Since 1863 it has been celebrated all over the country as the largest Baptist church in New England, if not in America, and the headquarters of that denomination. 



Gold Nugget Shaped Like a Hand, There have been many large and oddly

shaped gold nuggets found in the United States and elsewhere, but the oddest of them all was that discovered at the Midhas mine on Sulky gully, near Melbourne, Australia, in 1887. The nugget was flat and almost the exact counterpart in con-tour of a colossal human hand held open, with the exception of the thumb and fore finger, which were closed together in a manner so as to make it appear that the thumb was holding the finger in place. Its greatest length was 121% inches and its greatest breadth 8 inches.
