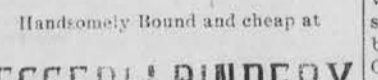

WE ARE NOW told that Cuba wants to be annexed to the United States. We don't want Cuba, nor Canada. Let us first demonstrate that we are able to keep things right in the territory now embraced in the union. It will then be quite time enough to take in some more.

"WHEN Superior buys another normal school," remarks The Inland Ocean of that city. "it will wait until the goods are delivered before paying for it." 'Twill be a wise precaution. But it isn't probable that Superior will feel like making an investment the next time the state has an institution of the kind to put up at auction. If the city gets its \$65,000 back from the state it can congratulate itself in having got out of a foolish deal cheaply.

UNDER the call issued for the Democratic state convention the upper peninsula will have eighty-five delegates in that body. They are apportioned among the counties of the district as follows: Alger, 2; Baraga, 2; Chippewa, 5; Delta, 7; Dickinson, 6; Gogebic, 8; Houghton, 15; Iron, 3; Keweenaw, 2; Luce, 2; Mackinac, 3; Marquette, 15; Menominee, 8; Ontonagon, 4; Schoolcraft, 3. The total representation from the state in the convention will be 945.

ALLUDING to the meeting of the Democratic state central committee held Thursday last at Detroit the Kalamazoo Telegraph observes that "judging from the report of the proceedings, as published in the Detroit Free Press, it must have been one of the most harmonious meetings the committee ever held in the state." This is a hot one on the Free Press, which is a great newspaper which takes special pains not to publish some kinds of news.

CAMPBELL's scheme to prevent the Populists from naming candidates for the Democratic party in this state is quite worthy of his genius as a party manager. His purpose in having the Democratic convention held first is to nominate candidates who will be so acceptable to the Populists that their convention, which will be held a few days later, cannot refuse to endorse them. Incidentally, he has hopes that the convention will name him as one of the two candidates to be supported for the United States senatorship by the Dem-Populist combine. What Dan! doesn't know about political management would fill several volumes.

WE NOTE with satisfaction that the Republicans of his district propose to return Hon. F. C. Chamberlain to the legislature this year as their representative. Mr. Chamberlain proved a trusty and valuable member of the last legislature and made a record for attention to his duties and ability in discharging them which should ensure his re-election by an increased majority if he is willing to serve for a second term. If the upper peninsula delegation wishes to put forward a man for the speakership, too, they cannot back a better man for that honor than Mr. Chamberlain, in case he is elected. He is a good parliamentarian and possesses the nerve required to fit a man for the position of presiding officer.

THERE is food for thought in what the Age of Steel states about the singular industrial condition existing in the country in this editorial paragraph:

Among the anomalies that are throwing sand in the public optic none are more hurtful to national peace or prosperity than those at present ruling in industrial conditions. We have men by the thousands refusing to work without an advance in wages, and other thousands engaged in a pilgrimage to Washington for the stated reason that they can't obtain work at any wages. To this we may add the other paradox of men who would work if they dared, yet are compelled to accept semi-starvation as the only escape from a broken head or a perforated brain. With these conditions in force, it is by no means a mystery that a nation endowed with the grandest natural resources of the world, and in the pink of youth and energy, should be laid up for repairs.

IN HIS speech at Cooper Union in New York the other day Mayor Pingree, of Detroit, gave utterance to a pregnant truth in speaking of the feeling of discontent among the masses of the people at this time, and the causes which have produced it, when he said: I want to say that the days of watered stocks, of immense issues of bonds on fictitious values, of trusts formed to raise the necessities of life, and all other forms of monopoly whose special objects are to grind down the wealth producing masses for the benefit of the non-wealth producing classes, are drawing to a close. I hope never to see the time in this country when force will be used as a remedy against these evils. But the condition of affairs as to the concentration of wealth, which is power, and the spread of poverty, which is weakness, seems to be growing worse instead of better. And it is the history of the world that there is an end to human endurance. The changeable vote in the state of New York indicates this ominous condition of unrest. CAUSED BY A HORSE RACE

How a Fierce Battle with Indians Was Brought About.

An Event Which Explains Why the Navajos of Fort Wingate Were Hostile to the United States Government Through the Civil War.

Don Amado Chavez, the eldest son of the late Col. Manuel Chavez, New Mexico's most noted Indian fighter, tells an interesting story of the big fight with the Navajos at Fort Wingate in 1861, which was the cause of the turbulence with that tribe during the rebellion and which he witnessed as a boy. Don Amado was about twelve years old then, says a Santa Fe (N. M.) correspondent. His father was commander at Fort Wingate, where New Mexican volunteer troops were stationed to watch the Navajos and keep them quiet. The tribe was supposed to be peaceable and friendly, but it was deemed right to keep an eye on them and keep them from stealing stock, in which art the Navajos are past masters.

The Navajos had a pony that they believed able to outrun anything on four legs, and they were anxious to get upon a match race at the fort. The surgeon at the post owned a thoroughbred race horse, and a match was made between the two. There was a general gathering of the tribe around the fort for several days before the race, and the Indians and soldiers were on the best of terms. One of the chiefs took a fancy to the colonel's son and made a present to little Amado of a pretty buckskin pony with white tail and mane. Amado was very proud of his pony and rode him about the Indian camp and made friends of the Navajos.

On the day of the race the Indians and soldiers bet all of their portable property on the result. According to the Indian custom the things wagered were tied together and piled up in a general heap. A soldier bet five dollars against a Navajo blanket, the coins were tied up in a fold of the blanket, a tag attached showing who were the parties to the transaction and the blanket cast upon the pile.

