"These be perilous times" for enterprises that are being run on wind, or are carried by banks on the credit of persons connected with them. There is a general balancing up going on throughout the land which involves a close study of securities, and as a consequence concerns that are not intrinsically sound are going to the wall every day.

IT BEGINS to be pretty well understood that the primary cause of the obstinate depression existing in the iron and steel trade arises from the fact that we are producing in excess of the normal consumptive capacity of the country. This is the cause of the slack demand and low prices.

"IT WOULD SEEM," remarks The Age of Steel, "that the cost of mining is about at its lowest notch, and that any further reduction in the price of ore must be met in other directions. It has been suggested, and with some show of reason, that the escape lies in minimizing royalties and in the reduction of railroad charges from the mines to shipping ports."

SECRETARY THOMPSON of the Duluth Chamber of Commerce has furnished for publication a lengthy report covering the work of the chamber for the past three years, in the course of which he endeavors to establish that the organization has been a potent factor in the work of advancing Duluth's interest during that period.

Now we would not detract from the credit due the chamber and the secretary in that work in the least. But the secretary overestimates the work done. It was to be hoped that the deep waterways convention at Washington last winter, which was a good deal of a fiasco, would have been left unmentioned.

TO IMPROVE PRESQUE ISLE

Definite Plans, Prepared by an Acknowledged Authority, Are Sorely Needed.

LET THIS COUNCIL, HAVE SUCH PLANS PREPARED.

Succeeding Councils Can Then Work Intelligently, Result Being a Park Famous Throughout the Land.

BEGIN AT THE BEGINNING.

The plan proposed at Monday evening's council meeting of blocking Presque Isle off into acreage for its improvement by individuals does not meet with favor from the people, nor should it, as it appears to THE MINING JOURNAL. Work done upon Presque Isle, unless it be done in pursuance of some well defined plan for the improvement of the great park as a whole is work thrown away and might easily be work worse than thrown away.

It is entirely proper that there should be picnic grounds, recreation grounds and breathing places on Presque Isle but they should only be created in pursuance of some well defined plan. The city has already had an illustration of indiscriminate hacking and burning and all can see how easily money can be made to disappear in work which does very little to fit the park for the purposes for which it is intended.

A mistake now is a mistake for all time and THE MINING JOURNAL believes that the council of 1893 can secure no higher honor for itself nor create any stronger claim for the gratitude of the public in the years to come than by having Presque Isle surveyed and a plan prepared for its systematic improvement. The proper man to undertake the work is the best landscape authority in the United States, whom ever he may be, and THE MINING JOURNAL believes that none is reputed greater than Frederick L. Olmsted of Boston, who laid out the grounds about Hon. J. M. Longyear's new residence and who has done so much to make the World's Fair grounds at Chicago, the surroundings and settings of the famous "White City," a wonder for the whole world.

Let the council decide that whatever sum it plans to expend on Presque Isle this year shall be utilized in securing Mr. Olmsted's services in the preparation of a broad and comprehensive plan of improvement for the great park on lines which will not destroy but rather accentuate its natural beauties and the people will declare that the money has been expended to good purpose. With such a plan once prepared the city can go ahead as it did in the construction of its sewer system where it paid Mr. Davis \$1,000 for drawing plans and then in a year or two began to build one or two sections at a time in accordance with those plans. The Davis plans are still quoted in every Marquette sewer ordinance, so let a general plan be adopted for Presque Isle and then systematically followed out, something being done each year until the great end is accomplished. Then the city will have a park which will be famous throughout the United States for nowhere are there greater possibilities than at Presque Isle—but let each succeeding administration go ahead and hack and hew, clear and grade as it sees fit and we will have a hodge-podge of which everyone would be ashamed and for which Marquette by every man who is at all acquainted with what a great natural park should be for as no two men think alike so no two administrations would be apt to follow out the same plan of improvement. What is needed is a plan, and none but the best of course is wanted. With that plan provided we can go to work intelligently and year by year do something towards its complete realization. Let the "World's Fair council" gather additional laurels by doing for Presque Isle what a former council did for Marquette's sewer system.

Broad Tires Needed.

If there is an ordinance prescribing the width of tire to be used in hauling heavy materials over the streets of the city the officers should see that it is rigorously enforced. If there is no such ordinance the council should pass one immediately. The teams hauling rock on North Front street are cutting that street all to pieces between Ohio and Arch streets and it will soon be in as bad shape as Spruce street over which so much heavy teaming has been done. The question is becoming a serious one as it keeps the street commissioner busy now patching up streets injured in this way, thereby causing the city a great deal of unnecessary expense.

A Splendid Warehouse.

The Manhard-Jopling company, limited, successor to the Manhard Hardware company, limited, and A. O. Jopling & Co., has succeeded in leasing from Hon. J. M. Longyear the big two-story stone building on Main street, occupied by the Hager & Johnson Manufacturing company before the fire. As this has a railroad track in the rear and plenty of shed room outside, it is admirably well adapted to the needs of the company.

John R. Franz Cumpson, the young singing dialect comedian, is a remarkable success for so young a man and undoubtedly has a splendid future ahead of him in his profession. He is as charming off the stage as on it and his magnificent voice endears him to audiences everywhere. The house at the opera house last night was very poor but in spite of the presence of a choice collection of Job's comforters upon his neck, making it very hard for him to appear at all, Mr. Cumpson went

through with his full program and insisted upon the members of his company working as hard and faithfully as if the house had been packed from pit to dome and the fact was thoroughly appreciated by those present in the audience.

The little people in his company are very good, the little boy, who seems hardly old enough to walk, being an especial favorite.

"The Merry Cobbler" goes to Ishpeming from here and THE MINING JOURNAL hopes that it will receive a hearty welcome there as the entertainment is perfectly clean, the singing especially good and the whole attraction as much of a favorite with the children as with adults.

For July Fourth.

As the Fourth of July is rapidly approaching it is entirely proper that the people of Marquette should begin figuring once on the manner in which the day is to be observed here. As Marquette does not intend to have a formal celebration this year it seems to THE MINING JOURNAL that the city could not do better than to do its part to carry out the plan outlined in the following press dispatch sent out from New York:

Miss Mary Desha, representing the Daughters of the American Revolution on the Columbian Liberty Bell committee, has addressed a letter from Washington to the managers of the World's exhibition at Chicago urging that the 4th of July next shall be made particularly "Liberty Bell day," the honors being divided between the old Liberty Bell and the Columbian Liberty Bell, that will be rung for the first time that day. She urges also that not only the sons and daughters of the American revolution, but all other patriotic societies shall join that day in having an old-fashioned Fourth of July, calling the event particularly "Liberty Bell day." She urges that when the Columbian Liberty Bell shall ring at Chicago that day, that the bells all over the land shall take up the refrain from Maine to San Diego, and from Key West to Puget Sound. Her thought is that the bells throughout the country shall not ring at 12 noon at the time of day with them, but at the time it is 12 o'clock noon in Chicago, so that all the bells throughout the land will be ringing at the same moment.
