Next Season Vessels Drawing 17 Feet Can Take the Inside Channel.

AND AVOID THE DANGERS OF KEWEENAW POINT.

Summary of the Work Done This Year on Portage River and the Ship Canal.

HOUGHTON.

The very tavorable weather which has prevailed for the past month has made it possible for the dredges at work deepening the channels at both entrances to Portage Lake to accomplish fully as much work if not more than the contractor, Mr. James Pryor, expected would be done this season. Mr. Pryor informed the MINING JOURNAL reporter yesterday that the entrance from Keweenaw Bay to the Portage Entry piers is all completed. The dredges have made three cuts from deep water to the piers, making a chan-nel 17 feet deep, 60 feet wide in the deepest portion and 80 to 125 wide. One dredge is now at work in the cut near dredge is now at work in the cut near Prince's Point and the work of deepening the entrance from Portage Lake to the river will take about two weeks. At the upper canal five cuts have been made from deep water to the end of the leavent to the end of th made from deep water to the end of the piers and three cuts inside the piers. That work will be completed in a few days and the dredge will then go to Lily Pond, which is about one mile from entrance and midway in the canal, and dredge out that so it can be used as a dredge out that so it can be used as a harbor of refuge. This pond is about 600 feet long and 150 feet wide and has never been thoroughly dredged out. The above work will be all that will be done before the close of navigation and it enables reseals of no greater. and it enables vessels of no greater draught than the depth of water mentioned to use the Portage Lake route to avoid the dangers of going around Ke-







Home Contractors Capture the Big Contract for Its Extension This Winter.

THE GAS COMPANY STILL MAK-ING GREAT IMPROVEMENTS.

E. M. Watson Secures the Longyear Residence-Election of Officers in the Marquette Rifles.

MARQUETTE GETS THERE.

The bids for the extension of the Marquette breakwater, for which purpose an \$80,000 appropriation was made by the last congress, were opened at the engineer's office in Duluth yesterday morning and it was found that Marquette contractors had captured the as complete, as perfect and as economic job. The following were the bids: Wisconsin Dredge Co., \$81,910; Campbell & McDonald, of Duluth, \$80,760; Hugh Steele, of Duluth, \$80,830; Dave Sang, Smith Moore and P. Nicholson, of Marquette and Duluth, \$76,070; Bernier & Lantz. of Green Bay, \$69,860; Powell & the Mitchell, of Marquette, \$65,351.50.

The bid is for the construction and 60 feet long, 20 feet wide and 181/4 feet

The job is the largest ever let on the Marquette breakwater, the government engineer's estimate being that it will require 8,600 cords of rock. 1,000,000 feet of timber for the cribs and superstructure and 50,000 feet for repairs on the old superstructure, and nearly 100,000 pounds of iron in the shape of bolts and spikes.


