death.

No. 4. At the Salsbury mine December 13, 1892, Charles Freetley was killed by a fall of timber, at the fourteenth level of the mine. Freetley and his partners were cutting out for a new room in side of level when the taking up cap slipped from position and struck deceased as it fell to the ground below. When deceased was picked up life was extinct.

No. 5. At the Winthrop mine February 11, 1893, Gabriel Johnson, while loading timber into the skip and walking backward toward the shaft, his hand hook slipped from the rolling log. He fell backward and down the open shaft to a depth of two hundred feet and was killed. His body was caught in the mouth of the skip as it stood in that point of the shaft.

No. 6. At Republic mine, February 17, 1893, while removing a pillar about 125 feet from surface, a rock weighing 50 pounds turned out from the side of same and killed an operative employed at that place, James Hocking was the name of the victim of this accident.

No. 7. At the Richmond mine, February 25, 1893, James Connors met death by falling down the shaft, he having lost his hold in climbing when near the surface. Distance of the fall 85 feet.

No. 8. Buffalo mine March 3, 1893, it was in the 3rd level of the above mine and at the date already given, that Charles Swanson was crushed to death by a fall of ground. Mining was conducted by the use of the square set timbering. The bottom of level had been reached within two tiers when lagging above gave way. One whole set was filled by the quantity of rock that came down from above.

No. 9. Herman Kutimackey fell 75 feet down the shaft at the Buffalo mine March 3, 1893. He died from the effect of injuries received, on the following day.

No. 10. J. H. Richards was engaged at the "C" shaft, Pittsburg and Lake Angeline mine, on the 25th of March, 1893, in mining out a pillar. Due to faulty bracing a cap was pushed out of position by the weight of overhanging ground. Deceased was killed by the falling ground. Operations had been extended to the third level at the time of the accident.

No. 11. While removing pillars at the 9th level of the Salsbury mine a portion of ground turned out from one of the sides and crushed to death Richard Rupi. Preparations were being made for a new set of timbers at the time of the untoward event here recorded, date April 19th, 1893.

No. 12. At the Lake Superior mine, Sec. 15, April 25, 1893, John Varcoe lost his life by attempting to jump from a moving skip; he missed his footing and fell backward into the shaft and was precipitated down the distance of one level to the bottom of the mine.

No. 13. A fall of ground from the back of stope killed John Peterson while employed at the Republic mine, May 13, 1893.

No. 14. Salsbury mine, May 3, 1893, John Lace sustained fatal injuries at the Salsbury mine, ninth level, from a fall of ground out of the hanging wall, which also crushed away the timbers used in mining out a pillar at that point. The ore had been extracted to a distance of six sets above the bottom of the level at the time of the unfortunate occurrence.

No. 15. Alex Mattilla was killed at the Buffalo mine, June 8, 1893, by a fall of rock.

No. 16. Patrick O'Brien lost his balance and fell down a winze to his death while pushing sand from a bank into a chute at its foot. Date of accident, July 14, at Lake Superior mine.

No. 17. Cleveland Iron mine, July 7, 1893, Gust Mackie lost his equilibrium while engaged in repairs at the incline shaft and fell to the bottom with fatal result.

No. 18. Salsbury mine, July 29, 1893. John Hinds fell down the shaft from the thirteenth to the fourteenth level and was killed.

Accidental death was the verdict of the jury in each and every case.

Average number of men employed from Oct. 1, 1892 to Sept. 30, 1893, 5,162 against 7,230 and 8,000 for the two years last preceding.

I have inspected every mine in the county as frequently as directed by law and when the safety of human life has required the same have gone in excess of statutory provisions.

