There is a point beyond which decent party journals will not go in the treatment of political opponents. That point was passed by the Iron Herald of Negaunee in a couple of articles relating to Rush Culver which appeared in its issue for this week. If Mr. Stephenson approves of that kind of campaign work in his behalf he does not deserve the respect, not to speak of the support, of any honest voter. Mr. Culver stands in no need of defense against such charges as those made by the Negaunee sheet. The abuse of that paper will recommend him to the people where the paper and the character of its editor are known. But it might be well to remind the Iron Herald that it hasn't a J. Maurice Finn to deal with this time. It will probably be given very conclusive proof of the fact before it gets through with Mr. Culver.

This representative district, embracing the cities of Marquette and Negaunee and the townships tributary thereto, should be represented in the legislature by a man of ability and integrity. If to these qualifications experience can be added the man in whom all three are combined is the one who should be chosen. The Republican party in the district has such a candidate for the nomination in the person of Hon. George Wagner, who has already served three terms in the house, and is willing to serve a fourth if the people of the district desire his continued services in that capacity. It is THE MINING JOURNAL's conviction that no better man for the position could be named by the Republicans of the district. He has made a good member for the interests of his district, and his experience as a legislator will give him added power and influence if elected this year. Mr. Wagner is not pressing his candidacy, for he feels that he has been generously treated by his party friends, but he has announced that he will take the nomination, and make the run if it is given him, and in view of his work in the past and capacity for further usefulness THE MINING JOURNAL trusts that he will be made the nominee of the convention when it meets next Tuesday.

There is a man down at Menominee who got into the A. P. A. order without fully understanding its nature and aims. He has got out again, and makes public announcement of the fact and his reasons for withdrawing from it in this statement, published over his signature:

I hereby give notice that I am no longer a member of the A. P. A. organization. I consider it an injustice to discriminate against a man on account of his religion and I positively refuse to be bound by any A. P. A. pledges. I, with hundreds of others, joined the organization without being apprised of the real nature of the pledges before being admitted to the hall, and I for one rebel against such tactics in this free country. I have faithfully kept my pledges to this hour, not because I thought they were right and just, but because I thought it was dishonorable to take a pledge and break it. My experience has taught me that great injustice is done to our Catholic citizens by men bound by oath to discriminate against them, and I think any fair-minded man will say that an individual thus bound by oath cannot be a good citizen. I desire to be a good citizen and cannot, therefore, be an A. P. A. I am once more a free man.

OLIVER MAGNUSON. There are many members of the order in the same predicament that Mr. Magnuson was in before he finally decided to apply the knife to the tie that bound him to the detestable organization. They should do as he has done and become free men and good citizens— which they cannot be while they remain members of an order whose purpose is hatred of their fellowmen and whose purpose is religious proscription.

HON. RICHARD M. HOAR of Houghton was in Detroit this week, and to a reporter of the Detroit Journal talked as follows concerning the candidacy of Hon. Jay A. Hubbell for the junior United States senatorship and the prospect for his election:

A rumor was circulated that Judge Hubbell had withdrawn his candidacy for United States senator. It is not so; Judge Hubbell is in the field to stay. His candidacy has been fully announced in MARQUETTE MINING JOURNAL. It is only the other day that I had a conversation with Gad Smith, Mayor Kaufman and Mr. Russell of Marquette in relation to this matter. Gad Smith was inclined to favor Sam Stephenson in preference to Hubbell, if Stephenson is in the race. He is not in the race except nominally. The whole Lake Superior country will back Judge Hubbell. I had a conversation with Senator McMillan on this point on my arrival in the city. We are all in favor of McMillan for the long term and we wish Hubbell to be his colleague. There is not much necessity to tell the people of Michigan who Jay Hubbell is. If the Republican party has one man of intellect, eloquence, honesty and affability that is more conspicuous than another in its foremost and most brilliant circle of distinguished members, that man is Jay A. Hubbell. Beyond all others he was awarded national distinction during his career in congress. He held his own in debates against Democratic giants like Sunset Cox, Benjamin F. But-

