HOW STEVEDORES DO THE WORK OF PLACING THE CARGO.

The Fast Steamers Save a Good Deal by Bringing Coal from the Other Side in Sailing Vessels-Importance of Careful Loading to a Fast Steamer.

Did you ever note the fact that one of the great transatlantic greyhounds seland loaded, which, in the case of a ves York, means the handling of some 15,000 tons of cargo and coal. Almost all the British steamships send

over the coal to be burned in the eastward passage in sailing vessels, only shipping enough in Liverpool for the western run. Thus they have more hold room for freight, for which they get coal by sail.

HOW THE WORK IS DISTRIBUTED. The distribution of weight so that no undue strain be sustained by the iron can be seen successfully solved every day by one curious enough to spend an hour on the docks of the great transatlantic river up to Twenty-sixth street. The process is an interesting one.

The boss stevedore, who is responsible for the carrying on of the work, stations at each hatch and side port a gang of men. The gang consists of from ten to twenty men, the number varying with the size of the vessel, the character of the goods to be handled and the distance they have to be moved.

Each gang is in charge of a "leader." He receives five cents an hour more than the men under him when the work is paid for by the hour, the men receiving thirty to forty cents an hour for day work and about sixty cents for night

There is also over the men a foreman, who is paid by the week and receives from twenty to thirty dollars, and an assistant foreman, who is paid by the time worked. The master stevedore maps out the duties of each and is responsible for any mistakes made in stowing the cargo

Under these circumstances I do not deem actual and continuous residence essential in order to show that his was a bona fide pre-emption claim on March 1, 1889, nor that he must, on that day, have been residing on the land in order to be in its actual occupation. He clearly had not abandoned it, and he did enough to show that he was a bona fide cleimant prior to and on May 1, 1888. It is well settled that an intending homesteader, whose application to enter has been rejected, is not required to establish residence in order to preserve his rights, until after the allow ance of his application.

3rd. That Morgan's actual residence at the time of his alleged settlement, and continuously from that time up to and including May 1, 1888, was in Stambaugh, and that a party claiming under the law above quoted "must be a bona fide resident in order to be in the actual occupation of the land."

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
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
