AN ORDINANCE relative to the preservation of the public health, and the duties and liabilities of the board of health. The city of Marquette ordains: Sec. 1. The board of health of the city of Marquette shall have, possess and exercise all the powers given by the charter of the said city of Marquette and the general laws of the state of Michigan relating to boards of health, in addition to those hereinafter enumerated.

Sec. 2. Said board of health shall have power as it shall be their duty to take such measures as they shall deem essential to prevent the entrance of any pestilential or infectious disease into the city; to stop, detain and examine and, if deemed necessary, to quarantine for the purpose of every person, vessel, ship, train or other conveyance coming from any place infected, or believed to be infected, with such disease; to establish, maintain and regulate a pest house or hospital; to cause any person not being a resident of the city, or a resident of the city who is not an inhabitant of the state, who shall be or is suspected of being infected with any such disease, to be sent back to the place whence he or she came, or to be sent to such pest house or hospital; to cause any resident of the city infected with any such disease to be removed to such pest house or hospital, if the health officer and two other physicians, including the attending physician of the sick person, if he shall have one, shall certify that the removal of such person is necessary for the public health, provided it can be done safely to the patient; to remove from the city and destroy any furniture, wearing apparel or goods, wares or merchandise, or other articles of property of any kind which shall be suspected of being tainted or infected with any pestilence or which shall be, or be likely to pass into such a state as to generate or propagate disease; to require the occupants of any dwelling house, store, shop or any other building in which there shall be any person sick with any contagious or infectious disease, to put up and maintain in a conspicuous place on the front of said dwelling house, store, shop or other building, a card or sign to be furnished by the board, on which shall be written or printed in large letters the name of the contagious or infectious disease from which the person so sick may be suffering; and in case of the neglect or refusal of any person to comply with such requirement to remove the patient therein to the pest house or hospital, and to do all acts which they shall deem necessary and expedient for the preservation of health and suppression of disease in the city and to carry into effect and execute the powers hereby granted.

master or person in charge of any stage, steamer, vessel, rail car, or other public conveyance, which shall enter the city, having on board any person sick of malignant fever, or pestilential or infectious disease, shall within two hours after the arrival of such sick person, report in writing the fact, with the name of such person and the house or place where he was put down in the city, to the mayor or some member of the board of health.

Sec. 4. No person shall knowingly bring or procure, or cause to be brought into the city, any property of any kind, tainted or infected with any malignant fever, or pestilential or infectious disease.

Sec. 5. Every keeper of a hotel, inn, boarding house or lodging house in the city, who shall have in his house at any time any sick traveler, stranger or strangers, shall report the fact, and name of the person, in writing, within six hours after he came to the house or was taken six there, to the mayor or some member of the board of health, and every physician in the city shall report under his hand to one of the officers of the board of health, the name and disease of every patient whom he shall have visited such hours.

Sec. 6. All fines imposed under this ordinance shall be, when collected, paid into the city treasury and covered into the general fund of the city of Marquette.

Sec. 7. The health officer of the city shall meet in the common council chamber of the city of Marquette at such times as the members shall determine, and the readiness of the city shall be clerk of the board and shall keep a record of the proceedings of such meetings and preserve the same in his office. Meetings of the board may be called forthwith by any member of the board, by giving oral or written notice to the members, and any five members of the board being present at any meeting shall constitute a quorum.

Sec. 8. No person having the small pox or varioloid, or other contagious disease shall be kept closely confined within the city, or in any building or place of abode, and no person who has been confined with such disease, shall leave his or her place of abode and go about the city, until he or she is furnished with a certificate by the health officer that it can be done without communicating the disease to others; and the health officer shall furnish such certificate without charge.

Sec. 9. It shall be the duty of each member of the board of health to take care and charge of the ward in which he resides, to ascertain any nuisance which may exist in such ward, and forthwith to report the same in writing to the board; to enter upon the premises and into the house of every person in his ward as often as he shall deem necessary, to examine the premises, to order, and to examine into the health, cleanliness and the number of persons inhabiting such house, and inspect the cellars, privies and sewers on such premises.

Sec. 10. Each member of the board of health shall, upon discovering any person who, in his opinion, is infected with a malignant or infectious disease, promptly notify the health officer of said board.

Sec. 11. Such health officer, if satisfied that such person is infected with a malignant or infectious disease, shall cause notice of the same to be at once given to said board.

Sec. 12. Any failure to comply with, or violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by fine or imprisonment, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court, the fine not to exceed \$100 with costs, nor the imprisonment three months. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent or in any way contrary to the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Joseph Oshie and Thomas Lawler, two inebriated lumbermen, got into a tangle with the police Tuesday night and were tenderly placed in the municipal refrigerator. Yesterday they appeared before Justice Gray and pleaded guilty to the charge of drunk and disorderly. The court gave them the option of paying a fine of \$6 or spending fifteen days in the county jail. They still had sufficient means to enable them to accept the former proposition and enriched the city treasury to the extent of \$12.

A SURGEON'S LIFE IN CABUL.

Personality and Habits of the Ameer of Afghanistan. At a recent meeting of the Indian section of the Society of Arts Mr. John A. Gray put his life with the ameer into a narrative of engrossing interest, beginning with his journey thither, Four-fifths of the country, he says, are rocks and mountains. The mountains vary from fifteen thousand to sixteen thousand feet, except in the Hindu Koosh range, where some peaks are twenty thousand feet. The other fifth of the country is exceedingly fertile, with delightful valleys, where there are gardens, orchards of fruit trees and great stretches of vines. There are fields of corn, barley, rice and maize, and patches of brilliantly green clover. The peasants are exceedingly clever in the art of irrigating. The manufactures of the country are few. One is that of a thick woolen cloth of a brown color, called barak—something like Irish frieze. It is made from camel's hair and is used for coats. The Cabul people have a saying that "You can wear your coat for five years, have it turned, wear it five more, then give it to your servant."

Mr. Gray describes the ameer's workshop as extensive for a small prince. It contains a small steam hammer, a stationary engine, lathes, carriage plant and a minting machine. Trained Hindustanee workmen are brought from India to work the machines under the direction of Mr. Fyne and his European assistants. The townspeople are not pure Afghans, but a mixed race of Afghan, Persian and Hindustanee. They are excellent copyists, but are not satisfactory in the results of their attempts to evolve an original design. Mr. Gray was a month in Cabul attending the two hospitals and seeing a great number of patients. They flock to a European doctor. When he arrived the ameer was in Turkestan, and sent for Mr. Gray to join him.

The ameer he found a man of presence, broad and stout. He is fair skinned, sun-burned, with black hair and beard. He has a good square head and piercing eyes. Dignified and courteous, on occasion he can be exceedingly fierce, and no chief dare speak or sit in the ameer's presence without permission. The surgeon's work was heavy, remittent fever decimating the troops. He had to treat the ameer for a cold, and found him a well-informed and most entertaining man. A custom he has struck Mr. Gray at first as unusual. It is that he takes out his artificial teeth in open durbar, cleans them with a toothbrush and then replaces them. Mr. Gray, however, thinks this impresses the people that their king is one who can take himself to pieces. Mr. Gray vaccinated the young prince, who is heir to the throne by right, prescribed for the sultana, and painted portraits of the royalties. His health giving way was the cause of his return.—London Globe.
