BETTER NOT CROWD HIM.

We take this editorial article from The Herald Democrat of Leadville, Colo.

Major McKinley accepted his renomination for governor of Ohio last Thursday in a very carefully prepared speech—a speech plainly designed to present the speaker's views to the whole nation.

Major McKinley will certainly need to make more explicit declaration of his position on the silver question before he can count upon the support of the free coinage Republicans for his presidential aspiration.

It is THE MINING JOURNAL's sincere belief that if Major McKinley were to be as explicit as the Colorado paper wishes he would be that sheet would be even less satisfied with his explicit than with his guarded utterances in the "judicious, sagacious" speech that has called forth the above comments.

Governor McKinley is too well informed a public man to champion an attempt by this country to remonetize silver, alone and single-handed, for he knows that such an undertaking by our government would utterly demoralize our currency and plunge us into disastrous confusion.

"We want no coin dollar that does not measure up to full one hundred cents in value," says Governor McKinley, whereas the silver men take umbrage and want to know if the present silver dollar is not good enough, and if it doesn't meet the requirement for which he stipulates.

On this aspect of the financial question the leading members of both political parties occupy common ground, for they are aware of the danger to the business interests and credit of the nation of injudicious legislation affecting the circulating medium.

"friends of silver" in the United States are now urging us to undertake doing alone, ignorantly oblivious of the fact that what they want our government to attempt is beyond its power to accomplish.

REPORTS that congress will consider the currency question in September are creating a lively interest in financial circles in Germany, and more so in Austria, Austria and Hungary each still requires \$4,000,000 in gold to complete their currency conversion.

So remarks the Wall Street Indicator. In other words, if we repeat the silver purchase law and say to the nations of Europe that we are prepared to stand demonetization of silver until they get ready to join with us in remonetizing that metal on a stable basis they won't continue to have such a picnic as our blundering financial policy has given them.

MASSACRE AVERTED.

EMMA SICKELS TELLS OF THE OUT-BREAK AT PINE RIDGE.

A Whole Settlement Came Near Being Destroyed by Inflamed Savages Because of a Disobedient Young Girl—How the Crisis Was Prevented.

In this brief dialogue, "Heya" "Go!" was the commencement of one of the most ominous of Indian outbreaks. "Heya" means in Sioux "I will not." It was the reply an Indian girl made to me at the school at Pine Ridge, S. D., of which I was superintendent.

It was in December, 1884. The school, which was for Indian girls and boys, had been opened but a few weeks and was still an experiment in the minds of the Indians and at the hands of the teachers.

Red Cloud then called a council of the school. He made them an impassioned speech. He told them that the Great Father had paid the white women to work for the Indians and now they were making the Indian children work for them.

His speech had its effect, and a delegation of six braves was sent to inspect the school. Of these, Little Wound, the powerful chief, was the head.

When Dr. McGillicuddy, the government agent, heard of this scheme on the part of Red Cloud, he ordered Little Chief to move camp.

Red Cloud's machinations had taken up the winter and spring, and July 6, 1888, the day of issuing rations, was at hand.

In painful suspense we watched Dr. McGillicuddy from the schoolhouse set off for the corral, where in an hour our fate was to be decided, and the doctor's confidence in the friendly Indians was to be tested.

Hearing of our danger, Little Wound brought all the Indians he could muster to the agency and prevailed upon Fast Horse and Standing Soldier to do the same.

I went to his assistance and succeeded in freeing him from his tormentor. A more crestfallen dog I never saw. He slunk off to the ship's boat, and it was several days before he recovered his usual spirits and could be coaxed on shore.

ELECTRIC HEATING. AN INVENTION THAT MAY REVOLUTIONIZE ALL METHODS.

A Remarkably Simple Principle of Electrical Energy Produces Astonishment Among Scientists Before Whom the Experiments Were Performed.

A discovery so original and so wide in its practical application that it is believed to open a new and important chapter in the use of electricity for heating purposes has recently been announced from Brussels and tested at Berlin.

The means, as designated in their claim, were so simple and the results as therein described so incredible that the patent examiners demanded that before issuing the patent a practical demonstration of the process should be made in their presence.

The apparatus consists of a glass or porcelain vase, which may be of any size conveniently adapted to the purpose, provided with a lining of lead connected with a strong conductor of positive electricity.

