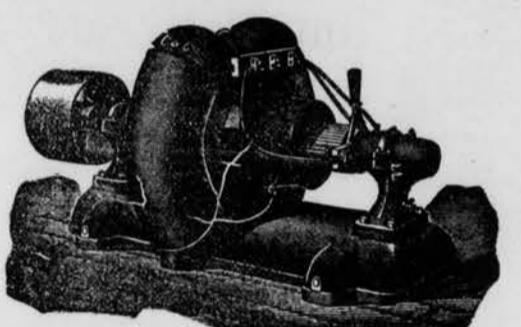

STAGE ACCIDENTS. PERILS FROM THE CARELESS USE OF PROPERTY WEAPONS.

Few Fatalities, but Many Very Narrow Escapes—The Greatest Danger is From the Inexperienced "Supers" Who Fail to Follow Instructions.

The tragic ending of the charade in which young McCoy lost his life from an accidental dagger wound in the heart, inflicted by Miss Clara King, was the subject of general comment among actors.

M. A. Kennedy, the veteran comedian, said that the tragedy could not have come to pass had the amateurs known a few stage tricks.

"Real daggers are never used by the profession," said he, "though to the spectators in the orchestra chairs the blades that clash in Caesar's body seem very real."

What is commonly used is the property dagger, the blade of which is controlled by a spring and runs up the handle when the point is struck against the body of the stage victim.

"So much care is taken to exclude the edged tools from the mimic warfare of the stage," continued Mr. Kennedy, "that the use of the pointed darts is almost a concern."

"I bear a vivid recollection of having my countenance filled with powder and burning wads when I was playing with Lucille Western in 1892 at the old National theater in Washington."

"Do I know of any cases where actors have been cut or shot on the stage?" said Charles Dickson as he put the finishing touches on his costume yesterday just before the matinee curtain rang up.

"Then there was Bob Hilliard's adventure. Hilliard was playing in a military piece called 'Across the Potomac.' There was a militia detachment on the stage to do firing and in one of the scrimmages Hilliard got a full charge of powder and wad in the right side of the face.

"I remember the case of an actor whose name I don't remember now, but who starred in the 'besian piece.' It was a requirement of his part to be shot by a squad of soldiers. The troops were made up of the usual assortment of rifle, and one of them took fair aim at the actor when the time came for the volley.

"The minute the curtain came down the star let loose a blast of profanity that caused the paper to wither on the wall, and then he fired himself at the supe like a 10-inch shell. For about three minutes one would have supposed that a Dublin insurrection was in full swing.

"During his long theatrical career L. R. Stockwell has had various experiences with the stage assassin, one of which retired him from duty for several weeks."

"At another time Mr. Stockwell was shot and driven off the stage by a crazy supernumerary. He was shot by Donald McKay, the half-breed chief of the Warm Spring Indians, who had been induced to take a box at the performance of a piece based on the Modoc war, leaped on the stage and started in on a private scalping exhibition of his own."

In 1891, when Dan and Bandmann was playing Hamlet at the Theatre Royal in Melbourne, he inflicted a serious wound upon Adelaide Bowering, who was cast for the Queen. It was in the act where Hamlet makes his fatal thrust at Polonius. In some way the button had come off the point of his foil after Polonius had been disposed of, and he made a vicious lunge into the Queen, sending four inches of steel into her thigh.

THE DEEDS RECORDED.

W. O. Butler Transfers His Purchase to His Principal, Frederick F. Ayer of Lowell, Mass.

THE NINETEEN DEEDS RECORDED BY REGISTER YESTERDAY.

The Transfer Alleged to Have No Special Significance at the Present Time—Other City Notes.

A GOOD SIZED COUNTY.

Yesterday nineteen deeds were recorded at the office of the county clerk which fully establish the identity of the capitalist back of the famous "Butler purchase," all but two of the deeds reading from William O. Butler to Frederick F. Ayer of Lowell, Mass., the other two being from John M. Longyear to Frederick F. Ayer. The deeds convey 10,600 acres of land and represent an investment of considerably over \$150,000.

The purchase includes Partridge island and two miles of lake front back of the island, giving absolute control of the natural harbor there. It also includes all the great water powers on Dead river with the exception of those owned by the city of Marquette, the purchase including the land on both sides of the river from the Lake Superior Powder company's property up to Sec. 14 in 48-26, or above the great falls, with the exception only of the ten forties owned by the city of Marquette at Collinsville. In other words Mr. Ayer is given absolute control of Dead river for about six miles, the distance including water powers of enormous horse power.

