Brazilian Importers Claim Free Entry to Our Ports for Their Goods Until January 1.

MANY THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS INVOLVED IN THE SUIT.

All Reciprocity Treaties Were Abrogated Without Notice by the Passage of New Tariff Law.

CLAIM VIOLATION OF TREATY. Washington, Oct. 12.—Abrogation of eciprocity between the United States and Brazil is to have a sequel in fightof duties collected on Brazalian goods covered by the reciprocity treaty from Aug. 27 last, the date the new tariff law went into effect, up to Jan. 1 next. In the aggregate these duties reach several hundred thousand dollars and may reach, into millions. The claims are not to be made by Brazil as a government but by individual importers of Brazilian goods.

These claims will involve a test of the contract provision of a treaty. Notwithstanding this provision the new tariff law abrogates all reciprocity treaties, except that with Hawaii, without notice. Efforts were made to have a provision inserted in the bill which would allow three months notice to Brazil in accordance with the treaty Brazil in accordance with the treaty but the tariff bill became so involved in but the tariff bill became so involved in conference no changes could be made. As the three months notice provided by the original arrangement was ignored it is contended that Brazilian imports have a right to enjoy the rates given by the old treaty up to January 1 next and that the duties collected in the meaning a right of the property of the content of the property of the content of the con time are illegal. For that reason pro-tests will be made on the payment of duties and claims subsequently presented to the courts.

ONE DANGER OF SHOPPING. Expert Thieres Always on the Outlook for Badly-Guarded Pocketbooks.

The fine parlors and waiting-rooms which are now to be found in the big dry goods stores have been put to a peculiar use by the pickpockets and sneak thieves that make the stores their stamping ground, says the New of the Fourteenth street stores found a pocketbook in one of the waste baskets in the ladies' parlor. When opened at the superintendent's desk it was found to contain a check for fifty dollars and a number of little trinkets. The super intendent hunted up the address of the person to whom the check was made payable and wrote to her. She came down the next day and proved her "Hardly a ownership of the property. day passes without our porters finding rifled pocketbooks in the ladies' parlor," said the superintendent of the store, "and, although we have a detective on guard a large part of the time, it seems impossible to eatch the thieves. The fact is that the really expert pickpocket and sneak thief who works the dry goods stores will take nothing except cash and valuable jewelry. He will not take the risk of detection which the ordinary thief does. Checks, trinkets and small articles of no special value the expert thief throws away

"They rarely examine their booty in the same store in which they steal it. Take the pocketbook of this woman. for instance. She was not in our store at all on the day that the pocketbook was found here. The pocketbook was taken from her at a swell store up-town. The thief evidently hastened away as soon as the theft had been ined the pocketbook, took out the cash, which, I believe, amounted to sixty or seventy dollars, and threw the rest into the waste basket. Of course. these expert thieves are women. Under their present system their operations are very successful. The ordinary thief goes around grabbing here and there, and waits until he has collared all the stealable things in sight. The chances are nine out of ten that he will be detected before he finishes. That shows the superiority of the expert crook's work. She makes no effort to steal more than one pocketbook at a time. She pays no attention to goods on the counter, because they are too bulky and not easily negotiable. Unless she is caught in the act of taking a pocketbook there is practically no chance of eatching her. Having made her grab she goes to some other store and in the exhibit that superiority by its pose and privacy of the ladies' room gets rid of any part of her seizure which might be agreeable or painful to the physical compromising. 

GAME OF THE DEVIL.

It Hails from China and Used to Be Played in Europe.
What is called the "Game of the Devil" dates back in China, where it is

called Kouen-gen, to a very remote antiquity, and has been much played in France at different epochs of modern times, especially at the beginning of

the present century. The "devil" is thrown into the air by means of a string which the player keeps taut by the skillful use of two sticks, and upon which he is to catch it. "I remember having often seen this game in the hands of one of my friends," says a contributor to a French periodical. "According to him, the game was in great favor in Belgium in his boyhood, about fifteen years ago, especially at colleges, where the young men often got up genuine matches be-tween two and even three players. The form of the devil varies a little from that of the 'Kouen-gen.' It is made of two tin cones connected by their apieces, and provided with apertures for the production of a humming sound when the devil revolves very fast. A good strong player can easily throw it to a height of more than forty


