

A CANAL IN CRIMEA.

THE AGE AND HISTORY OF A WORLD'S WONDER UNKNOWN.

A Great Waterway Which a Russian Engineer Thinks Was Built as a Means of Defense In Ancient Times-A Detailed Account of the Wonderful Structure.

The great Russian engineer Melnikoff writes from Odessa to the Smithsonian institution describing the ruins of an uncient canal discovered in the Crimea, which he regards as one of the wonders of the world. It is certainly 27 centuries old, and among similar ancient objects of historic interest is second only in age to the great pyramids. The hanging gardens of Babylon and the Colossus of Rhodes are shrouded with no deeper mysteries than the existence of this great ditch, whose ruins can be traced for a long distance through the Crimean plain. Whether it was a waterway in the olden times and the pathway of ancient commerco between the Black sea and the sea of Azov or a means of defense for the people living in its vicinity is a question which wise men, supposed to know all about antiquities, cannot explain. When the Sun Was Darkened.

Several of the early writers, Plutarch and Pliny among the others, mention per-iods of greater or lesser length when the sun was supernaturally darkened or made paler than usual. Forty-four B. C., about the time of the death of Cæsar, Plutarch and Dio Cassius both tell us that "even the and Dio Cassins both tell us that "even the sun was pale for something like a whole year." In the year 300 A. D., in the eastern provinces of the Roman empire, occurred a celebrated "dark day," a day so dark that the "stars were visible at noontime." From further descriptions given in old works one might be led to consider the phe-

works one might be led to consider the phenomena due to an eclipse, but astronomers tell us that neither the eclipse of March 4, 360, nor that of August 28, same year, were visible to the countries mentioned. During Alric's siege of Rome, 400 and 410 A. D., "there were several days as dark as the nights which preceded them." In 536, 567, 626 and 631 we find mention of long periods of diminished sunlight. Schurrer says that and softweining mention of rong periods durinished sunlight. Schnurrer says that "the sun darkened alarmingly on August 19, 733, without any possibility of it being the result of an eclipse."

The Portuguese historians tell of the di-

The Portuguese historians tell of the di-minished sunlight for several months in the year 934, which finally terminated by an opening in the sky "from which loud sounds issued." In 1091 on Sept. 29 (not 21 as given in some translations of Hum-boldt's "Cosmos"), the sun turned suddenly black and remained so for three hours. Sev-cred dark days are recorded as having oreral dark days are recorded as having oc curred in February, 1106, the darkest being the 4th, 5th and 12th. On the 5th a bright star was seen shining "only a foot from the blackened remains of the sun."—Philadel-

An Ancient American Fort.

The remains of one of the most remarkable forts belonging to past ages ever found on this continent has been discovered at Topeka. West of the center of Topeka is a high bluff or ridge, which consists of strata of clay and gravel about 5 feet thick, resting upon a bed of limestone 15 feet in thickness. Several years ago quarries were opened in this ridge by a contractor, who after penetrating a considerable distance found the rock formation unexpectedly come to an end, and a loose bed of clay and gravel where the stone should have continued. After quarrying several years the re-markable discovery was made that here in ages past an excavation 80 feet in length from east to west, 60 feet in width from under consideration of opening up a north to south and 18 feet in depth, had

all external evidence of its existence. The lower layer of stone, 6 inches thick, had been left for a floor. In the southeast cor-ner of the excavation this lower stratum of stone had been removed for about 4 feet square. How Eskimo Boys Hunt.

In the far north in May and June imense numbers of eider ducks fly along the coast bound for their breeding grounds far to the east of Point Barrow At this season every person, male and female, is supplied with the Eskimo im-plement called by them ke-love-i-tow-tin, which is made as follows: Eight balls three-quarters of an inch in diam-eter are cut from ivory or bone, with a tip or ear through which a hole is drilled; eight strands of finely braided sinew are tied to these balls. At the opposite ends the strands are brought to gether, each of exactly the same length and tied to 10 or 12 quills of some sea fowl, when the implement is ready for use. 




