A HYPNOTIC IMPOSTER.

An Englishman Who Could Do Many Things

The subject who came to me had been a shining light in the profession, and I have reason to know that he was exceptionally gifted. He had performed to crowded houses under several great artists at the Aquarium, and elsewhere in London and the provinces. He had figured at select seances of scientific hypnotists. He had been privately operated on by medical men anxiously seeking after truth. And, by his own statement, he had humbugged them all. What proof had I, then, that he was not humbugging me? Ample proof. He offered, in the first place, to do under my direction everything which he had done in public and private seances when under supposed hypnotic control. I contemplated, in the first instance, accepting this offer and giving a demonstration to a select circle, and it was solely owing to provided ourselves with harpoons, with plenty of rope attached. "You can learn to do it with practice, like the rest of the tricks." But we always bring the stuff up after the performance."

He also expressed his readiness to drink oil. Among novel tricks which he offered to perform was that of "slow ing" the pulse while under hypnotic influence. Of this he claimed to be the original inventor. I asked him whether all the "subjects" were equal imposters. "All," he said. He knew them all per-sonally and would answer for them. Dated Nearly a Century Before the Earliest Record of Watchmaking.

Sam Longabaugh of Empire has in his possession probably one of the most valuable relice in the shape of a watch and bearing the name of "Joseph Davis, London, 1221." The genuineness of the article is unquestioned, and its great value lies in the fact that the earliest record of a pocket timepiece is 1494 and is Swiss.

The Davis watch has been an heirleon of

liest record of a pocket timepiece is 1494 and is Swiss.

The Davis watch has been an heirloom of the Swan family for nearly 200 years. It finally came into the possession of Frank Swan, one of the family who lives in Nevada. He did not appreciate the value of the watch and gave it to his children to play with, and when Mr. Longabaugh first saw wit, about 14 years ago, the hands had been broken off, and one of the three cases within which the works were inclosed was lost. He recognized its value and secured it from Swan. The watch was examined by Tucker, the San Francisco jeweler, and after making researches he pronounced it genuine. More recently Hight & Fairchild of Butte made a search in the misty past, but the earliest date they could find of the existence of watches was 1300.

The machinery consists of a large steel balance wheel, which works with a pendulum like a lever, and in place of the modern hair-spring is a long steel chain, which winds and unwinds upon pulleys. Another large and unwinds upon pulleys. Another large wheel, the purpose of which is not appar-ent, looks like a belt wheel on a thrashing

The works are protected and held together by a fine ornamental network of brass carved out by hand and riveted together with brass rivets which show plain hammer marks. On the back of the works is a polished steel face similar to the second poissed steel face similar to the second dial on a modern watch, but the figures run from 1 to 6. The object of it has never been figured out by any of the jewelers who have examined it. The face of the watch is of polished steel, and the hours are marked by raised Roman numerals. Around the edge of the face are figures from \$1.00 ft. 60 to represent either seconds or min. 5 to 60, to represent either seconds or min-utes. In the center of the dial is the Brit-ish coat of arms in raised brass, consisting of the crown, lion and unicorn.

The whole works are inclosed in a silver

hemisphere, the silver being hammered and shaped by hand, the indentures of the ham-mer showing distinctly. On the outside of the silver case is another of hammered brass. and the evidence is plain that at some time there was still a third case on the outside of these two. The watch was wound up with some kind of a key, the keyhole being

protected by a rude trap or sliding door.

The watch has a stem nearly two inches long and a ring on the end large enough to hitch a horse to. The stem is of solid silver and in the middle is nearly half worn away which alone is a slight indication of its ex-treme age. The watch is said to have been in running order up to about 20 years ago. It weighs about four ounces and in shape looks like a baseball cut in halves.-Car-



The construction is the heaviest known outside of war vessels. Over 2,000,000 feet of oak was used in this boat, and the hull is plated from keel to water line with steel. The system of double frames and stringer keelsons makes a double hull, and the holes cut through for the deadlights show that the inside planking, frames and outside planking have a total thickness of at least 18 inches in the part of the bull where deadlights are used.

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
