





Over this is suspended from a wire adjustment, a peculiar funnel-shaped piece of cotton fabric which has been so treated chemically as to leave nothing but the carbon. This the intensified flame heats to whiteness procing a soft, brilliant light and giving off not much more heat than the ordin ary twenty-five candle incandescent lamp.
