PAPERS ROASTING WALES.

He Staid Away From Tennyson's Funeral to Attend the Newmarket Races.

GLADSTONIAN LOSE A SEAT AT CIRENCESTER.

Anti-Catholic Fanatics Kicking at Mayor Knill's Election Will Be Snubbed by the Queen.

ALBERT EDWARD'S BAD TASTE.

LONDON, Oct. 14.—[Copyrighted].—The fact that the Prince of Wales absent himself from the funeral of Lord Tennyson on Wednesday in order that he might attend the Newmarket races is provoking considerable comment.

The Chronicle, referring to the funeral of Tennyson, says: "We can excuse the absence of the queen and also Mr. Gladstone, but we cannot understand why the Prince of Wales failed to pay the last tribute of personal consideration to a man whom the whole nation desired to honor. The prince conspicuously preferred the attractions of the Newmarket races and pheasant shooting."

The defeat yesterday of Mr. Lawson, the Gladstonian who contested the Cirencester division of Gloucestershire with Colonel Master, conservative, is keenly felt by the liberals, who, though they expected a tough fight, hoped to retain the seat.

This is the first loss the liberals have sustained, since the general election. Following their reduced majorities in the bye-elections in Leeds and Bedfordshire it is certain to make a marked impression on the public, while it will stimulate the conservatives where there is the smallest chance for victory.

The local liberals refused to believe they were defeated. A recount was made during a scene of feverish excitement, enormous crowds surrounding the hall.

The conservatives were overjoyed when the result was announced. They marched in processions about the town drawing Colonel Master in his carriage.

The success of the conservatives was largely due to the popularity of Colonel Master while Mr. Lawson was practically a stranger in the constituency. He was largely assisted in his campaign by his wife.

A movement is on foot among cattle breeders to promote a bill providing for the quarantining of all foreign live stock except such as are intended for slaughter. The movement is chiefly directed against the admission of American cattle.

The proposal made by the panelites that the Paris fund be placed in the hands of a committee of three members from each faction of the Irish parliamentary party, which it was thought would be accepted by the m'Carthyites, has fallen to the ground owing to the action of the panelites insisting that their claim of charges, which consist of law costs of the National League amounting to over £20,000, be allowed from the fund.

Londoners who oppose Mr. Knill's election as lord mayor on the ground that he is a Catholic have decided to make a final attempt to prevent his assuming the office. The Anti-Popery association has prepared a petition to the queen praying her to refuse to confirm the selection of Mr. Knill on the ground that he has publicly declared that he owes first allegiance to the pope.

A manifesto has been issued calling upon workmen out of employment to march in procession behind the lord mayor's show on November 9 and afterwards to force a way into Trafalgar Square for the purpose of holding a meeting there to give formal expression to a demand for work or bread.

ALDERMEN'S VOTES AT \$500

Conclusive Proof of Boodleism Against the Toledo Councilmen.

TOLEDO, O., Oct. 14.—In the trial of Daly, one of the indicted councilmen, Stenographer Bassett was the first witness. He explained that he was employed by Mr. Lorenz, vice-president of the Pinto Oil company; that an opening had been cut in the floor underneath Lorenz's desk, and that he and Machen, secretary of the company, went into the cellar, climbed on a couple of store boxes and were thus enabled to hear all that passed in the office through the opening. He took stenographic notes of the conversation Mr. Daly and Mr. Lorenz in which the former demanded \$5,500 as the price of passing the ordinance granting the Pinto company the right to pipe certain streets to furnish fuel oil to manufacturing plants. Mr. Lorenz asked him for the names of the men in the combine and Daly named eleven, including himself. The price demanded was \$500 each, making \$5,500. Mr. Lorenz expressed a doubt about Daly's being able to secure eleven votes and Daly had brought six of them, besides himself, to the office to talk with Lorenz. Bassett and Machen were concealed at each interview, and thus a positive case was made against the seven who were indicted. It was impossible to get the other four to come. Machen corroborated every point in Bassett's testimony.

CHARGES AGAINST TOURGEE

He Organized a Negro Society for Purposes of Swindling.