The electrical current having been switched on, a bar of wrought iron or other metal is taken up with the tongs and plunged into the water within the vase.

Divested of all merely technical phraseology and reduced to its simplest terms, the process under consideration may be explained as follows: One of the well known effects of electricity is to separate compound fluids through which it passes into their primitive elements.

Another disadvantage has resulted from the fact that iron when used for practical purposes is rarely or never entirely pure, but contains more or less carbon. Steel and wrought iron contain less carbon than cast iron, and when heated in the ordinary electrical furnace, where the heat is generated by the passage of the current between two carbon points, particles of loose carbon which have been detached by the current combine with the hot metal and convert it into something analogous to cast iron.

Whether it is applicable as an electrolytical process to the reduction of metals seems to be disputed. One account claims that by the use of refining gold, pure iron, copper, nickel and even iron will be reduced 80 per cent, while other authorities assert that while metallic oxides may be successfully reduced by this method no other foreign substances contained in the metal will be eliminated by it.

A few weeks ago Mr. Warren H. Manning of Brookline, Mass., happened to spend a Sunday at one of Marquette's hotels and during the day endeavored to see as much as possible of the little city noted for its beauty throughout Michigan. The result was a communication to THE MINING JOURNAL which this paper would gladly have published earlier but which has lost none of its pointedness at this date, especially in view of the recent discussion about the improvement of Presque Isle in these columns. THE MINING JOURNAL has all along urged that the first step to be taken in the improvement of Marquette's magnificent park should be the adoption of a definite plan of improvement and that that could only be prepared by some man like Olmsted who had given great study to such matters and could be accepted as an authority anywhere. After reading carefully Mr. Manning's communication, which appears on the fifth page this morning, THE MINING JOURNAL believes that its readers will feel that the ground taken by the paper in the discussion already alluded to was well considered. In answer to Mr. Manning's comment about other parks it may be said that Marquette already has a fine park between Washington and Ridge streets on Seventh—not improved very much as yet, it is true, while it is equally true that a certain ancient city was built in a day—and that arrangements are being considered for a park on the beach by the city water works, a proposition to that effect having already been secured from the government, which controls the beach as a part of the light house reservation.

While upon this subject THE MINING JOURNAL would urge one thing upon Park Commissioner Smith and the present city government and that is the crying need of seats in the parts of Presque Isle already opened up. The drives are all right and the park is all right for the hundreds who go out in their carriages but apart from a couple of benches at the street railway terminus there is not one convenience for the thousands who visit the park during the season on the street cars. The view from the cleared space at the head of the first hill is magnificent but no one can sit down to enjoy it unless he or she takes a seat on the ground. The same is true on the great point by Pinnacle Rock where the loop is. Seats should be placed at these places and hundreds of them should be provided in the cleared grove near the street railway terminus. A great deal has been done to make the park attractive to those who have carriages, let something be done this season to make it more attractive for those who have to use the street cars to visit it. Let no more roads be opened up nor any more clearing be done (apart from that which Mr. Smith has already very wisely commenced and which is confined to the brush in the grove near the street railway track) until seats have been provided so that people can enjoy the portion of the great park already opened up. If possible, the seats should be of iron to prevent their mutilation by the great American jack—knife.

Burned tug Grand Marais.

The fishing tug Babcock, owned by the Connable Fishing company, arrived from Grand Marais last night with the news of a disaster to the company's big tug Clara Belle, used in transporting packed fish to this port for shipment by rail. While lying at her dock at Grand Marais Tuesday night a fire broke out on board the Belle and before it could be subdued her upper works had been burned off and her engine ruined. The fire started between 12 and 1 a. m. and the engineer was asleep on board at the time, lying in his berth with his clothes on. He did not waken until one of his shoes had been half burned off and then had a hard time escaping, losing all his baggage except the clothes he had on his back. The cause of the fire is still a mystery.

The Belle was fully insured and the insurance companies will stand the cost of her repairs. She will be towed to this port and rebuilt at the Lake Shore Iron works, a new cylinder being necessary for her engine. The Babcock would have brought her up yesterday if it had not been thought best to leave her alone until the representative of the insurance companies had examined her and adjusted the loss.

A Badly Smashed Engine.