To Hon. Board of Supervisors: The undersigned inspectors of jails for the county of Marquette, in compliance with the provisions of law (Sec.'s 9649-9654, found on page 2318 of Howell's Annotated Statutes of Michigan, as above amended), would respectfully report:

That on the third day of October, 1893, they visited and carefully inspected the county jail of said county, and found as follows:

1. That during the six months immediately preceding such examination there had been confined at different times 145 prisoners, charged with offenses as follows:

 We would recommend that the present method be so changed as to require each able-bodied man receiving aid, and who is in condition to do so, to work upon the streets or county roads in the city or township in which he may reside a sufficient number of days at \$1 per day as compensation for aid given.
 Further, that the superintendents of poor, together with the committee on superintendents of the poor, receive bids and contract with parties for a term of three months, in all convenient places in the county, and subject to such specifications as the superintendents and committee may see fit, for the furnishing of supplies for distribution to the poor.
 Your committee has visited the county farm and find that the condition there existing to be very unfavorable to farming on a large scale, but owing to the inability of the county at this time to bear the burden of the expense of selecting a new site and the consequent removal of the poor house, we would recommend that nothing

in that direction be attempted at this present time.

The presence in the county poor house of some able-bodied laborers suggests to your committee the necessity of recommending to the county officers interested a rigid discrimination against this class and that the house in question be reserved for its legitimate use—that of housing only those who are unable physically to labor for a living.

T. H. Harris, Chairman County Committee: Dear Sir:—Regarding the application of your committee through Mr. Bradt for right of way through this Company's lands for the Goose Lake road, I have to say that I will recommend to our Company to make a free grant for that purpose, subject to the following conditions: That you shall cut and pile all the timber on the right of way for the coming winter. The pine timber to be cut into saw logs, and all other timber to be cut into cordwood 4 ft. long, split and piled all to be done in a first-class manner. That no brush or timber of any description shall be thrown and left on our land outside of the right of way. The hardwood and the softwood to be piled separately. Or you may have the option to pay us \$100 in full for the timber and then you can do what you like with it. Mr. Mather is absent in Europe and may not return for probably a month, so this recommendation cannot be acted upon until his return but I can give you almost positive assurance that it will meet with his approval. Yours Truly, SAM'L REDFERN, Supt. Lands

All wood, whether sound or decayed, and all other decayed vegetable matter, shall be removed from the roadbed, except in place where corduroy already exists, and then left only by direction of the inspector.

No material shall be used in embankment except solid earth. No rocks containing over 64 cubic inches to be left within 1 foot below the surface of the roadbed.

When there is embankment on side hill, where the slope of the surface of the ground exceeds 1 in 5, the ground shall be notched into steps or offsets under the embankment, in order to retain the earth.

When it is necessary to borrow earth to make embankment, it shall, if practicable, be obtained by widening evenly in excavations outside of ditches, and at or above grade of roadbed. Otherwise it must be obtained in such manner as may be approved by the inspector.

In case of excess of excavation over embankment the surplus earth must be placed as directed by the inspector. Corduroy to be laid full width of road bed at points designated on profile, to be made of straight cedar timber not less than six inches in diameter at small end, and covered with solid earth or gravel 1 1/2 feet in center and one-half foot on sides.

Culverts—Walls to be made of sound pine or cedar sawed square or hewn on three sides and the bark striped off the other side, and to be not less than one foot on each face. Cross drains to be of sound three inch pine plank with opening one foot square. Contractors are required to preserve the line and grade stakes.

All work to be done in a good and workmanlike manner, under the direction and subject to the approval of the inspector. NOTE.—The whole length of the line of road, about 4 1/2 miles, is divided into eight sections of about 3,000 feet each, and separate bids are required for each section.

To the Board of Supervisors of the County of Marquette.—GENTLEMEN: Your committee to whom was referred the matter of the highway south of Chocolay would respectfully report as follows: The roads in this whole section of country are sandy and this particular portion of the road, in need of repair, is about 1700 feet long and of a steep grade most of this distance.

Your committee is of the opinion that a Herlock plank road, eight feet wide be constructed for teams to go up on and the road be made wide enough for teams to go down alongside, on the sand, as they now do. It will take about 50 m ft of lumber that will cost about \$450 and the grading and laying of plank will cost about \$600 more.

