There is no one Instrument, unless, indeed, it be a large pipe organ, capable variety of effects that are obtainable on the Aeolian. Unlike the pipe organ, hot the Aeolian is adapted to all classes of music; overtures and symphonies can be eved on it with all the softness and delicacy of the flute and violin and collo and a saap and-brilliancy of the plane.
