Through a misunderstanding *The Mining Journal*, in giving the location of the new fire alarm telegraph boxes and the directions for their use, stated that the keys would be found at the nearest adjoining residences, the method employed with the old style boxes. This is a mistake as far as Marquette's new system is concerned, the key being kept in the small box which protects the keyhole. To turn in an alarm break the small glass, take the key and unlock the large door and then pull down on the hook or lever once.

**Death of Judge Hardy.**  
From a letter received by parties in this city from Mrs. Ada Merritt, daughter of Captain Edward S. Hardy, for several years judge of probate of this county, it is learned that the judge died of dropsy at North Paris, Maine, on the 14th inst. The disease manifested itself first about six months ago and the letter stated that the old gentleman suffered very much during the past winter, being unable to lie down to sleep. The captain will be remembered by many of the residents of Marquette and of the county and through his official position he was well known throughout this section of the peninsula.

**Kil's Remarkable Feat.**  
Marquette's ex-baseball umpire has just succeeded in a feat which no other man has ever dared to attempt, the west steps of the capitol having never been tried while Smith's ride down the east steps has been the marvel of wheelmen ever since it was made. Kil, during the skating craze, was famous all through the country as the greatest one-legged trick and fancy skater and he seems destined to equal pre-eminence on the wheel. *The Chicago Tribune* gives this account of his wonderful ride:

Charles G. Kilpatrick, the one-legged bicyclist from Illinois, rode down the west steps of the capitol building yesterday afternoon. There are eighty steps down which the bicyclist rode, the distance being about 100 feet, with a clear descent of about 20 feet. Only once before has this journey been attempted and accomplished, and that was by Rex Smith, one of the nerviest riders attached to the capitol bicycle club of this city. Before attempting his hazardous journey Kilpatrick took out a life and accident insurance policy which he mailed to his mother. This precaution, however, was needless, for he made the descent without a jar or a hitch. "I came near backing out at first, however," he said, "for I felt that it might result in a broken limb, or the loss of my life. It would be pretty tough to lose my other leg, but I had laid a wager that I could ride the steps and had invited my friends to see me do it. My heart was beating like a trip hammer, but I shot down the steps like I was shot out of a gun. I did not know I was down until I heard the crowd cheering me from the top. It was a dangerous ride, but I accomplished an act which no wheelman has ever had the nerve to attempt on the west side. Rex Smith made his ride on the east front of the capitol."

Kilpatrick, who is the only one-legged trick rider in the world, belongs to Danville, Ill., where he lost his right leg in a railroad accident nearly ten years ago. He has been riding "the wheel" only about a year.

**A New Town Hall.**  
Marquette township has let the contract for the building of a town hall to W. McCombie. The building will be 26x38 feet in ground dimensions and the main hall will be arranged to accommodate dancing parties from the city or vicinity, a fine hard wood floor being put in. The contract cost of the building will be \$1,008. The committee in charge of its construction is as follows: Henry Boesler, Victor Cox, D. B. McCombie and Wm. Woolner. The material will be furnished by Bice & Sons of this city.

**Pete Baker Coming.**  
Upon being complimented on the stage Saturday evening "as a first-rate German," the German dialect comedian of the "Uncle Josh Spruceby" company remarked "You tink so?" Shust vait untdil you see 'Pete' Baker." Many in the audience understood the force of his compliment for "Pete" Baker has been known for many years as one of the foremost German dialect comedians of the country, now easily the first, and "Chris and Lena" is as well known as his own name.

