COAL CAN BE SUCCESSFULLY COOKED ON LAKE SUPERIOR.

A Convincing Showing of the Fallacy of Adverse Arguments Advanced by Mr. E. C. Pechin.

COKE MAKING ON LAKE SUPERIOR. To the Editor of The Iron Trade Review:

In a recent communication to your columns it was suggested that in a subsequent letter figures would be given to you by me, supporting the assertion there made relative to the quality of the coke that has been produced from coal stored in the fall and coked during the winter months.

A CONCLUSIVE SHOWING. Though evidently not so intended, the article contributed some time ago to The Iron Trade Review of Cleveland by Mr. Edward C. Pechin, in which that gentleman undertook to show that coking coal could not be shipped to Lake Superior points and coked here for furnace use successfully, owing to the loss from "weathering," has been of great benefit to this district.

LEHIGH COAL & IRON CO. WEST SUPERIOR, WIS., Feb. 7, 1893.

DEAR SIR—Replying to your favor of the 1st, regarding theoretical losses in the quality of coking coals by weathering, I beg to advise you that Mr. Pechin's statements are not borne out by our experience with the coking of Connellsville coals.

Our average yield of coke is, say, 64 per cent. of the weight of the coal.

Water at 225 degrees 630 Volatile matter 490 Fixed carbon 89,276 Sulphur 82 Ash 8,113

There can be no question that the coke represented by the analysis of the Lehigh Coal & Iron company would be considered fully equal to the average coke produced anywhere.

Wishing to know what the difference in moisture in the atmosphere between Pittsburgh (the nearest reporting station) and Marquette is, I have obtained from the weather bureau, Washington, D. C., the following statement, given in Table 1, which conclusively proves that there is far less water in the air in this district than in Pittsburgh or Chicago, and further that during the months in which coal would be stored, that is, from the beginning of November to the middle of May, the absolute humidity is extremely low at Marquette, the average for these six months being only 1.19 as compared to 2.03 for the same period at Pittsburgh.

The figures opposite "dew point temperature" indicate the monthly mean dew point for each month of the last half of the year, and the first half of the previous year, also the annual dew point. The figures underneath the dew point temperatures at each station indicate the absolute humidity in grains of water per cubic foot at each of the different points.

I would also like to give your readers a table showing the monthly rainfall and mean relative humidity of Marquette and Pittsburgh, the figures of which are given in Table 2.
