GOING TO THE WORLD'S FAIR

Common Council Will Visit Chicago as a Body on Mayor Kaufman's Invitation.

THE NEW MAYOR SLIPS INTO TOWN VERY UNEXPECTEDLY.

The Aldermen and Band Try to Play Even But Again Mr Kaufman Comes Out Ahead.

THIS MAYOR DOESN'T ABDICATE

Mayor Kaufman, who qualified by taking his oath of office on his arrival in Chicago, slipped into town quietly yesterday morning greatly to the surprise of those who had been planning to give him a little reception on his arrival. Marquette's new mayor became suspicious that something was in the wind from the frequent telegrams which he received asking him to name the day on which he would arrive and accordingly while E. N. Breitung, who was also in Chicago and who was expected to keep the conspirators at this end of the route posted, was at the theatre Wednesday evening the mayor slipped out for home, well satisfied that Ed would not discover his flight until morning when it would be too late to get a message here before the arrival of his train.

The new council was planning to meet the mayor at the train and welcome him home. Failing in this they determined to call on him in a body last evening at his residence. They sent the band up ahead of them and followed soon after. Aldermen Williams and Hoch being the only ones missing, their absence being due to the fact that they were out of the city. The arrival of the band had placed Mayor Kaufman on his guard and when the aldermen arrived the door swung open before them and the mayor stood there ready to welcome them. After mutual congratulations the party assembled in the library where Alderman Pearl was called upon to welcome the mayor-home in behalf of the council. He did so in a very pretty little speech and Mayor Kaufman responded in feeling terms to the cordial welcome given him. Cigars and refreshments were then passed and formality was thrown aside.

During the visit that followed some one remarked that Mr. Kaufman was the World's Fair mayor of Marquette—"and I hereby invite the common council of the city of Marquette to visit the World's Fair with me and I will provide a special car for the trip" quickly responded the new mayor. The offer was accepted on the spot and it was settled then and there that the council should take in the World's Fair and that its members should be the guests of the mayor during their stay in the World's Fair city.

Before the party broke up Mayor Kaufman announced that he expected to call the first meeting of the new council for Saturday evening and that he would be pleased to have the aldermen meet him at his office in the bank building this evening on matters of committee matters—"as to the appointment of officers I will look after that myself. I have been elected mayor and I expect to be mayor" was the significant conclusion of the invitation of Marquette's new chief executive. The aldermen endorsed his position emphatically and pledged him their hearty co-operation in all that he should undertake in behalf of the city and then they left for home enthusiastic over their reception and entertainment.

Look Out for Typhus.

Secretary H. B. Baker of the state board of health has issued the following circular to local health officers:

TO THE HEALTH OFFICERS OF MICHIGAN:—I am informed by the inspector of health for the province of Quebec, that W. J. Cook, an English immigrant from Worthing, Sussex, England, now lying sick with typhus in Montreal civil hospital, embarked at Liverpool March 16 last, on the Allen steamship "Buenos-Ayres," and landed at Halifax March 29. On reaching Montreal, March 30, this immigrant was

brought sick out of the Halifax train, and carried to the Montreal General hospital, where he remained under observation until Saturday, April 1, when his disease was recognized as typhus, and he was removed to the civic hospital.

The United States consul general at Halifax in a letter of April 4, informs me that at Halifax the baggage of immigrants from "Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Great Britain," is not so rigidly disinfected as the baggage of immigrants from other European countries, and we know that at most of the Atlantic ports such baggage does not undergo any disinfection whatever; and, even if we were to admit that typhus is spread only directly from the infected person, the inspection of immigrants from Great Britain may not be so rigid as from Germany or Russia.

As immigrants coming into this country may have been exposed to the disease at the same time this man was, or to this case of typhus, either on the "Buenos-Ayres" or at Halifax or en route by rail to Montreal, this notice is sent to you that you may keep recent immigrants to your locality under surveillance, in order to detect the first symptoms of typhus, should they develop, and isolate the patient before others are exposed to this very dangerous disease.

How to Preserve the Fish.

The Iron Port has been looking up the subject of fish preservation since the outline of the plans of the Michigan Fishermen's association appeared in THE MINING JOURNAL. It says: "Concerning the proposed legislation for the preservation of food fishes our old friend Captain John Lutz and other fishermen of the vicinity are frankly and heartily in favor of the proposition to suspend fishing entirely during the spawning season, the month of November. They hold the artificial propagation carried on by the state a failure and regard the plan proposed by the big fishermen as promising no better results. Leave the fish undisturbed, say they, during the month of November and they will attend to the propagation of their kind—they know how and men do not. If that does not preserve the species nothing can."