Locomotive No. 1, one of the big Baldwins owned by the Manistique R'y company and which was rebuilt at the Lake Shore Iron works last year when all the engines of that road were given an overhauling, is back here again for heavy repairs, having taken a tumble into a ditch last week which tore off her cab and smashed her all up on one side. At the time the accident happened the engine was pushing six carloads of logs ahead of her when a log fell on the track and wrecked the whole outfit. Locomotives are becoming familiar objects at the Lake Shore works and work upon this will be pushed with all possible despatch as the company needs the engine badly in handling log trains now.

The Presque Isle Road Bridge.

The bridge across the break made in the Presque Isle road by Dead river is nearly ready for use and City Engineer McIntosh hopes to be able to throw it open to the public in time for use Sunday. The bridge is 157 feet long and has a double driveway. It is very solidly built and under its south edge the

Dead River Mill company has constructed a pile dam with slash boards nearly the whole length so that there will be plenty of room for the escape of the water in case of another flood, especially when the two other openings near the mill are considered. Between the closely driven rows of piles great quantities of brush have been thrown and then sunk with rock and in the same way the front of the dam has been protected with brush sunk with sand bags. The brush holds the material together and prevents the current from washing it out of place.

Will Have a Railroad.

Grand Marais, with its beautiful landlocked harbor, one of the finest roadsteads on the lake, will soon be given a chance to grow and to become quite an important lake port as the Manistique Railway company is now extending its road to that point. The road, though started exclusively for logging purposes, is standard gauge and will give direct communication between Newberry and Grand Marais. Its track is within fourteen miles of Grand Marais now and the extension is not regarded as difficult construction.

Grand Marais has a sawmill, idle through litigation now, and has tributary to it a very fine body of pine. It is also one of the most important fishing stations on the lake, the Connable Fishing company having three tugs there now with over forty men employed and a fourth tug is on the way, which will add ten or twelve more men to the force employed. The fish are brought to Marquette three times a week for shipment to Chicago.

Civil Service Examination.

In pursuance of the presidential order of January 5, 1893, extending the civil service law to all free delivery post-offices, the civil service commission at Washington has ordered that an examination be held in this city on Saturday, June 24, 1893, commencing at 9 o'clock a. m. for the grades of clerk and carrier in the city postoffice. Only citizens of the United States can be examined. The age limitations are as follows: For clerk, not under 18 years; for carrier not under 21 or over 40; for messenger, stamper, etc., not under 16 nor over 45. No application will be accepted for this examination unless filed with the undersigned, on the proper blank, before 12 o'clock noon, on June 21, 1893.

The civil service commission takes this opportunity of stating that the examinations are open to all reputable citizens who may desire to enter the postal service, without regard to their political affiliations. All such citizens, whether Democrats or Republicans, or neither, are invited to apply. They shall be examined, graded, and certified with entire impartiality, and wholly without regard to their political views, or to any consideration save their efficiency, as shown by the grades they obtain in the examination. THIRD ANNUAL PILGRIMAGE.

TO THE SHRINE OF THE GOOD SAINT ANNE.

The 1893 pilgrimage to this famous miracle working shrine is being organized by the South Shore under the auspices of the Clergy of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, leaving Wednesday, June 23, 1893, and promises to be the largest ever sent out from the upper peninsula. The special train will be run to Montreal only, as it is expected the majority of the pilgrims will want to stop over in that city for the grand celebration of the St. Jean de Baptiste societies, which takes place June 24.

The journey from Montreal to Ste. Anne de Beaupre and return home to be made on regular trains at any time within the limit of the tickets. A feature this year will be the Palace Sleeping cars and Tourist Sleepers that will be attached to the Canadian Pacific special train. The rate per double berth in the former from Sault Ste. Marie to Montreal will be \$4.00 and berths in the Tourist Sleepers will be at a nominal price. Anticipating that a number of excursionists will want to visit the World's Fair on the return, arrangements have been made by which excursion tickets entitling holders to return via Chicago will be sold at the low fare of \$35.00 for the round trip. This will be one of the choicest summer excursions offered to the people of this section, as it includes not only a visit to the principal cities of the Dominion of Canada, but also gives the tourist an opportunity of visiting Detroit and the World's Fair on the return trip home.

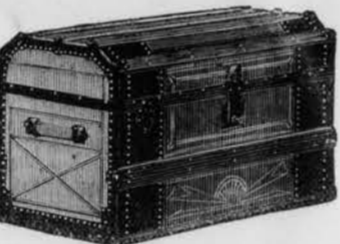