ler and Samuel J. Randall. He was always the advocate of Republican principles, a vigorous, hearty and successful advocate. Nothing that could advance the interests of Michigan was ever overlooked by him. He is still the same old Jay Hubbell, as able, as willing, as alert as of yore. We think that, all things considered, the state could not have a better senator. We offer him as a man free from all antagonisms, unmixed with any clique—a pure Republican whose election would rejoice the people of Michigan. Besides we profess to have strong claims on local grounds. Our section has never faltered in its Republicanism; it has even happened that our votes alone have saved the party from defeat. Since the admission of Michigan into the union we have never had a senator and yet, on the ground of taxation alone our contributions to the state treasury have been most mighty, far beyond our per capita basis. Now when we have to offer a man whose ability and fitness are acknowledged—a man in whom every Republican takes pride—we feel that our request should receive consideration. According to the way his friends look at it Judge Hubbell will make no canvass in advance of the nominations and the election. The whole Lake Superior delegation will be for him, anyway, and we have plenty of good prospects of his election. There is not likely to be a choice on the first ballot with so many candidates in the field, and, therefore, when the selection comes to be made on grounds of merit, we expect that Hubbell will be chosen.

PHYSICAL IMPROVEMENT.

The Women of To-Day Are Growing Taller and Stronger. Gloomy prophecies of the future of the human race, owing to tight lacing, are being circulated here, says the British Medical Journal. They are evidently being repeated by popular writers, inspired from non-medical sources across the channel. We read of "the disappearance of the roots of the dorsal nerves" in eighty per cent. of Dr. Charpy's patients, and about women possessing the extra rib. We also read that wasp waists will make men and women assume the form and character of wasps. These absurdities need no refutation. Tight lacing no doubt exists to some extent in this country and produces bad results. It existed just as much, or more, thirty, sixty and one hundred years ago. Nevertheless our eyes may convince us that the race has not degenerated. Indeed, English women seem to be growing finer and taller than ever, though their mothers were widely addicted to tight lacing. In the richer classes golf, lawn tennis and the abandonment of "fine ladyism" of the bad old type account for the superior development of contemporary womanhood. The experience of hospital doctors also tends to show that the women of the poor are bigger and healthier than their mothers. As for the male youth of Great Britain, their mothers' vanity has done them little, if any, harm.

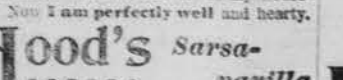

ALWAYS FULL HANDED.

There is one institution in Marquette which is an object lesson of the most valuable kind in these trying times of business depression and that is the Lake Shore Iron works.

The success of this institution, started up just as the depression struck the iron country and without any special line of machinery to manufacture for stock at such times as orders were few and far between, is a splendid testimonial to the energy and business ability of the general manager, Seymour H. Holley.

The reputation of the mammoth rock crushers built by the Lake Shore works for the mines has been established far and wide and although this was an entirely new line of machinery as far as Lake Superior mines are concerned there is hardly a day now on which work on a crusher or some part of one for one of the mines is not in progress here.

The first crusher turned out here for the Minnesota company was an experimental one and had an 18x20 inch opening. It worked so well that three more were ordered, each with an opening of 36x30 inches.

The Lake Shore Iron works have just completed the steel cell work for Marquette's new city hall and six of the heavy steel cages are already in place in the basement of the hall.

The railroad work turned out by the Lake Shore Iron works covers everything from driving wheels and cast iron locomotive smoke stacks to caboose stoves and engine fronts and orders come from roads running out of Duluth, as well as from the South Shore road, which has all of its work done here.

Among the jobs now in hand is the heavy crane of the steam shovel at the Winthrop mine, which was sent down wrecked all out of shape, but which looks as good as new now after its sojourn with Jim Gray's lively steam hammer.
