Accompanying the princess is the royal party, preceded by a mounted platoon of South Park police and the Chicago Hussars. They will enter the west entrance of the Midway Plaisance at 11:45 a. m.

ALL DOUBT as to whether President Cleveland will convene congress in special session has been removed by his straightforward declaration that he so intends. It is well. The country needs some financial legislation quite badly.

THE RUB on the Chicago banks did good instead of harm, as it established that depositors need have no fear of their soundness, and also that there is no tangible cause for the sense of apprehension which impelled people to put the strength and solvency of these institutions to the test. Now that the Chicago people have satisfied themselves that the banks of that city are all right they will feel less doubtful concerning the future of the country generally, and the return of confidence there will lead to its restoration generally throughout the northwest. The business interests of the country are suffering because of an unfounded fear and until that is removed we will continue to experience dull times.

THE WAGE committee of the Amalgamated association of iron and steel workers, appointed to formulate a scale of wages for the year beginning July 1st, has made its report and the scale is now to be considered by representatives of that association and the Manufacturers' association in conference. The latter association is inclined to insist on a material reduction in the scale for the ensuing year, and the men are disposed to resist a cut, their claim being that the scale is as low as they can make it in justice to themselves, so that an agreement is not likely to be reached without considerable contention, and may not be at all. It is thought, however, that an adjustment will be reached this year without a strike or shut-down, as both the men and their employers have fresh in mind the disastrous results of their failure to agree last year.

WE FEEL that the Milwaukee judge who directed the grand jury in session there to investigate the Lappen & Co. failure and also the Plankinton bank collapse with a view to ascertaining if there was criminal violation of the law in either, or both, of these cases, understands his duty and has the courage to discharge it. It is more than likely that Lappen & Co. can be held for obtaining credit and advances by making false statements of the condition and resources of their concern, while the bank officials disregarded a plain provision of the statutes if they received deposits when they knew their bank to be insolvent. It would do a vast amount of good if a few examples were made of offenders of this kind, for it would have a tendency to put a stop to Napoleonic speculation schemes which have as their object plundering the public by practicing on popular credulity.

HERE'S a suggestion, taken from the Lansing Journal, for those concerned to chew on:

We notice from a telegram sent from Washington by Samuel Robinson to the editor of the Marquette Times, and printed in that paper, that he signed himself as "Member Democratic State Executive Committee." As it is well known that Mr. Robinson has been putting in the most of his time at Washington decrying Don M. Dickinson, the above dispatch shows that he has been doing so at the authorized representative of the state central committee. It would seem that the latter body owes it to the Democracy of the state, who deeply resent this cowardly tabling of Mr. Dickinson, to take prompt official action either recalling Mr. Robinson or disavowing his contemptible conduct. This same "Sam Robinson" is a pitiful creature and has made himself the laughing stock of Washington during his protracted but inglorious stay there. The Lansing Journal correctly states what he occupied himself mostly in doing while he hung around the hotels in Washington.

THE Grand Army Gazette says, ancient pension reform and the way to accomplish it:

What is asked for—aye, demanded—is that the pension list shall be minutely examined. No honest pensioner will resist that; he will not be considered so if he does. Then let every dishonest case, if such be found, be wiped from the rolls. This is only fair and right to the people of the land, the people who pay taxes. Let the rolls be printed and distributed where the names can be seen. Let the cause of the granting of the pension, for wounds or other disabilities, be affixed to the names, and the amount paid by the government—for this is a government matter, not personal—and then let the people who know of fraud or irregularities tell the story. Where fraud is charged let examination take place, under proper auspices, so that personal spleen shall not prevail or injustice be done to the charge. Give every benefit of counsel, but examine. Further, though again costly, let the biennial examinations be revived. Pensioners who should be pensioners would always remain untouched, but the recovered, the able, would be weeded out, and the pension moneys paid would be paid only to those who were entitled to them under this examination.

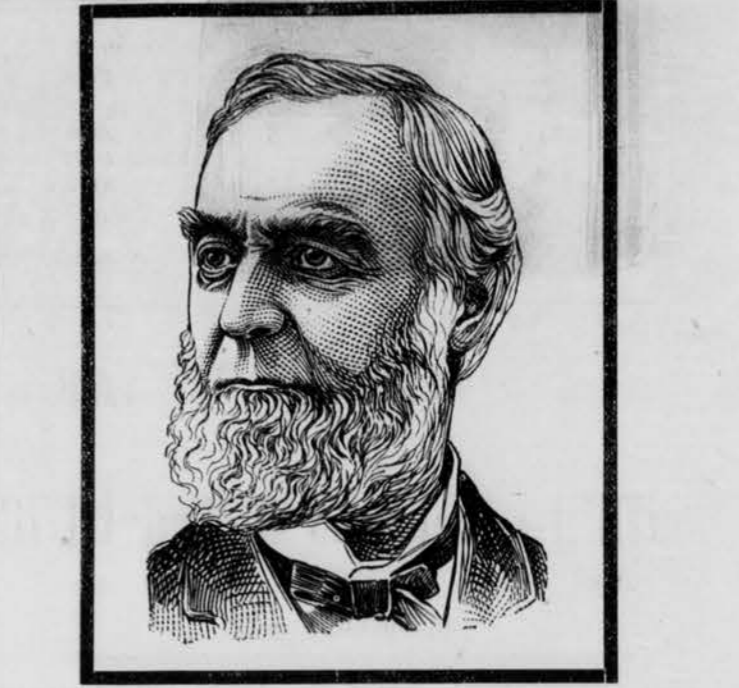

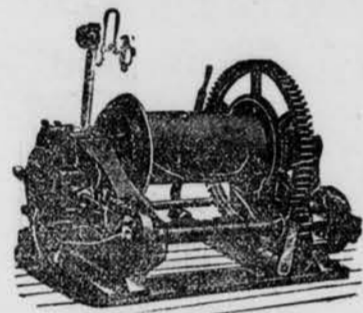

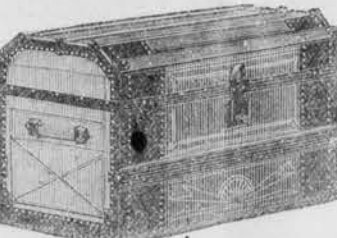
