### Owen and the Moa.

Owen had received not a bone, but a piece of a bone six inches long with the ends broken off, and he declared from its shape that it was a thigh bone, and from its structure that it was the bone of a bird very like an ostrich. The material and form were, however, heavier than that in the corresponding limb of the ostrich. "So far as my skill in interpreting bony frag ments may be credited," he said, "I am willing to risk the reputation for it on the statement that there has existed, if there does not now exist, in New Zealand a struthious bird not quite equal in size to an ostrich and of a heavier and bore sluggish

species."

This was in 1839. In 1842 a missionary of "Poverty bay" heard the Maori legends of moa and found some of the bones of the extinct bird, which, in various sizes, is now known as the dinornis. The fulfillment, following. known as the dinorms. The fulfillment, following so quickly on the prophecy, is probably unique in the story of plæontology. It seemed that the professor who had "constructed" a bird from the bone had the master key to the scheme of creation. It does not seem to have occurred to those who were not dazzled by his success in the case of the dinormist point, out that the case of the dinornis to point out that the dinotherium, an extinct mammal with pendent tusks, of which the skull only had then been discovered, was still represented in all popular works as something with the shapeless body of the walrus and lying down (apparently chewing the end) with down (apparently chewing the cud), with its back to the spectator, because no one could reconstruct its body or legs. It must be admitted, however, that Owen's opinion, so far as he gave one, has been borne on by recent discoveries of the creature's bones.—London Spectator.




Cannel Coal and "Jet."



Michigan is another state which is sometimes named as having a general two-cent rate, and its action is added to that of New York in support of the measure in Ohio. This is not less deceptive than the other. Michigan has what is called a graded law—i.e., passenger rates are fixed according to the annual passenger earnings per mile of road on different classes of roads. If a rail-road earns \$3,000 per mile from passengers the rate of fare must not exceed two cents per mile for each passenger; if a road earns less than \$3,000 per mile and more than \$2,000, the rate of fare must not exceed two and one-half cents per mile; if a road earns less than \$2,000 per mile it may charge three cents per mile for each passenger. These rates only apply to roads in the lower peninsula. Railroads in the upper peninsula are allowed to charge one-half cent per mile in addition to the above rates.

While the Michigan law has the mask of fairness it contains the mischief of a movement toward a general reduction of earnings on all the roads, and especially on the weak roads which it pretends to protect. The old strong roads are usually the ones which are paralleled by new, weak roads. With a lower rate on the strong roads the weak, parallel roads will get no traffic to points in common unless they adopt the same rate. If both maintain legal rates—the strong road two cents and the weak roads three or two and one-half—the former will get the traffic and the latter the statutory swmpathy.

The result in Michigan was that the weak roads, which paralleled strong ones, in order to get business were forced to adopt

the rate prevailing on their stronger com-petitors, though this did not happen in many instances.

The immediate effect of such a law is to The immediate effect of such a law is to discriminate against the weak and not against the strong, as was probably intended. The result is to reduce the earnings of all. In this general reduction the strong can stand the blow much better than the weak. The weak roads are too weak now. The tendency of such legislation will be to make the strong stronger and the weak weaker. veak weaker.