The deal includes the Biedinger forty west of the North Marquette addition, the northwest quarter of Sec. 15 in this town and the southwest quarter of the northeast quarter in the same section (lands west and south of the old driving park), the west tier of forties in Sec. 10 and the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter (Sec. 10 is the powder mill section), the northwest quarter of Sec. 3 (the shore back of Partridge island), all of Sec. 4, the north half of Sec. 9 and the east half of the southeast quarter, all of Sec. 8 except the southwest quarter (being all of Sec. 8 and 9 except the city's ten forties), the west half of Sec. 5, all of Sec. 32 in the town above except the northwest forty and all of fractional 33, all of sections 6 and 7, the west half of the southwest quarter of 17, about nine forties in 18, the north half of the south half of 19, all of Sec. 24 in the town west except the south half of the southeast quarter, nine forties in Sec. 13 and a number of other pieces in this town.

Mr. Butler has been industriously engaged for over a year in gobbling this property piece by piece and the fact that it is finally transferred in a solid block to Mr. Ayer would indicate that the end had been reached and that all the lands wanted had been secured. While it is stated that the transfer has no special significance at this time still it has all along been expected that the first step taken towards carrying out the purposes of the purchaser would be the recording of the deeds conveying the property to him from his agent, Mr. Butler.

As the land included in the Ayer purchase is not valuable for either timber or mineral it is self-evident that it was bought with a well defined object in view and that immediate steps will be taken to make improvements which will give it value. It is the general impression that the coke iron industry will be one of the factors in the development of the tract and that an iron and steel plant will also be put in. Certainly the property was not gathered in to be permitted to lie out of doors until it should become valuable through the natural growth of the city. A new town site is undoubtedly contemplated but as every move made will be directly to Marquette's advantage the new town cannot be started any too soon. It was hoped that the lawsuit between Mr. Butler and the Iron-Cliffs company, which has so long delayed matters connected with the big deal, would be decided by the supreme court at this session but no decision was handed down yesterday. The case was argued April 4.

Janaschek Tonight.

The demand for light amusement has become so great that the number of legitimate actors is growing smaller and smaller every season. Among the few that are left is Madame Janaschek, who has for years devoted herself to the old school for the legitimate. Some of the characters played by Janaschek in by-gone days are in Don Carlos, Iphigenia, Medea and Brunhilde. Her repertoire for the season includes Meg Merrilies, Deborah, Macbeth, Marie Stuart and Bleak House. Her performances tonight and tomorrow night at the opera house will be a treat to devotees of tragic art in this city. Janaschek is supported this season by Mr. Edward Collier, and the company in general has been receiving the highest praise from the critics all season. She will present "Macbeth" tonight and the Earl of "Essex" tomorrow night.

The City Hall Loan.

Among those who have carefully considered the city hall project as formulated by the mayor and common council there is but one expression of opinion and that is that not a vote should be cast against the loan. Marquette's city government is now without a home as it is occupying the old city building simply through sufferance, the building belonging to Han. Peter White who gave in exchange for it the city library property on Washington street. The expenditure of \$30,000 in the construction of a city building this season would give the building trades here a good gift and in that way help business generally while it should show to the world at large that Marquette is all right and that her bonds can be floated at par even in the present stringent

money market for it is generally understood that there will be no trouble about placing the bonds not a thousand miles from home if the people vote in favor of issuing them. At 5 per cent. the annual interest charge would be \$2,500 while at the end of the ten years for which the bonds would run a sinking fund could be ready, accumulated through a small addition to the tax roll each year, which would completely wipe out the issue if it was so desired. As the city will soon be forced to pay a good big rental for suitable quarters for its common council meetings and its recorder's office and as it is already paying rent for its controller's office the annual interest charge would not greatly exceed the expenditures for rent and even if the city rented quarters for years the day is still coming when it will have to build. For this reason, if for no other, it would appear that the time to build is now, before any considerable sum has been wasted in rents.

Look Out for Fire.

A good deal of timber has been thrown down on Presque Isle by the wind since last season and there is now greater danger from fire there than for many years and all persons visiting the park should make it a point to exercise great care as a small spark might start a blaze which would rob Marquette's famous park of its great glory, its natural forest growth. Smokers should be especially careful as a burning match thrown down carelessly or a cigar or cigarette stub might easily at the present time start a fire which hundreds of men could not control. Let every person visiting the park bear this in mind and take all possible precautions against starting a fire there.

The Annual Pilgrimage.

On June 21 the Duluth, South Shore & Atlantic will run a special train through Canada on the annual pilgrimage to the shrine of St. Anne de Beaupre, a stop being made in Montreal to enable the party to take in the grand celebration of the St. Jean Baptiste societies on June 24. The fare for the round trip will be only \$25, the tickets being good for return until July 1. For \$10 extra, or \$35 for the round trip, the members of the party can return home by way of Chicago, taking in the World's Fair.
