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## AS BY AN EARTHQUAKE.

Illinois Town Almost Wrecked and the Earth Shaken for Miles Around.

FIRE AND DUST EXPLOSION IN THE PLANET MILLS.

Concussion Was Felt Fifty Miles Away and Glass Broken and Chimneys Upset Ten Miles Off.

WAS WORSE THAN DYNAMITE. LITCHFIELD, Ill., March 21 .- An exdosion resembling an earthquake and property occurred here this morning. The loss of several lives and the injury of a number of people also resulted from the catastrophe. Practically every business structure in Litchfield was wrecked and scores of dwellings were rendered uninhabitable. Panic reigned for hours and details of the terrible affair were obtained with the utmost dif-

About 3:15 a. m. an alarm of fire was turned in and upon investigation it developed that the Litchfield Planet mills, located in the southwest part of the city and said to be one of the largest said: "Let me suggest that only exflour establishments in the world Before were in flames. firemen arrived upon the scene the fire had gained such headway that for some time nothing could be done to check it and it seemed as if the entire south part of the town would be consumed. The fire originated by a spark from a passing engine falling in the dust room.

The hose and hook and ladder companies had hardly succeeded in getting their apparatus in working order when an explosion appalling in its violence was caused by the flames suddenly coming in contact with pent-up mill dust.

The explosion shook the earth over a singularly wide area while the atmospheric concussion was felt as far as Decatur, a distance of fifty miles. The firemen battled with the flames for three long hours, finally subduing them to such an extent that adjoining property was saved. perty was saved.

The explosion broke large plate glass windows in a majority of the stores in the city: prostrated almost everyone on the streets; shook houses loose from their foundations and jarred the ma-chinery of the Litchfield Car and Machine company to such an extent that work had to be suspended.

The head mill wright, John Carver, in making an effort to secure his tools from the burning building was stunned by the explosion and endeavoring to escape was pinned against the smoke stack and burned to death. When found about three hours afterwards his legs were burned off at the hips, the right arm and the left hand were entirely

burned to the ground. Ten or twenty cars of wheat standing on the house

The night watchman in the mill was hurled through a window and badly ingired. Window glass was broken and chimneys blown down in towns ten miles distant. Nearly every house within a radius of two blocks from the mill was badly wrecked. All the plate glass in the stores on Main and State streets was blown out.

Superintendent Byrnes made a crusade against these places when he was placed in charge of the detective bureau, with the intention of landing all the toolmakers in jail or driving them out of the city, and he succeeded. Most all the work of this kind is now done in Newark, N. J., in several large shops, where no questions are asked so long as the bills are paid. When the tools are finished they are brought here and stored with furniture, in order to divert suspicion, in some place where an apartment can be rented by the
