

Consumption is a very common disease among needle makers.

"How many lives will it cost?" is a question that never enters into the calculation of architect, bridge builder, manufacturer-of any one who supplies the necessities of the world, forwards its progress or adds to its comforts. Human life is the one raw material of which the crop never fails, in producing which there are no strikes. And while there are a vast number of trades and manufactures in their very nature dangerous to life, you cannot induce the men who work at them to take up other occupations. Not even the offer of higher wages will tempt them, which goes to show that a man has as little regard for his own life as any one else has

Workers of the painters, artists, gilders, calico printers, brushes for the children at 5, 10 ers, potters and braziers will tell you that. His paralysis usually affects the extensor muscles of the hands and fingers, and so produces what is popularly called "drop wrist." Once in a while lead poisoning affects the brain A case is recorded where a painter suffering from it thought he saw "windbags blown up to look like men," and other apparitions which made remarks to him and caused him a great deal of anxiety. With all due deference to the medical faculty, it would seem doubtful whether talk about "wind bags blown

up to look like men" should be taken as an evidence of insanity. There surely are such things in real life.



Roman Wealth.

When L. Calpurnius Piso was appointed governor of Macedonia for one year he drew for his outfit from the publie treasury 18,000,000 sesterces or £150,-000. He did not want the money for that purpose; everything required by a proconsul was supplied to him by the province. Piso simply took the money for himself, and lent it out in Rome at high interest. Prevost-Paradol, who had stultified his most brilliant writings by accepting a post-that of minister from France to Washingtonunder the Second Empire, took place just as the Liberal cause, with which his name had always been associated, was on the eve of triumph.

When Mary Wollstonecraft, deserted by her American lover, paced up and down Putney bridge saturating her garments with the rain so that they might not prevent her from sinking in the water her life seemed indescribably dreary-without a ray of hope. Yet this very hour of despair proved to be the turning point in her history, and from it dated the truest bliss she had ever known-a period of wedded happiness and joyous work. And so with "the marvelous boy, the sleepless soul that perished in his pride," Chatterton. He poisoned himself in his wretched garret at the very time when the feet of one who would have relieved his poverty were turned toward the street in which he died.—Boston Transcript.
