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### ELECTRIC WORKS FLOODED.

Great Plant of General Electric Company at Schenectady Damaged by Water.

EDISON'S WORLD'S FAIR EXHIBIT ALMOST RUINED

Ice Gorge in the Mohawk River at the Fitchburg Bridge-Floods in Western Rivers.

FOUR THOUSAND MEN IDLE. SCHENECTADY, N. Y., March 13.-Last night the ice in the Mohawk river west of the city broke up and formed an immense gorge against the Fitchburg railroad bridge, three miles from here. The water overflowed the banks, flooding Edison Park and that part of the city occupied by the Westinghouse company and the General Electric company. The first floors of the General Electric pany's plant last night will exceed

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., March 13,-A mile south of the city at a point where the tracks of the Delaware & Hudson company pass under those of the New York Central & Hudson River railway baen washed away, stopping all traffic between this city and Albany on the main line. Passenger trains on the Central railway were sent around by the way of Troy. No trains are passing over the Delaware & Hudson road.

Nothing has been heard yet from the party who went to the Fitchburg railway bridge to blow up the gorge with dynamite. Unless the gorge breaks soon more damage is anticipated.

Albany, March 13.—The freshet in the Hudson is the highest since 1883. The lower part of the city is under water and railroad trains and electric cars are prevented from running. The flood rose about one foot an hour during the night and this morning it is fourteen feet above mean tide.

CANAL BOATS CRUSHED LIKE EGGS. RONDOUT, N. Y., March 13.—The ice gorge in Rondout Creek below Eddy-ville gave way about 3:20 o'clock this afternoon and let a tremendous amount of water down the creek. The boats of the Cornell Steamboat company and about twenty-five canal boats were badly damaged. The steamers Pittston and Adriatic, valued at \$18,000, were so badly stove in that it is feared they will sink. A number of the canal boats were crushed like eggshells and sank in the creek. Never before has such wholesale damage been done in this

Since Saturday the water above the ice dam has been breaking up and Eddyville has been inundated. The rain Saturday night caused the water to rise fully eight feet and thousands of dollars of damage has resulted. There were 18,000 barrels of cement stored in the Lawrence Cement company's mill, valued at over \$20,000. These are a total loss.





Secretary Carlisle Issues Rules Based on the New Law.

WASHINGTON, March 13. Secretary Carlisle issued the new regulations re- Kansas & Texas railroad. The regulations contain seventeen articles, the first ten of which are urbstantially the same as those new in force. Articles 11 to 15 inclusive are practically new, made to conform to the new laws affecting immigration passed by the last congress. Their most important points are as follows.
