

BORROWING TROUBLE

We extract this from an editorial in a publication devoted to silver coinage in which a wail is sent up because of the inadequacy of our supply of currency to the needs of business:

The supply of money continues to de crease, as it is bound to do when the only available means of increasing that supply is being curtailed. We have frequently re ferred to the fact that our money supply can grow in but one direction as long as the national banks do not increase their circulation. We have stopped making silver money, the issue of greenbacks was stopped years ago, the repeal of the silver act of 1850 has stopped the issue of United States treasury notes, and the national banks have ceased to increase their issues, so gold alone is now the source of our new money supply. When we export gold in any great quantity it is no longer possible to edd to our stock of money. There may be an increase in circulation, as was the case last menth, but under the conditions mentioned the United States treasury must be the loser.

All this would be very startling if we did not have the banks at the great money centers brimming with money that is lying idle in them because it cannot find profitable investment.




