





The right of property might include in most cases the right to destroy but thousands of laws existed to preserve to humanity the use of the product of certain kinds of property. Why did Great Britain occupy Egypt today? What grounds had she for holding dominion over those prove Egyptian? Was it over those poor Egyptians? Was it merely because they were impoverished and undefended? No. it was because Egypt lay along the pathway of Great Britain's mighty commerce with the east. If the Egyptian government was unable to assure to Great Britain the safety of those pathways Great Britain was justified in her interference.

Baron de Courcelles—You seem to take a very high view of the subject. You anticipate the verdict of history. Senator Morgan (to Mr. Carter)—If this tribunal decides that the United States does not own the seals ought the United States repeal all laws concern-ing sea life in Bering sea? Mr. Carter—I think not; but the

question is unimportant as in the event of such decision there would be no seals. Permission of pelanic sealing means the extermination of seal life. The court then adjourned.


