

WORK OF THE COUNCIL.

Ishpeming's Local Lawmakers Held a Business Session Last Evening.

A MINER MEETS DEATH AT THE SALISBURY.

Injured by a Blast—The A. O. U. W. Ball Tonight—Millinery for the Million.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

A regular meeting of the common council was held last evening with Mayor Osborn in the chair and Aldermen Routhier, Losselyong, Johnston, Rood, Olson, McNamara, Swanson, Hayes, Sterling, Persons, Jenkins, Storey, Nolan, Verran and Adolph in their seats.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The mayor announced the standing committees, which are as follows:

Finance—G. R. Persons, W. H. Johnston, W. H. Rood.

Claims and accounts—H. F. Heyn, J. S. Olson, C. Hayes.

Building, grounds and insurance—H. Routhier, J. Storey, J. Lindberg.

Fire—W. H. Rood, W. Verran, H. F. Heyn.

Streets and alleys—The Mayor, A. Beerling, H. F. Heyn.

City lighting—A. Beerling, W. Sterling, P. Adolph.

A petition signed by John Nolan and others asking that a flagman be stationed at the Second and Lake street railroad crossings was read and referred to the proper committee.

A petition signed by J. H. Williams and others asking that an arc lamp be placed on Park street was read and referred.

A petition signed by P. J. Denn and others asking that an arc lamp be placed at the corner of Pearl and Third streets, or at the corner of Pearl and Fourth streets, was read and also referred.

Bills against the city were read and referred to the committee on claims and accounts. Alderman Johnston moved the payment of the street commissioner's payroll; the library and sewerage bills, and a bill from Benjamin Williams. The motion found support and was carried.

A communication, signed by Samuel Redfern, superintendent of lands for the Iron Cliffs company, notifying the city that the ground used as a dumping ground by the residents of Ishpeming could no longer be used for that purpose, as the land hereafter would be utilized for farming. Mayor Osborn then stated that he had conferred with the board of public works with reference to securing a suitable place for a dumping ground and that they, the board, had thought of loading the garbage on cars at the old Barnum mine siding and having it taken to a place along the railroad track, going west, a sufficient distance from the city. He recommended that the matter be further looked into by the council.

The finance committee was given further time to report on the petition of Mrs. Swanson.

Kennedy sureties; G. Olson, principal, M. Peterson and Alex. Nelson sureties; G. Carlson principal, O. Hallgren and J. L. Carlson sureties; Hyppa & Maki, principals, M. Richards and J. Heard sureties; H. Anderson, principal and M. Peterson sureties, Boudy & Hassenger, principals, S. Blumentahl and T. Hughes sureties; J. J. Voelker, principal, H. Jaedecke and M. Peterson sureties; M. Peterson, principal, J. J. Voelker and G. Olson sureties; T. Coony, principal, James Kenny and P. McGrath sureties.

The bonds of Deputy Marshal Nolan, City Treasurer J. H. Lawery and ten constables were read and referred to the committee on bonds.

The report of the committee on health and the health officer regarding the condition of the land with reference to sewer construction in sewer district No. 1, was presented by Health Officer Barnett. The committee recommended that three and a half blocks on Ridge and Bank streets, which are on high ground, be excluded from the district. A number of citizens were present and offered protests against the report. The matter was quite freely discussed by the members of the council and citizens when a motion prevailed to meet again Saturday evening at 7:30 o'clock to definitely settle the question.

Alderman Routhier moved that the council look over the district in a body this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock for the purpose of ascertaining its actual condition so that the question might be intelligently voted upon at Saturday night's meeting. The motion prevailed and the council adjourned.

A Bad Fatality

Yesterday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock Richard Pryor, a miner working at the Salisbury, was instantly killed. He was at work in a shaft when a piece of rock fell from the back and struck him on the head, breaking his skull.

The contract on the street will be completed some time before the contracted time, June 1.

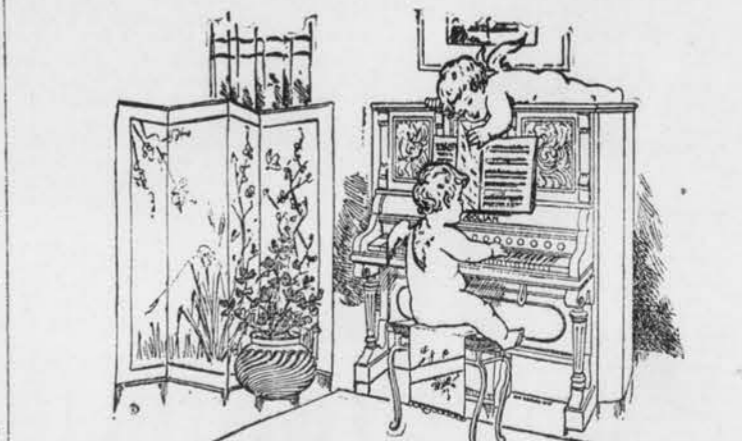

Unlike the pipe organ, however, the Aeolian is adapted to all classes of music; overtures and symphonies can be rendered on it with all the softness and delicacy of the flute and violin and cello and all the snap and brilliancy of the piano.