JACKSON, Miss., Oct. 14.—R. H. Wildberger of Clarksdale, Miss., is in the city and brings late details of the recent reported race riot and trouble in Coahoma county. Mr. Wildberger states that the trouble had its origin in a secret society organized among the blacks by Judge Abloh W. Tourgee, author of the "Fool's Errand," who, in consideration of \$2 (of which \$1.50 goes to Tourgee), furnished the blacks with a certificate which guaranteed them, whether qualified electors or not, in large black capitals the "Right to Vote," followed by these words in very small type: "In any meeting of the Citizens' Right association."

The poor negro thought that in this oath-bound association he had secured a substantial backing in putting down the whites and advancing the price of cotton picking. The society came to grief in Coahoma county and gave away the whole plan, which is simply to get all the money possible out of the negroes and to involve them in much trouble for political effect. The trouble in Coahoma smoldered down to this Negro resisted arrest, backed by this secret organization, firing upon the officer. Result, two negroes killed and the members of the society in jail and the records of the organization in official custody.

WILL LEAD GILMORE'S BAND.

Reeves of Providence Cadets' Band Tendered the Position.

St. LOUIS, Oct. 14.—Gilmore's famous band is to be led by Prof. D. W. Reeves, at present the director of the Providence, R. I., Cadets' band. That is, he will become the manager and leader if he accepts the proposition made to him. Reeves was chosen because it was thought he was calculated to make a more acceptable leader to the musicians. He was a warm personal friend of the late Patrick S. Gilmore and had an acquaintance with nearly every member of the band. The future course of the band is not known. If Professor Reeves accepts the offer he will not assume the management until after the band has finished the engagement with the St. Louis exposition and returns to New York.

NEW ZINC REGION.

Discoveries Made of Rich Ore Near Hillsboro, N. M.

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 14.—A mountain of carbonate of zinc has been discovered near Hillsboro, N. M., the ore of which is worth about \$3 per ton in the markets of St. Louis and Joplin, Mo. For years the ore was thought to be lead but recent assays determine it to be zinc. Indications and veins already developed cover over five hundred acres of ground. The strike, it is claimed, will cause the Acheson, Topeka & Santa Fe to extend its branch from Lake Valley to Hillsboro.

STRUCK AN OIL POCKET.

Chicago Suburb Thinks It Has an Oil-aceous Bonanza.

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—The suburb of Glencoe is excited over the discovery of gas and oil in that vicinity. An artesian well at a depth of 120 feet disclosed oil which shot up to a height of 30 feet above the surface. When the flow subsided, gas was emitted which burned for two days and night. The price of land from \$500 an acre has advanced to \$3,000. Ossiun Guthrie, a well-known geologist, thinks the find only a small pocket which has now exhausted itself.

PAIR OF PALTRY SCOUNDRELS.

Admit Their Conspiracy to Blacken a Woman's Name.

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—William A. Davis of Toledo, while on the witness stand here today, confessed to conspiring for money to ruin the reputation of the wife of Charles J. Dietz, agent for the Cincinnati Chemical company. According to Davis the other conspirator was Dietz himself, whom the wife is now suing for divorce.

STOCKS ARE DECREASING.

Coke Iron Visible Supply Went Down About 73,000 Tons in Month of September.

NOVEMBER SHOULD MAKE EVEN BETTER SHOWING.

Soft Bessemer of Better Grades Are Generally Well Sold Out at the Lower Lake Ports.

STATE OF THE IRON TRADE. CLEVELAND, Oct. 14.—In its weekly resume of iron and ore business the Iron Trade Review says:

A reduction of about 73,000 tons in coke iron stocks between September 1 and October 1 and of about 22,000 tons in stocks of charcoal and anthracite irons adds to the hopeful view of the situation taken by producers of raw iron in the past month.

There is at the same time an increase of about 6,400 tons in the weekly furnace capacity in blast October 1 over that which was active a month previous but if demand keeps up at the present pace the November statement will show a still further reduction in stocks and give color to the claim of furnacemen that conditions are ripe for an advance; that is provided a scare or two of furnaces now out of blast do not regard the sign of improvement already chronicled as a notification to them to get back into the producing column.

