

SAY RAILROADS MUST CARRY THEM FREE.

Question Now Is Whether Iowa Roads Are as Weak-Kneed as the Union Pacific

IT IS SIMPLY BRIGANDAGE.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia., April 16.-Kelly's army broke camp this afternoon and marched through the principal streets on its journey eastward. The pilgrims camped tonight at the Chautauqua grounds, four miles east, alongside the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific and Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railways. It is believed the army will attempt to capture a freight train east

WILL CHECK THE FINAL SCRAMBLE. Washington, April 16.—A constitu-tional question of much importance was decided today by Judge Nott of the court of claims. In passing on a land claim case the court held that the president of the United States has the right to sign any bill after the adjournment of congress if done within the time (ten days) after passage fixed by law. If this decision is sustained by the su-preme court it will check the disorderly scramble to get bills signed by the president during the closing hours of congress. For many years the president has been in the habit of coming to the Capitol on the last day day of congress to be ready to sign bills passed at the last moment. President Cleveland refused to continue this custom during his first term, saying that he would sign no bill without examing it. President Harrison, however, returned to the old President

HEAT OF THE BODY.

Facts About Temperature in Relation to the Human System.

Owing to the common use nowadays of the clinical thermemeter, most persons are aware that the normal temperature of the human body is 98.6 deg. Fahrenheit. It is, however, subject to important fluctuations, which have to be considered in estimating any decided alterations. It is sufficient here to notice that the human temperature falls to its lowest about one or two o'clock in the morning, while the maximum daily temperature occurs some time in the afternoon. tions are influenced by food, but as they occur in fasting persons, they are not altogether dependent upon the supnly of nourishment. Exercise has a deeided effect in raising the temperature, a fact of which everyone is conscient The application of cold, as by a cold bath, lowers the temperature of the skin, but raises temporarily that of the internal organs, as it causes an increased volume of blood to be forced into them. In hot countries the bodily temperature is raised, at all events, in

Perhaps the most wonderful phenon enon connected with the bodily tem perature is the preservation of its gen eral level under all external circumstances of heat and cold. This power seems to exist in man in a higher amount than in most other animals since he can not only support but enjoy life under extremes which would be fatal to many. The accounts of degrees of cold frequently sustained by arctic voyagers are almost incredible. We read of temperatures 80 deg., 90 deg. and even 102 deg. below the freezing point. On the other hand, in the tropics the temperature often rises through a large portion of the year to 110 deg., or even higher, and we know that workmen can remain in furnaces at a temperature of 300 deg. or more without inconvenience. In all these cases the air must be dry and still; similar extremes of heat or of cold, accompanied by moisture, would prove intolerable.-Fortnightly Review.

In short, THE MINING JOURNAL would infer from the language of the men that while they would like to receive a higher rate per ton than two cents, their chief point of objection is the dispro-portion between what they will get and that falling to the share of the bosses. They say they are opposed to two or any number of boss trimmers holding a monopoly of the ore trimming business of this port.

ming, men from outside will be brought in to do the work.

The old trimmers say that but for what they call the sharp practice of Mc-Partland, the ore carriers would have willingly paid them three or three and a half cents a ton for trimming. They show that under the McPartland contract a gang of twenty men will receive for trimming a vessel carrying 2,000 tons \$2 each, while McPartland will pocket \$10 of their hard earnings; so that under his contract he will receive \$2.75 more for trimming a 2,000-ton yessel than he did under the old price of four cents a ton. The men call this sort of monopoly nothing less than robbery, and naturally they want to know what they can do.

One of the ore trimmers' spokesmen said yesterday: "Many of us have families and not a few are in debt to merchants who have helped us through the winter when we could not get work." You see it don't make any difference whether the two bosses employ fifty or one hundred men in trimwing the merchants here. Many of them have helped the trimmers through the winter, looking forward for their pay to the time when a resumption of shipping would enable them to pay their bills. Now the business men see a prospect of the low figure and alleged disproportionate division driving the old hands out of the field and bringing in a lot of new ones who will not become residents. Such a move would mean not only loss to the men but to the merchants yesterday seriously considered circulating a petition protesting against the rate and the bosses getting one-fifth of the gross ore trimming earnings.

Some of the men declared yesterday that they would not trim ore for two cents a ton and they believe it is the intention of McPartland and O'Meara to employ the cheapest labor they can even though they have to double the number of men they have heretofore employed to do the same quantity of the way.
