





Number of Lives Lost About Hough ton County Mines the Past Year.

MINE INSPECTOR HALL'S REPORT SUMMARIZED.

Fatal Accidents Are Decreasing and Would Be Further Lessened If Men Were More Careful.

The annual report of Mine Inspector Hall as handed to the board of super-visors at its annual meeting, held Monday, October 10, shows that there were twenty-one fatal accidents in the mines of Houghton county during the year ending September 30, 1892. "It is satisfactory to note that the number of fatal accidents in our mines has been steadily declining, as the fol-lowing figures will show, and for the year now closing are comparatively favorable:
"In 1890 there were employed in the

mines of Houghton county 7,310 men; lives lost 36, one of these on surface. "In 1891 the number of men reported employed was 7,702; fatal accidents 28. "In 1892 I report men employed 7,640; fatalities 21, four of these happening on surface, which shows a loss of about 2.75 per one thousand men em-

'It is quite plain, however, that if proper care was exercised by the men the number of casualties might be still largely reduced. Accidents Nos. 4, 6, 9, 16, 17 and 21 now reported can only be attributed to carelessness or lack of hought at the time of occurance.

"The managements of the different mines of the county have afforded me every facility for inspecting them and I have found a willingness to comply with such suggestions as I thought proper to make for the safety of the men employed in them.

The report of the superintendent of the poor as handed to the board of supervisors shows the amount of county poor orders issued for the poor house and farm for the maintenance of fifty-nine different persons kept there during the year, amounting in all to 11,549 days at the rate of 20% cents per day, amount to \$4 \$27.65. This amount in-cludes poorkeeper's salary of \$1,000 per year and all expenses attending the running of the poor farm. The amount of county poor orders issued for partial support of about 1,050 different persons outside the poor house, including dis-abled men, widows and children, for supplies firewood medical attendance. 


