





REVOLUTION PETERING OUT.

The department of state has been in-The department of state has been informed that the leaders of the Honduras revolutionists have all left the country with the exception of Gen. Terancio Sirva, who with a band of 150 men is still in the depart of Pariso, near the Nicaraguan boarder. General Sirva changes his position almost daily and hides himself in the mountainforces. his position almost daily and hides himself in the mountain fastnesses so that it is very difficult for the government forces to attack them. However, it is looked upon as only a matter of a few days until his men also will be dispersed as have the men of the other leaders. Both Policarpo and Manuel Bonilla have been wounded—the former having had his arm amputated and is reported to have gangrene. Some of the leaders are in Nicaragua and others in Guatemala. Unless some new and unexpected developments happen the present revolution in Honduras is at an end. All the departments are now in end. All the departments are now in the hands of the government and mail and telegraphic communications are be-ing established as rapidly as possible. The constitution of the government at the capital has not been changed.

To learn on irresistible evidence that we scarcely ever open our mouths without uttering an absurdity of construction is to be made wise and wretched at the same time. Reform seems hopeless, the wretchedness abides, and we look around for a victim, unconscious that perhaps Anglophil is the very person we invite to aid us in our search.

The same thing may be said of an equally fine effect of score. "How haughtily he complained of the wine being corked" [that the wine was corked], if you please. "Mary was occupied with her work, and the painter and his model with each other" [were engressed with each other]. And just as the author seemed settling down to business—we do not like Anglophil: "The policeman is great friends with the cook" [The policeman and the cook are great friends]. Age fares no better at his hands than youth: "I refuse even to allow his visits to the house, much less give him my daughter" [much more].

This spirit of destructive criticism invades every part of life. It is not enough to forbid us to read; we must not spea... At every turn we are tripped up in the simplest colloquialisms that have become household words. Let no man henceforth say "it don't signify," and think there is an end of the matter. It does signify very much, if you use the verb in the plural. "It does not signify," is the absolutely correct, mealy mouthed form. Who would not echo the complaint given in one of the examples, "Looking into things don't help me." It is a cry of despair, yet the author can not let it pass. "Does not help me" is the right way.