Mr. Baker will appear in the Marquette Opera House for the first time on Saturday evening and will fill the house to its capacity if he is received in accordance with his merit. He is again playing "Chris and Lena" and the *Pittsburg Post* says of the revival: "An old friend of Pittsburgh theatre-goers was seen at the Bijou theatre last evening somewhat disguised by the new dress and new surroundings. Pete Baker's name is inseparably connected with 'Chris and Lena,' and he made no mistake when he decided to revive it this season. There was a good Monday night audience. The story of the play is well known. The great feature is, of course, the singing of Mr. Baker and other members of the company. Mr. Baker's voice does not change very much, although he has been using it on the stage for these many years. He sang last night some of the old favorites, as well as some new songs he will make favorites. He and Billy Kennedy, who does an Irish part to perfection, gave the old military burlesque, 'The Muldoon Guards.' Miss Martha George was Lena, and she gave the part very well, and her voice was shown to good advantage. Four-year-old 'Little Casino,' Luella Shirely, sang and danced in a way that brought down the house. She is a little star."

**Largest Steamer on the Lakes.**  
S. S. Curry is the name selected for the steel steamship to be launched from the yard of F. W. Wheeler & Co., West Bay City, Mich., on Tuesday next for the Hawgood and Avery Transit company of Cleveland. The name is taken in honor of Captain S. S. Curry, presi-

dent of the Metropolitan Iron and Land company, and the leading spirit in the management of the Norrie mine, owned by that company. The mine is the largest iron ore producing property in the world and the steamer, which is to engage mainly in the ore trade, is by great odds the largest vessel as yet built on the lakes. Captain Curry, who will have an interest in this steamer, is not as well known among vessel owners as he is to the owners and managers of iron mines in the Lake Superior region. He was among the early prospectors on the Michigan iron ranges, when the Lake Superior country was little better than a wilderness, and had earned the success that came to him in the big Norrie mine upon the discovery of the Gogebic range. Under his management the Norrie group, including the Pabst controlled by the same company, has produced, in the eight years since shipments were begun in 1885, 4,716,108 gross tons of ore, the output reaching 1,057,788 tons in 1890 and 1,098,461 tons in 1892.

The steamer is of the same dimensions as Wheeler & Co.'s Centurion, upon which construction was begun last month and for which a syndicate of owners, headed by Mark Hopkins of St. Clair, Mich., and Captain John Mitchell of Cleveland have agreed to pay \$265,000. Neither owners or builders are making any predictions as to the carrying capacity of this very big vessel, but it is probable that on a Sault canal draft of 14 feet, 6 inches, she will carry from Lake Superior, where all large craft are limited in cargo, 3,400 gross tons, and that if given 17 feet of water, as was the case with the Maritana last season, when the boat took 4,771 net tons from Escanaba to South Chicago, she would move 5,000 net tons without difficulty. A most important feature in her construction, aside from the location of engines in the center, is the extent of water ballast capacity, through which it is probable that the vessel when running without cargo may be made to draw 9 feet forward and 15 feet aft.

The principal dimensions of the S. S. Curry are: Length over all, 378 feet 6 inches; length of level, 360 feet; breadth, extreme, 45 feet 2 1/2 inches; breadth, moulded, 45 feet; depth, moulded, 26 feet. For water ballast she has a cellular double bottom differing from the ordinary floor system in lake practice. The bottom extends fore and aft and is 54 inches deep with a capacity of 1,600 tons. The departure from lake practice in placing the engines amidships will be watched with interest, as regards effect on cargo space and other results. The ease with which she will be handled in harbors will also be considered by vessel owners.—*Marine Review.*

**U. S. Courts Adjourned.**  
Deputy United States Marshal Dolf has received orders from Judge Severens to adjourn the May term of the United States courts here which should by law begin Tuesday, May 2, to Tuesday, July 11, at 2 p. m. Grand and petit jurors will be notified to be present July 11.

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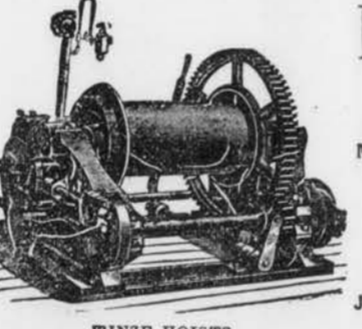
