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

Up to this hour the day has passed uletly. It is not known whether any spies accompany the troops. The inspector general of the state troops arrived here this afternoon on a special train. Under the orders of the governor he traveled over the state endeavoring to raise a force of volunteers to uphold the dispensary law. The indications are that he met with complete failure on all sides.

There was a riot the other day at Darlington over the attempt by officers of the law, armed with proper warrants from a competent court, to search certain houses for contraband liquor. Four or five men were killed and several others dangerously wounded. The local militia company mutinied and refused to obey the governor's orders to assist the sheriff in suppressing the dis-

Some of Governor Tillman's political ideas are foolish and visionary and deserving of condemnation. But that does not alter the fact that he is the lawful chief magistrate of South Carolina, that he is endeavoring to enforce a law duly enacted by the representa-tives of the people and has a right to demand the implicit obedience of the state troops. The mutinous militiamen are in open revolt against lawful authority and should be punished as the laws provide and as their offense deserves. The aristocrats, oligarchs and anarchists of South Carolina should learn by bitter experience that they cannot fool with the people nor safely conspire to defeat their will.

He Can't Shoot with a Rifle So Well as with a Revolver

War Department Reports Give Some Interesting Statistics, Showing the Indian to Be an Expert Pistol Shot.

Reports received at the war department of recent small arms competi-tions among the troops in the far west show conclusively that the noble red man, as represented in Uncle Sam's military service, does not compare favorably with his pale face brother in the matter of sharpshooting. There is a popular idea, gained from Cooper's Leather Stocking tales, and even more modern literature, about the "dusky denizens of the forest," that all war-riors are superior marksmen. Army statistics, examined by the Washington Star, prove that this is a romantic delusion so far as the Indian soldier is concerned. In recent competitions the Indians who have been enlisted in the army of the Colorado have had a chance to show what they could do side by side with white men. MONEY IN A MONKEY FARM.

I But the Ignorance of a Banker Prevents
Its Establishment. "The funniest thing I witnessed during the brief but exciting period known as the boom, in Birmingham, Ala.," said Dr. Everett to a St. Louis Globe-Democrat reporter, "was the formation of a company to establish a monkey farm. About the time the excitement was at its greatest two bankers from a country town came with forty thousand dollars in cash and were very anxious to get into the little group of capitalists who were making big money. They haunted two or three of the leading investors until finally Dr. Jackson, who stood at the head of the local financial world, told them he had a friend with a scheme in which he himself was putting in twenty thousand dollars, and if they really wanted to invest he could, as a personal favor, secure a like amount if to be paid in at a meeting to be held in a few days.

"The banker wrote a check for ten thousand dollars, and felt jubilant that at last he had been admitted into the charmed circles of financiers. In a few days he was notified to attend a meeting of the stockholders, which he did. Then the promoter of the enterprise explained it. His plan was to buy an island near Mobile, send an expedi-tion to Africa and South America to secure monkeys, stock the farms with one hundred thousand monkeys, and raise them for the market.

A CAR-SEARCHER'S DUTIES.

How One Agent Had to Pay "Demurrage." If you want to get an idea of the immensity of American railroading, talk to a car-searcher. The United States covers a pretty large area, as some one observed, but the rialroad men, and particularly the car-searchers, know

their way about it as a policeman knows his beat. A car-searcher, be it said for the benefit of the uninformed, is an official sent out by one of the companies to look for cars which have been borrowed by other lines and treated like borrowed umbrellas. Of course, these officials are experienced men, a great trust is reposed in them and they have a great weight of re-sponsibility to carry on their shoulders. One of these men whom I met a few

evenings ago talked of one car "some-where around by Eagle Pass," or a chance of finding another at Portland, Ore., as if these places were only a few squares the other side of Broadway. He had been sent out by one of the big lines that cover the territory between New York and Seattle to find certain freight cars that had been running up long bills for "demurrage" against their borrowers. "Demurrage" is a charge made by the owners of a car, at so much per day, for the time the car is kept away from its own line.

INHABITED BY LUNATICS.

The Old Town of Gheel, Flanders, and Its Curious Treatment of the Insanc. There are cities and towns built upon the water, or rather raised above the

water, like Venice, Stockholm and the "pile villages" of the Orinoco and the Venezuelan coast; but the most curious town on the earth's surface is Gheel, in Flanders. This town is not strange because of its peculiar architecture or location. It is a thorough going Flemish town, consisting of a straggling group of houses and a lazy, heed-not-to-morrow, and semi-almost purely agricultural population. The reader will naturally ask: "Then why is it strange?" It is because of its population. Gheel is not populated as is any other city in the universe. It is a little place of some six thousand people; but of this five thousand in 1892, two thousand and seventeen were lunatics. The peculiarity of the treatment of these insane is that they are allowed to wander around, unconfined—as though under no surveillance whatever. They mix with the townspeople, partake in their amusements and festivities, and not infrequently assist them in their daily avocations. Lunatics of every sphere in life are found in Gheel-princes, nobles, merchants, peasants—and the inhabitants poard them according to their ability to pay. It is well to explain that in this unique town the insane are lo-cated or domiciled among the inhabpersonal favor, secure a like amount if itants and not confined in an asylum. Of course violent patients are not allowed to dwell in the cottages of the people. There is an institution for this class of lunatics, but the authorities of Gheel do not invite such pa-tients, and, as a consequence, very few violent maniacs are found either in the town or asylums of Gheel. The government has instituted a commission for this purpose. This commis sion also uses a power of vetoing the admission of the insane into the commune of Gheel. They do not desire in-tractable or incurable patients—no matter what their station in life. And, having received a patient into the community, they use a vigilant surveillance over his or her movements, whether it be necessary to have the lunatic confined in the asylum or allowed to board among the inhabitants. Because of this commission, which consists of the most famous doctors in lunacy in northwestern Europe, violence, undue ex-citement and all kinds of improprieties among the patients are well guarded against, and as a consequence the little community lives on in its lazy existence in peace.—Pittsburgh Dispatch.