A shrewd Navajo rode the Indian pony and a Mexican of the name Ortiz rode the thoroughbred horse. A one thousand-yard stretch across the prairie was hemmed in on both sides by a mixed crowd of Indians and Mexican soldiers. A fair start was made, and the pony got away a little in the lead. He was only a sprinter, however, and was no match for the horse when the latter got fairly into his stride. The Indian soon saw that the pony was outclassed, and that he could not win by fair running, and so he resorted to tricks to prevent the horse from passing. Whenever the horse attempted to pass the Indian pulled the pony over to that side just enough to get in the way, and Ortiz was compelled to pull up to avoid collision.

The Indian worked the trick with so many variations that the horse was fairly pocketed all the time by that lone pony, and Ortiz became furious. At last Ortiz lost patience, and when only a few yards from the finish the Indian tried the trick again. Ortiz gave his horse the spurs and plunged ahead. The big American horse rolled the pony over, but kept his feet and bounded across the line. The pony's neck was broken and his rider was crushed to death in the fall.

As soon as the Navajos understood what had happened they made a rush for Ortiz. Soldiers rallied around the rider to protect him, and in half a minute a free fight was in full blast. The soldiers got together quickly, and their fire was more effective than the scattering fire of the Navajos, but the Indians were numerous and made an ugly fight.

Young Amado saw his friend, the old chief, lying on the ground, wounded, and he went to him. The old man was mortally hurt, but he knew the boy and asked him for water. Amado got the water, sat down by the Indian, raised his head and gave him a drink. The surgeon came riding by, looking for the boy, and saw him sitting beside a wounded Indian. He snatched Amado up by the collar, placed him behind on the horse, galloped back into the fort and handed him over to the colonel, who had just been aroused by the firing, and was getting out of a sick bed to take charge of things.

The colonel told the boy to stay in quarters and not venture out again, and then he went to the walls and got the cannon into action. But the boy could think of nothing but his Navajo friend lying out there on the plain with a ghastly wound in his breast, and longing in vain for water. So he filled his father's canteen and stole out through the gate and found the old chief again. The old man was dying fast, and did not recognize the boy. Amado sat down by him, raised his head upon his knee, and held the canteen to the blue lips. And so he sat and ministered to the Indian until the life had gone from the body, and then he cried because the old man who gave him the buckskin pony was dead.

The thunder of the cannon, the shouts of the captains and the yells of the Navajos had ceased, and only an occasional crack of a rifle told that some skirmisher out on the prairie was trying some long parting shot at the enemy. Not until next day when he saw scores of dead Indians gathered up along the race course and on the prairie, and buried in a long trench, did the boy understand that he had been in a battle, and that all the tumult had raged around him when he sat by the dying chief's side was made by his friends, the Navajos, and his friends, the soldiers, trying to kill each other.

Where It Came From.

The expression "from pillar to post" is derived from a custom practiced in the riding schools of olden times. The pillar was placed in the center of the ground, and the posts were arranged two and two around the circumference of the ring at equal distances. Hence "from pillar to post" signified going from one thing to another without any definite purpose.

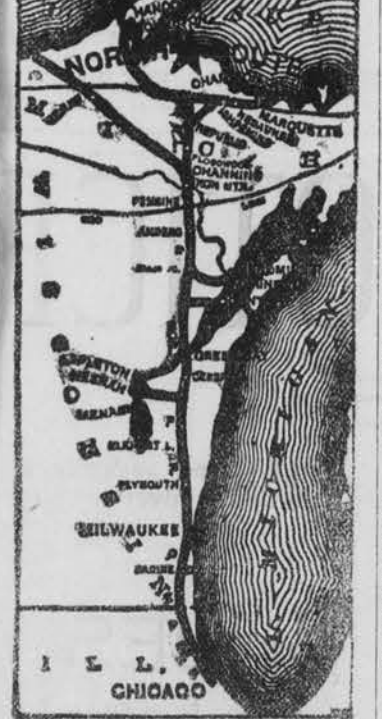

TEN EGG RECIPES.

Showing How Some Palatable Breakfast Dishes May Be Prepared.

Omelet with Smoked Beef.—Beat six eggs light, the whites and yolks separately. Put a tablespoonful of butter into a frying pan and cook in it for a couple of minutes two tablespoonfuls of finely chopped smoked beef.

Omelet with Green Peas.—Beat up six eggs for omelet as in preceding recipe, mix whites and yolks and stir into a half cupful of canned or cooked green peas.

Sausage Omelet.—Make a plain omelet of six eggs and fry it in a tablespoonful of butter.

Tomato Omelet.—Beat together the whites and yolks of six eggs, season with salt and pepper.

Eggs Poached in Consomme.—Heat a pint of consomme or clear beef soup to boiling. Poach six eggs in it, two at a time.

Eggs a la Lyonnaise.—Boil six eggs hard, and cut them into slices. Fry a small onion, sliced in a tablespoonful of butter, stir in a half pint of milk, in which has been mixed a tablespoonful of flour.

Savory Eggs.—Boil six eggs hard and slice them. Brown half a small onion in a tablespoonful of butter, add a cupful of both of gravy, and boil for ten minutes.

Scrambled Eggs With Cheese.—Heat a tablespoonful of butter in a frying pan, and beat into this six eggs, stir constantly, and as soon as they are well mixed add a tablespoonful of grated cheese.
