

Minister Blount Sits Down Hard SIR CHARLES RUSSELL STOPS. Judge Jenkins' Pointed Questions to English Counsel Concludes His Argu-

Paris, May 31.—Sir Charles Russell concluded his argument in behalf of the British case before the Bering sea tribunal of arbitration at fifty minutes past 12 today. He said that this was the first occasion upon which a nation had claimed property in a free swim-ming animal. The contention, he de-clared, was untenable and its advance was derogatory to the freedom of the seas. It was an extravagant and un-founded pretension that international laws sanctioned the seizure and condem-nation of the vessels of a friendly pow-

PERILS FROM THE CARELESS USE OF PROPERTY WEAPONS.

ew Fatalities, but Many Very Nacrow Escapes—The Greatest Danger Is From the Inexperienced "Supers" Who Fail to Follow Instructions.

The tragic ending of the charade in which young McCoy lost his life from an accidental dagger wound in the heart, inflicted by Miss Clara King; was the subject of general comment among actor.

M. A. Kennedy, the veteran comedian, said that the tragedy could not have come to pass had the amateurs known a few stage tricks. "Real daggers are never used by the profession," said he, "though to the spectators in the orchestra chairs the blades that clash in Cæsar's body seem very real. What is commonly used is the property dagger, the blade of which is controlled by a spring and runs up the handle when the point is struck against the body of the stage victim. Sometimes a dagger with a cast iron blade and a blunt end is employed, but the spring dagger is the most satisfactory.

"So much care is taken to exclude edged tools from the mimic warfare of the stage," continued Mr. Kennedy, "that the use of the poinard gives us small concern. What we really dread is the musket in the hands of an excited actor or a careless supe.' I bear a vivid recollection of having my countenance filled with powder and burning wards, when I was playing with Lucille. bear a vivid recollection of having my countenance filled with powder and burning wads when I was playing with Lucille Western in 1862 at the old National theater in Washington. 
