

New York, June 13 .- The six story building filled with sweat shops at 10 and 12 Montgomery street caught fire at 8:30 o'clock this morning and in the wild rush to the street of the two hundred and fifty people working there three were killed and several fatally injured. When Elliott left his cell he went to breakfast as usual alone, via the chapel and fire department, passing between them through a narrow alley. Varney was lying in wait, having got away from his company by some means un-known, and struck Elliott with a fireman's nozzle, cutting a gash on his head through his cap three inches long and knocking him down. The nozzle is three feet long and weighs twenty pounds. Varney then wile Elliott was down threw several ounces of vitriol in

Elliott's screams were heard 150 yards and above the din of surrounding noises. His brother, Pat Elliott, also a prisoner, being at work in his proper place not far away and hearing the screams, ran to the spot and seizing a pan of water dashed its contents on William Elliott's

sclerotic coat of Elliott's right The sclerotic coat of Elliotts right eye is burned off and his left eye is badly injured. The right side of his face and head are horribly burned. His face is swollen to twice its usual size and his head to an extent which makes examination difficult.

Two men were required to hold El-liott so he could be carried to the hos-pital, so greatly did he rave on account of the injury. Cocaine was put on his eyes and he was finally put under the influence of morphine. After serving two years there he was transferred with others to this city o assist in building the northern prison After the labor was finished he worked on contracts until he grew old, and then during the wardenship of the late Charles Mayne in the seventies he became "trusty" and a farmhand. As he advanced in age his oddities grew upon him. Early in his prison career he formed a strong attachment for dumb mals and made pets of dogs, rabbits, squirrels and foxes. He also developed into a great hunter and trapper and would frequently turn his skill to financial account.

Once during the Mayne regime Bob got lost while hunting in Porter county. west of the city, and actually hired a man to bring him back to the prison. In 1877 Governor Williams offered Robinson a pardon, but he rejected it. - Michigan City Cor. Chicago Tribune.

English reporters can never agree upon the number of people in a crowd. The figures given in connection with Wednesday's loyal demonstration differed almost as absurdly, the lowest estimate being 150,000 and the highest 750,000. Police calculation, which is generally fairly reliable, puts the number at 300,000, reckoning people all along the route. At some favorite spots the crush was tremendous, but there were surprisingly few casualties. The Metro politan corps of the St. John Ambulance brigade was on duty. The staff consisted of 3 surgeons, 12 ambulance officers, 11 nursing sisters and 81 rank and file while the transport consisted of 4 pairs horse ambulance wagons, a wheeled lithorse ambulance wagons, a wheeled lit-ter and 30 stretchers.
