Two thousand strikers assembled at ed that most of them were not. The ed that most of them were not. The strikers stopped the first party of miners this morning and endeavored to persuade or force them to join the strike. The deputies on guard went to the assistance of the workmen surrounded by the mob of strikers and started with them toward the mine. The strikers began advancing on the deputies and one of the latter fired the shot which opened the battle. The strikers stood their ground and fought till their ammunition gave out. Four strikers were killed and at least eight wounded. Three deputies were woundwounded. Three deputies were wounded. A large number of armed strikers have been arrested. RIOTERS ROUNDED UP. One Hundred Riotous Strikers Under element has thrown up breastworks. Arrest at Centralia

CENTRALIA, Ills., May 23 .- Five hundred coal strikers boarded an Illinois Central freight train at Duquoin at midnight last night and forced the endump carts and other loose material.

After the rioters had destroyed about \$5,000 worth of the company's property at 9 o'clock they left the city on foot and two miles north separated into two gangs, one party going to Sandoval, and the other to Odiu, eight miles north, to close the mines there. The sheriff with fifty deputies armed with Winchesters left for the scene at 10:30 o'clock.

Sheriff Helm and posse sped to Secretary where the mole was over.

Sheriff Helm and posse sped to Sandoyal, where the mob was over-hauled. The strikers declared their intention of keeping the peace. The leader of the strikers offered to take his men with the sheriff and his depu-ties to Odin. The sheriff's train was quickly transferred to the Baltimore & O. D. JONES-Dentist Onio track and the deputies reached Odio a few minutes in advance of the other branch of the mob.

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



CLUMSY GIRLS ON WHEELS.

Late at Night They Steal Out on Quiet Streets to Learn to Be Bicyclers. Miss Frances Willard tells the English that she spent twenty-six hours learning to ride the bicycle in odd ten-minute turns. She had to be very cautious, for when persons of her agfall it may be a serious business. In the quiet asphaltum paved streets of Brooklyn the people see what Miss Willard means by being very cautious. After ten o'clock, when the parlor lights go out and the streets are all but elear of pedestrians, the well-to-do young women practice at learning to ride the flying wheels. Athletic men from the gynasiums, riding schools and athletic clubs are hired to keep them from falling. The young women mount the machines and wabble along with a man on each side dodging after the bicycle to be ready if the women fall. After a few nights the women dashes, but they are never certain that they will not lose their "nerve" at any moment and dash into the curb or pitch off on their heads. That is the period when the hired attendants earn their money, for they have to race like norses to keep up with the bicycles.

Now and then, if the practicing is done at too early an hour, a gang of little street arabs will spy one of these experimenters on the wheel and, catching the spirit of the scene, will race after the wheel with hoots and howls. It needs but little to disconcert a learner, and at such times the young women's nerves give clean out, and they dismount, hand the machines to the men and walk home. When a Brooklyn girl is not rich enough to hire male attendants her sisters and friends steal out with her late at night, intending to be very quiet. Instead of being so, they never fail to make a large sized row that brings all the neighbors to the windows. The ma-chine is so unruly with a teginner. It plunges so eccentrically, it shows such persistence in falling sidewise, and it demands so much more strength than the girls have got to keep it upright that all fall to screaming and laughing and shricking until the people on the block wonder what bedlam has broken loose. Many a girl would give up trying to learn were it not that on the next bright day she sees Bedford avenue alive with wheelfolk. among whom are many happy girls flying along like fairyfolk and looking so pretty and graceful as to get the envy of all beholders .- N. 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