SOFT BESSEMER WELL SOLD OUT. Furnacemen do not yet exhibit any great interest in the buying that seems to have been reserved for the latter months of the year. Soft bessemer of the best gradings are sold up very generally and the unsold stocks that the favorable freights have tempted producers to bring down are chiefly divided between non-bessemer and hard bessemer. The sales of the past week have been for the most part of non-bessemer, prices, shading down from \$3.59 all the way to cost. In bessemer hemattite there have been some sales of odd lots of piles that have stood from the opening of the season. On these concessions have been made from the \$4.25 that standard soft bessemer have brought quite uniformly.

MESABA STILL ONLY SPECULATIVE. The representatives of the New England and Lone Jack properties, on the other hand, have been among Cleveland men within the week opening negotiations for the handling of ore from these mines the coming season.

Among going reports from Mesaba mines is that the Mountain Iron company has made a sale of 200,000 tons. There is no truth in the story, however. Not even a testing carload of Mountain Iron or any other Mesaba ore has been sent forward as yet and there is no furnaceman in the country who would make engagements for these ores without a thorough test in the furnace.

HAS FAITH IN HARD ORES. The deal by which the Minnesota Iron company acquires the Miller-Brown mine east of Ely would indicate that its faith in hard ores is still firm and that furnacemen will not be in the market for them in the old time way. The lease is for thirty years, the royalty is 25 cents a ton, the guaranteed minimum output is 20,000 tons and the payment of the royalty to commence October 1, 1894. The drill work done by the Miller-Brown people showed 11 feet of ore at a depth of 150 feet and 120 feet of ore at a depth of 300 feet.

WESTERN MILLS ARE BUSY. The pressure that has been upon western rolling mills in the past month is still a feature of the operations in Cleveland. There is no special anxiety as to further business but at the same time competition for desirable contracts gives consumers favorable prices.

The trouble with the "dragouts," "bull-diggers" and other roll workmen at the Union rolling mills is over. President Weibe found the men unwilling to take the wages offered and could do nothing but declare the places open. The company thereupon put in new men and is now running on full time.

MADE ON ASSIGNMENT.

Well-Known Detroit Dealers in Musical Merchandise Smash.

DETROIT, Oct. 14.—The well known firm of Charles Bobsein & Co., dealers in pianos, organs and general musical merchandise, has made an assignment to Herman C. Ralph. The liabilities are \$100,000 but Mr. Bobsein states that if the business was carefully managed the firm would be able to pay dollar for dollar of its indebtedness. He further says that the assignment was made for the purpose of protecting creditors as well as the stronger creditors.

DUN'S REVIEW OF TRADE.

Imports and Exports Both Increase and Iron Improves.

New YORK, Oct. 14.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade will say: Once more it can be said that trade indications are entirely favorable. Even the shrinkage in exports has ceased, an increase of \$1,500,000 appearing here last week while imports continue surprisingly large and foreign exchange declines.

The iron output October 1 was 156,027 tons weekly against 151,648 tons on September 1 and it is especially encouraging that the stocks on hand decreased \$5,234 tons during September. The demand for pig iron is improving and a general advance of about 50 cents per ton is reported for pig with liberal buying. Trade in plates is very unsatisfactory, in bar iron somewhat better and structural mills are full of orders. Livelier buying continues in copper at 11 1/2 cents.

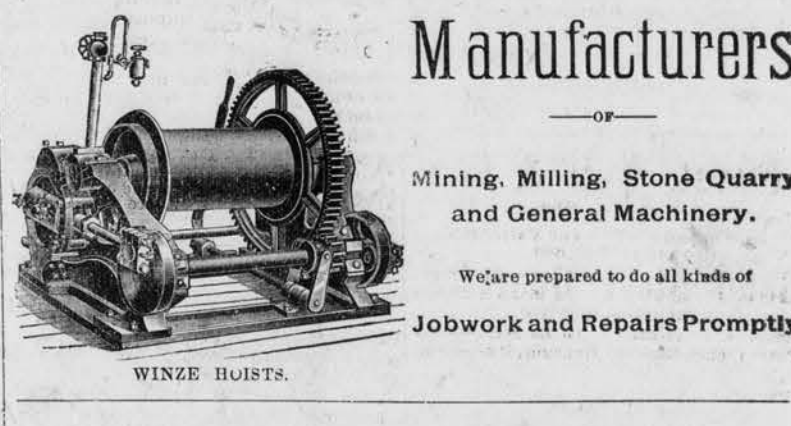
