VOTE FOR THE CITY HALL.

The Bonding Question Should Be Earnestly Advocated From This Time On.

THE ROAD ROLLER ADVOCATES ARE ON TOP NOW.

Working on the Schooner Wesley—Bay de Noquette Decisions—Joe Fay Gained by a Supervisor.

WORK FOR THE LOAN.

The time is drawing near for the special city election at which the proposition to issue bonds for the erection of a \$50,000 city hall will be submitted to the people and the question should receive careful consideration and discussion from now on.

There can be or at least there should be no fear that the building of a city hall would increase taxation. The interest on the bonds would be \$2,500 a year and as the city is already paying a respectable sum in rent and must pay much more as soon as compelled to vacate the present city building, now owned by Hon. Peter White, the interest charge would be very little more than the annual expenditure for rent.

There is a pressing need already for a larger and more convenient council chamber than the one now in use. The present room was all right when the city had only five wards but with sixteen aldermen besides the mayor, recorder, city attorney, street commissioner, and city engineer, who are all required to be present at meetings, in attendance the close, stuffy little room becomes a den of misery on warm evenings and as equally disagreeable in the winter and the discomfort and suffering of all is increased by the large number of citizens always present—and rightfully so—because of their general interest in the proceedings or because there are matters to be brought up in which they are interested. The present quarters are a disgrace to the proud city of Marquette and THE MINING JOURNAL cannot believe that the election on July 11 will result otherwise than in an overwhelming victory for the bonding proposition.

The Road Roller Was Needed. The trouble Marquette is having with her streets this season must have convinced every careful observer by this time that it would have been a good thing for the city if the contract with the Lake Shore Iron works for a fifteen-ton steam road roller had been carried out. It is preposterous to claim that crushed rock thrown on loosely will ever pack down hard enough through ordinary traffic over it to sustain the heavy loads which are being carted through the city in the shape of building material, rock for breakwater use, etc. The macadamizing in use up to the present time is all right for light traffic when very carefully put down but will never stand crushing weights. It is also absolutely certain that with a heavy steam road roller the streets of the city could be made a hundred per cent better for carriages and light traffic as well as the crushing loads referred to. The constant patching now in progress on half the streets on the hill is proof positive that the day of a light macadamizing has passed so far as economy is concerned and that a change to more solidly built streets should be made at once. Any one who has visited Chicago and seen the splendid work done by road rollers in the World's Fair grounds and elsewhere must be convinced that a steam road roller is something Marquette should have as soon as possible.

Working on the Wesley. Captain H. N. Jex is working on the schooner Wesley, which went ashore last fall near Onota, with a crew of men and as soon as he can get her jacked up and put ways under her he will have one of Gillett's tugs down to pull her off. The captain thinks the schooner will come off in pretty fair shape.

Bay de Noquette Cases Heard. In the United States land office yesterday a number of the most important Bay de Noquette homestead cases were argued, most of the land attorneys of the city being engaged. In the Alice Salter and two other cases a decision was rendered in favor of the entryman but in the Marceau case and one other the settler gained the decision so that not much can be told about the matter either way until the register and receiver submit their formal rulings in writing.

United States Licenses Due. All United States licenses must be paid by tomorrow, July 1. This includes not only liquor licenses but also oleomargarine and all other forms of United States licenses.

Joe Is Fixed Now. Supervisor R. Maxwell of Negaunee, who returned Monday from an extended tour through Great Britain, brought with him a magnificent blackthorn cane for Joseph Fay of this city who has long sat on the county board with him. The stick was purchased by Mr. Maxwell soon after he landed in Ireland and has a beautiful silver head, ornamented with harps and the shamrock leaf, while on the top is the inscription: "Presented to Jos. Fay by R. Maxwell, 1893." Mr. Fay is very proud of the stick, which, besides being a genuine blackthorn from the old sod, is also one of the handsomest he has ever seen, and if anyone wants to start a Donnybrook fair shindy around his place he

is prepared to be "in it" extensively from this time on. After crossing over from Ireland Mr. Maxwell visited his native Scotland and then made quite a tour through England. Fine Portrait Work.
