The engines were at once stopped and the cap taken off the bearings, when it was seen that the shaft had a combination of fractures. It was decided to disconnect the engines and put the forward crank aft in place of the broken shaft. At 11 p. m. the German tank steamer America came alongside. We signalled that we had a broken shaft but would be repaired in a few days. There was a southeast wind and the ship was drifting to north-west, making about three-quarters of a

mile an hour

\*On Sunday, the 13th, the crew were all set to work to assist the engineers in rigging gear for removing the shaft. We were then 350 miles from Halifax. At 4 p. m. the engines were all clear for lifting and at 7 p. m. the broken crank was lifted out and at 11 p. m. the work of sliding the forward shaft into the bearings was begun.
