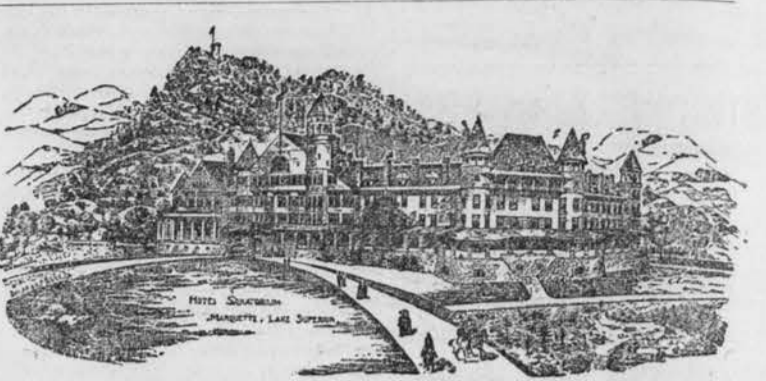

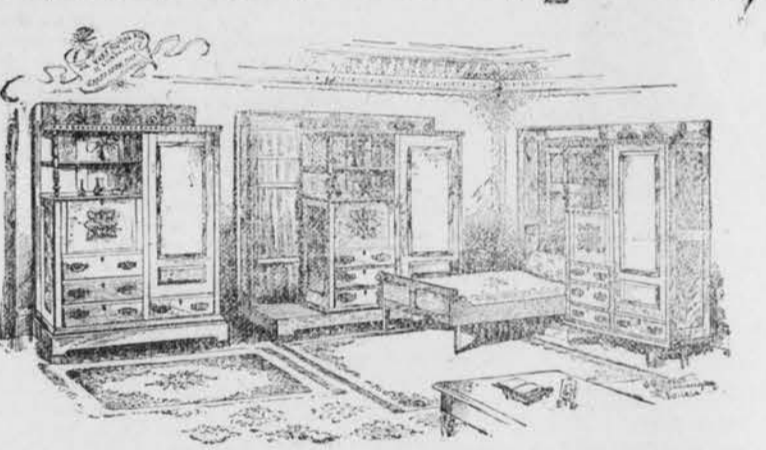

MARQUETTE'S BREAKWATER.

Home Contractors Capture the Big Contract for Its Extension This Winter.

THE GAS COMPANY STILL MAKING GREAT IMPROVEMENTS.

E. M. Watson Secures the Longyear Residence—Election of Officers in the Marquette Rifles.

MARQUETTE GETS THERE.

The bids for the extension of the Marquette breakwater, for which purpose an \$80,000 appropriation was made by the last congress, were opened at the engineer's office in Duluth yesterday morning and it was found that Marquette contractors had captured the job.

The bids for the construction and placing in position of nine cribs, each 60 feet long, 20 feet wide and 18 1/2 feet deep with a superstructure 6 feet high.

The job is the largest ever let on the Marquette breakwater, the government engineer's estimate being that it will require 8,600 cords of rock, 1,000,000 feet of timber for the cribs and superstructure and 50,000 feet for repairs on the old superstructure.

Marquette's breakwater, up to the time of the Morrison extension three or four years ago, was 2,010 feet long. That extension and Bernier's contract winter before last added six cribs, or 360 feet, to the length and the nine cribs to be placed under this contract will add 540 feet more, making a total of 2,910 feet or 2,970 feet, as is probable, a tenth crib is ordered under this appropriation.

The successful contractors will get out a part of the timber themselves and buy the rest. Their arrangements for rock are not yet completed. A part will undoubtedly come from the rock cuts for streets in the north part of the city but if heavy ice does not form about the breakwater so that stone can be piled on the ice until needed in forming the substructure and fitting the cribs a large share of the 9,000 cords may be brought in by scows from points up the shore.

Powell & Mitchell are right "in it" this season as this is the second government contract which they have captured within a month. Their other contract is for the new breakwater at Two Harbors, to run out from the west side of the harbor. There is \$7,000 available for the work and six cribs will be put down. There were four bids in and the Marquette men got there by just \$97 under their closest competitor.

The Mining Journal is pleased to see the Marquette contract go to Marquette men, as it means just so much more for the city, and is also pleased to see an enterprising Marquette firm gathering in government plums elsewhere.

Extensive Improvements.

The Marquette Gas company under the competition of the city's public lighting service has developed into one of the most aggressive and enterprising concerns in this part of the state. It has just thoroughly rebuilt its pipe lines after introducing a short time before an expensive water gas plant and is now building a new holder besides putting in additional tanks for the storage of oil.

The pit is 42 feet in diameter and 16 feet deep. It has a brick lining laid in cement and between the brick lining and the main wall of stone is a two inch layer of the finest cement while the floor of the pit is to be finished with equal care, making the whole water tight and preventing the heavy waste of water now experienced with the old tank.

The company had quite an experience when it came to clean out the old pit. The tar tank in the bottom was known to have burst and the superintendent sent up-town for six barrels to hold the

tar. The six were filled and the astonished superintendent sent for ten. These were soon filled, as were another ten and then in his desperation he ordered one hundred barrels. The old pit in the end yielded 325 barrels of coal tar besides a large quantity of coke, all the accumulation of years in which coal gas was made by the company. The tar recovered is worth several dollars a barrel while the coke, saturated with tar, gave the company a splendid supply of fuel for a time.

The present oil tank having proven too small another will be added exactly like it, a building having been started for the two which will protect them from the weather and which has a cement bottom with a well to catch and save the drippings.

As the brick work, etc. for the new tank will cost fully \$2,500 and the iron work about \$3,000, it can be seen that with the other improvements noted the company is putting a large sum of money into improvements again this fall. Its officers are determined to have as complete, as perfect and as economical a gas plant as there is in the state and are rapidly approaching that end.

Secures a Beautiful Home.

Yesterday the deal between J. M. Longyear and E. M. Watson which has been under consideration by the parties for several weeks was consummated and by its terms, which are not made public, Mr. Watson secures the present Longyear residence property on the corner of Cedar and Michigan streets in return for his front street home.

Mr. Watson will occupy his new residence as soon as Mr. Longyear moves into the grand home which has been building for him so long and which is now receiving its finishing touches and that will be some time toward the end of this month.

Company G's Election.

The Marquette Rifles, Co. G, Fifth Infantry, M. S. T., followed closely last evening, in the special election called to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Capt. L. H. Agnew, the policy of promotion in regular order which has for some time prevailed in company affairs. First Lieut. B. S. Kaufman was elected captain by acclamation, Second Lieut. F. E. Bar was elected first lieutenant in the same manner and then a ballot was taken for second lieutenant. Orderly Sergt. F. F. Werner received 21 votes, Sergt. Jacobs 10 and there were three scattering.