We think the work necessary and think the farmers living in that section deserving of the necessary appropriation, and from what we could learn, do not think the township through which the road runs, able to do the work. Neither can we learn that the towns of Scandia or Chocolay are in a financial condition to contribute much, if any.

Your committee would recommend that a survey of the road be made by George P. Cummings and specifications be drawn up and this committee be authorized to advertise for bids for the construction of the road in accordance herewith. The specifications and bids to be presented to the full board at the next meeting for their consideration and definite action.

THIRD ANNUAL MINE INSPECTOR'S REPORT.
 OFFICE OF THE MINE INSPECTOR
 OF MARQUETTE COUNTY, MICH.,
 NEGAUNEE, MICH., SEPT. 30, 1894.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of the County of Marquette, State of Michigan:

GENTLEMEN:—It is my honor to submit for your examination, in this, my third annual report, an accurate account of my official acts, during the year ending Sept. 30, 1894.

The individual reports of the several mines is made a part hereof, as attached.

The following is a complete list of fatalities for the year:
 Accident No. 1. J. Koddan Anderson, was killed at the Salisbury mine on Oct. 1, 1893, by a flying rock from a blast on surface. He was a laborer and employed at the time of the accident in digging for the foundation of a new engine house to the south of the property. "Killed by accident" was the verdict of the jury.

2. John H. Rowe was killed Oct. 21, 1893, by a fall of ground at the Lake Angeline mine, east end. He was one of a gang of three men employed in a stope on the 147 foot level, 25 feet west of shaft and fourth set north. The place was one set wide at the time of the accident. His age was twenty-six years. The verdict of the jury in this case was accidental death.

3. Eric Westenberg, was killed at noon Dec. 11, 1893, at the Blue mine, by a run of ground in the second level, 150 feet below surface. Deceased was working alone at the fatal moment, having returned to duty immediately after lunch, and was found buried beneath one set of dirt by his partners within thirty minutes after the occurrence. Work was being prosecuted by means of raising sets. The distance from the bottom of the level was 24 feet. Three sets of timbers had been erected. In this case the verdict of the jury was, killed by accident.

4. Ole Hammer, was killed at the Volunteer mine Feb. 16, 1894. He was engaged in the 490 foot level, second stope west of shaft, and at the time of the accident was barring down ground after a blast. He was precipitated down a distance of 25 feet by a huge rock which struck and smashed the ladder on which he stood at work. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death.

5. John Dunn, was killed at the Republic mine March 6, 1894. He was repairing the trolley in the open pit when by means of a displaced nut from one of the bolts the ladder fell across No. 6 shaft throwing him down an entire distance of 245 feet. The verdict of the jury was accidental death.

6. Alex Youare, died from the effects of an accident received at the Platt mine. He was hurt March 13, and expired April 2, 1894. He was struck on the back by a rock which fell from the hanging wall, in the east stope of the 200 foot level. Death by accident was the verdict of the jury.

7. Richard Jeffrey, died April 6, 1894, from the effects of injuries sustained in the Negaunee mine on the preceding day. He was working in the 720 foot level, 120 feet west of the shaft, 218 feet north of the second room, on the second tier above. A rock turned out from the side, caught his ankle and threw him across the cap. His injuries were internal. Death by accident, was the verdict of the jury.

8. William Extrom, was killed at the Lake Angeline mine, east end, May 11, 1894. He was one of four men working in No. 5 raise 80 feet from the surface. He was in the act of descending the raise when a boulder washed down from above, found his person and knocked him down 70 feet to the bottom. Verdict of jury, accidental death.

9. James Pauletto, was killed by a run from the stock pile on surface at the Lillie mine, May 24, 1894. Verdict of jury, death by accident.

10. Jacob Teskala, was killed at the Jackson mine, June 7, 1894, by a fall of ground in the bottom level of the sand shaft. At the time of his death he was tramping dirt from the west stope, when a portion of the back came down upon him, killing him instantly. Accidental death was brought in as the verdict of the jury.

