MANY VESSELS WRECKED.

Heavy Northeast Gale Is Doing Great Damage Along the Atlantic Coast.

LARGE NUMBER OF VESSELS ARE DRIVEN ASHORE.

IT SWEEPS THE ENTIRE COAST. St. Johns, N. F., Oct. 10 .- A northeast gale of exceptional force swept and great damage done. A heavy is running in the harbor and there were many casualties. Not less than fifty vessels dragged their anchors and were thrown upon the shore. Some of the doomed vessels were thrown upon the shore in exposed places and great seas be rendered the shipwrecked men from some damage. Several of the fleet are missing and grave fears are entertained

that they foundered during the night. NEW YORK, Oct. 10 .- A heavy windstorm set in at midnight up and down the coast and on the islands much damage was done. Sometimes the stream abandons its bed and takes to the roadway for a piece, each such interchange by the one or the other being made to get a clear right of way through the tree-cluttered, bowlder-strewn region. Down in the valleys the roads are latticed in by the very tallest fences that are anywhere used by farmers. They are called snake-and-rider fences, and the snake part is made of from seven to eleven rails laid zigzag, one pile of bars set this way and the next pile set the other way, with at least one "rider," and sometimes two, perched on tall crossed poles above the snake-work. 

No More Talk Will Be Heard About Closing the Marquette Branch Prison.

CELEBRATED AT ST PETERS

lonia: in 1891 it was 8541.28, in 1892 \$259, in 1893 it dropped off suddenly to \$257.24 and in the fiscal year ending in 1894 it was reduced to \$292.33 or \$35 less per man than the cost of maintaining convicts at Ionia according to the last figures from that institution which Tree Mining Journal, has been able to gethold of. The showing is a most surprising one and should be a matter for great pride not only on the part of Warden Van Evera but also of the local board of control. To further emphasize the improvement the average prison population for the years noted is given, the difference not at all accounting for the change since 1892 as these figures will indicate: 1890, 44; 1891, 88; 1892, 110; 1893, 116; 1894, 120. In other words the per capita cost has been reduced over 50 per cent. Since 1892, while the prison population has increased only 10 are cert. Still more surprising Chicago where she has been for several is the fact that the net expense of the weeks arranging for her fall millinery maintainance of the prison to the state in 1894 was exactly the same as in 1890 when there were only 44 convicts as compared with 120, 85,000 less than in 1893 and 821,000 less than in both 1802 and 1890. The figures are here given: \$25,000 in 1894 and 1890; \$31,000 in 1893 and \$46,000 in 1892 and 1891.

The great saving evident has been made in many directions. For example, the per capita cost of food per day in 1892 was sixteen and two-tenths cents, in 1894 it was only nine and ninety-1862 was sixteen and two-tenths cents, in 1894 it was only nine and ninetyeight one-hundredths cents, a reduction of nearly 40 per cent. The saving in the item of fuel alone for 1894 over 1893 was \$2,633.71, effected by tearing out the plant and practically rebuilding it.

The fuel bill of the prison is now about \$3,500 per year. F. B. Spear secured the coal contract for this year and is now filling the prisons sheds.

There are now 138 convicts in the prison, nearly the capacity of the cell wing now in use which can only accommodate 156. Prisoners are beginning to put in appearance from the lower peninsula and it will soon be necessary to open the second cell wing. The pay to open the second cell wing. The pay roll of the prison is now \$1,200 per

month.

In the new and handsome work shop the first floor is used for Manhard & caucuses, giving at least five days notice of the same. The second floor is the knitting department, between fifty and sixty prisoners being employed on W. C. Brown's contract. The prison tailors and the prison shoemaker are also kept busy there. Just in the rear of the south cell wing stands a new work shop of much more modest proportions, erected recently for the snow shoe factory of Tormy Madosh, who is now engaged in turning out the fiftest patterns of Chippewa snow shoes for the state of Michigan and in tanning deer skins in every desired form. He has an assistant and keeps one or two other prisoners busy bending and shaping frames for the shoes, the work being done in the cell wing adjoining.
