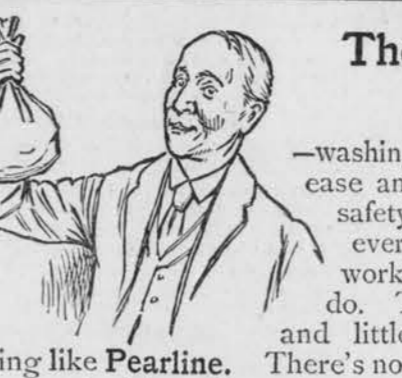

TWENTY-ONE WERE KILLED Number of Lives Lost About Houghton County Mines the Past Year.

MINE INSPECTOR HALL'S REPORT SUMMARIZED. Fatal Accidents Are Decreasing and Would Be Further Lessened if Men Were More Careful.

HOUGHTON. The annual report of Mine Inspector Hall as handed to the board of supervisors at its annual meeting, held Monday, October 10, shows that there were twenty-one fatal accidents in the mines of Houghton county during the year ending September 30, 1892.

It is satisfactory to note that the number of fatal accidents in our mines has been steadily declining, as the following figures will show, and for the year now closing are comparatively favorable.

It is quite plain, however, that if proper care was exercised by the men the number of casualties might be still largely reduced.

SOME MORE OF THE SAME.

A Kind of Protection That Marquette Merchants Could Stand Considerable More of Right Along.

SERMON PREACHED FROM BORROWED TEXT FOR HOME USE.

But it Inculcates Some Truths That the People of This City Have Cause to Ponder Prayerfully and Carefully.

MORE OF IT WANTED.

In the course of his speech at the Casino the other night Mr. Keator made a telling point for the cause in whose behalf he spoke by reminding his hearers that where their immediate interests are involved republicans and democrats and populists and prohibitionists are all alike protectionists.

Mr. Keator's point was well taken and shrewdly made, but it would be much stronger if our common council had made the tax on the predatory dealers who every now and then invade the city more of a protection to our merchants than it is at the insignificant figure representing the license charged auctioneers and peddlers.

The merchants of Marquette, who are with us always and who pay so large a share of the expense of conducting the government of the city, ought to have more protection of this kind than the common council of the city has given them.

There is another kind of protection that the merchants of Marquette ought to have but, that is a kind that the common council cannot give them. It is protection against the reprehensible and altogether foolish habit of ordering goods from Chicago, Milwaukee, Detroit and New York into which so many of the people here have fallen.

Fashionable ladies complain that they cannot find the grades of goods that they like to have to select from in our dry goods stores.

It is not by crippling ourselves in this manner that we can make Marquette advance in business importance. We need some more "protection" here—protection against itinerant dealers and fake merchants and just a little bit of protection against the indifference or selfishness of those among us who give all of their patronage that they can possibly send abroad to outside merchants while relying on the business they do here, or the salaries they draw here, for a living.
