

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

AN ORDINANCE relative to the preservation of the public health, and the duties and liabilities of the board of health.

The said board of health shall meet in the common council chamber of the city of Marquette at such times as the members shall de-cide, and the recorder of the city shall be cierk of the board and shall keep a record of the proceedings of such meetings shall be clerk of the board and shall keep a record of the proceedings of such meetings and preserve the same in his office. Meet-ings of the board may be called forthwith by any member of the board, by giving oral or written notice to the members, and any five members of the board being pres-ent at any meeting shall constitute a onorum.

No person having the small pox or varioloid, or other contagious disease shall go about the city: and all persons having small pox, varioloid or other con-tagious or infectious disease, are hereby re-quired to be kept closely confined within their respective dwellings or places of abode, and no person who has been con-fined with such disease, shall leave his or her place of abode and go about the city, until he or she is furnished with a certifi-cate by the health officer, that it can be done without communicating the disease to others; and the health officer shall fur-nish such certificate without charge. Sec. 9. It shall be the duty of each mem-ber of the board of health to take care and charge of the ward in which he resides, to ascertain any nuisance which may exist in his ward, and forthwith to report the same in writing to the board; to enter upon the premises and into the house of every per-son in his ward as often as he shall deem necessary, or the board of health shall order, and to examine into the health, cleanliness and the number of persons in-habiting such house, and inspect the cel-lars, vaults, privies and severs on such premises. Second—Each member of the board of

Second—Each member of the board of health shall, upon discovering any person who, in his opinion, is infected with a malignant or infectious disease, promptly notify the health officer, if satisfied that such person is infected with a ma-lignant or infectious disease, shall cause notice of the same to be at once given to said board. Fourth—It shall be the duty of said board, immediately upon receiving such notice, to take steps to prevent the spread of such disease, in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, and they shall, as far as practicable, remove all in-fected persons to the pest house. Sec. 10. Such board shall not proyide assistance or necessaries for any infected person at his, her or their residence, unless such person cannot be remoyed to the pest house, under the provisions of this ordinance, and such board shall only in such case furnish assistance and neces-saries for those actually sick or infected in case any member of the same family, not sick or infected, shall be in want of provisions or assistance, it shall be the duty of such board of health to notify the director of the poor thereof, but such board shall not have any power to furnish such persons with provisions or other necessaries, except medicines as a pre-ventive of disease. Sec. 11. All bills for necessaries furnished by order of such board of health shall be sworn to, and shall be presented to the controller, audited and paid, in the same manner as other bills against the city of Marquette; and in case it is intended, and is proper, to present such bill to the county of Marquette for payment, then the board of health, through its chairman, ehall cer-tify to the said county that the person himself, in whose behalf the bill has been made, his parents or other person who may be liable for his support, is unable to pay

be liable for his support, is unable to pay the same. Sec. 12. Any failure to comply with, or violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by fine or im-prisonment, or both such fine and impris-onment in the discretion of the court, the fine not to exceed \$100 with costs, nor the imprisonment three months. TOTAL TONNAGE NEARLY ELEVEN MILLIONS.

Over Twelve Thousand Passages Were Made-Matoa, Mariposa and Eddy

SUEZ DITCH DISCOUNTED. WASHINGTON, May 18 .- In a report transmitted to congress today by the secretary of war Colonel O. M. Poe, the army engineer in charge of the St. Mary's Falls canal, Michigan, presents some interesting statistics in regard to the operation and care of that waterway during the season of 1893. Colonel Poe reports that 753 registered craft, of which 459 were steamers, numbered 213 and their tonnage was

craft using the canal was \$41,133,100. These vessels carried 18,869 passengers. Of the registered vessels 692 were American and 61 were Canadian. The latter carried 444.045 tons of freight. The total freight carried by American unregistered craft amounted to 9,878 tons in 156 passages, making an average of 63.3 tons of freight per passage. The total freight carried by Canadian unregistered craft amounted to 29,457 tons in 57 passages, making an average

of 516.7 tons of freight per passage. The Canadian freight was only 4.1 per cent. of the total freight for the sea-

tons. craft was only 762 tons. The cost of trasportation of freight per mile ton through the canal averaged lower for the season of 1893 than ever before. In 1887 the cost was 2.3 mills per mile ton, and since then it has gradually decreased. Last year it averaged 1.31 mills per mile ton and for the season of 1893 was only 1.1 per mile ton.