11-12. Richard Jackman and George Folland were killed at the Swanzy mine, June 1, 1894. They were in the shaft at the bottom, when a bucket of tools came down from above and produced the fatal result. The verdict of the jury was, killed by accident.

13. Jerry Sullivan, was killed July 1, 1894, at the Nelson mine while descending from the 750 foot to the 1,000 foot level. The verdict of the jury was accidental death.

14. Matt Harogan, was killed at the Volunteer mine, on surface, July 26, 1894. His injuries were caused by a car of loaded ore, he having been caught beneath it and the track beneath. The verdict was accidental death.

15. Timothy Sheehan, was killed at the Lillie mine, Aug. 20, 1894. Deceased was a miner on duty at the 500 foot level, 250 feet southwest of the shaft, raise No. 5, 6 feet above main level. He went down with the ground that caved below him. Verdict of the jury was, death caused by co-laborer from a blast fired in an adjacent room against the orders of the captain and shift bosses.

Average number of men employed during the year was 3,506; against 8,000 in the two years last preceding.

My official inspections amount to 237 visits, and have been made with consistent care and reasonable solicitude for the protection of human lives employed in the several mines.

To the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, Michigan.—GENTLEMEN: Your committee to whom was intrusted the investigation of a road in Chocolay Township, at what is known as the Boggan Hill, would respectfully report as follows: Plans and specifications were fully drawn up and are hereby submitted. Bids were advertised for but owing to the lateness of the season, only one was tendered.

It would not have been practicable to have improved the road in the thorough manner contemplated, in the time left before cold weather set in.

The survey shows the road to be 1,450 feet long between the bottom and top of the hill, which is 205 feet high. The specifications call for an 18-foot wide roadway, one side of which is for teams going down and the other side was to be planked for teams going up.

Plank to be 3 inches thick and 8 feet long and spiked to 4x4 stringers.

We consider the improvement needed and recommend that the matter be laid over until the first spring meeting after the spring election.

There is some question too about the road being one on which the county can legally expend money.

That he has leave from the owner of the land where said dams are to be located to construct and complete the same.

The upper dam is to be located on section nine (9), of township forty-seven (47), north of range thirty (30), west beginning at a point on the west bank of said stream from which the southwest section corner bears south sixteen (16) degrees, fifty-nine (59) minutes west distant 2419 feet, extending across said stream north sixty (60) degrees twenty-five (25) minutes east to a point on the opposite bank 432 feet distant from the point of beginning. The lower dam to be located on section eighteen (18), in township forty-six (46), north of range twenty-nine (29) west, beginning at a point on the west bank of said stream from which the northwest section corner bears north forty-nine (49) degrees thirty-five (35) minutes west, distant 1375 and 5-10 feet extending across said stream in a direction north forty-seven (47) degrees thirty-five (35) minutes east to a point on the opposite bank 370 feet distant from the point of beginning, to be built of crib work filled with rock properly protected with rip rap and the height of the dam to be eight feet and to be provided with one gate or schute for the passage of logs and timber to be twelve (12) feet wide and four (4) feet deep leaving four (4) feet of water in the dam. Also with three sluices or overflows each sixteen (16) feet wide.

It being expressly understood that no charge shall be made by said Hudson for medicines, medical attendance, nursing or board furnished to any person sick with a contagious disease except such as he shall attend on the order of the superintendent of the poor and the chairman of such board of health, and on the credit of the county of Marquette under this contract.

And the said board of health hereby agrees to approve such bills as shall be incurred under the terms of this contract and no other, and the county of Marquette hereby agrees to pay the same according to the terms hereof when approved by the said board of health.

In witness whereof the said county of Marquette has caused this contract to be signed by the chairman of its board of supervisors, the board of health of said city of Negaunee has caused this contract to be signed by its chairman, and the party of the second part has hereunto set his hand the day and year first above written.
