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



While its prey is still warm the poison-spitter will pull the skin and hair off in huge pieces, and then, crunching the body in its feet and then, pletely blinds it and enables the snake erunching the body in its folds, will swallow it whole. This snake will often lie in an old road or path, and has been known to completely blind almost at the same instant a pair of BARAGA. . . . . mules that were being driven along the road attached to a wagon. They can eject this poison and hit their object at a distance of thirty feet.

LIFE ON AN IRONCLAD.

Ordinary Gales Seem Like Hurricanes and Existence Is a Continual Misery. Admiral von Werner, a high authori ty in naval matters in Germany, de scribes in a work recently published the behavior of armor-plated men-ofwar in a heavy sea. He says: "Even a moderate gale and sea an armor-plated cruiser, if going against the wind, will find herself in conditions similar to those of a storm-at least the crew will have that impression. The movements of the stern of

the ship are violent and exceedingly disagreeable. The waves pushed by the advancing prow sweep continually over the ship from bow to stern. All windows and portholes must be closed, and air reaches the lower decks, where the heat increases unbearably, only through the artificial ventilators. the exception of the specially protected command bridge, all the uncovered portions of the ship are impassable; thus the whole crew must bear as well as they can the hell of the closed decks. On such a ship no one can feel comfortable; and when there is a storm in which a sailing ship would feel com-paratively at ease, the crew of an armor-plated ship imagines itself to be in a heavy hurricane which threatens destruction at every minute. The long, narrow forepart of the ship, which is not borne lightly by the water, and is rendered extremely heavy by the mighty ram and the armored deck and the cannon and torpedoes, forces the ship in a high sea to pitchings and rollings of such an extraordinary kind that they cannot be described. crew of such a ship is not only exposed to mortal dangers, but in the vovages they make render them extremely and dangerously nervous; the mental impressions they receive wear them out and make the profession hateful."



#### TRAPPING MUSKRATS

EAU CLAIRE, Wis., Oct. 30.—Under A Thriving Industry in Some Parts of New

There are a number of men in Cape "ratters." They don't catch the common house rodents, but all through the long winter months they are busily engaged in trapping and spearing muskrats.

Last winter over five thousand musk rats were caught by "ratters" in and Dennisville is a morning an unknown man entered Fred little town right in the heart of the ware bay. Rat catching is one of the principal industries of the village, and the men who earn their living at it are a nondescript, happy, easy-going lot of fellows

In the marshy meadow land adjacent to the town large numbers of muskrats make their homes. In winter their skins are highly prized for their fur. The methods of catching the rats are numerous, but the most common is by the use of the spear, and to make a success at ratting one must throw with a gale. It is then that the "ratter," with his five-pronged spear over his shoulder and a bag under his arm, starts out for the meadows.

The muskrat builds a house of considerable size, of sedge grass, near a stream or pond. Getting to the lea-ward of the houses, the spearsman quietly approaches, and when alongside of the grass domes, inside of which the rats lie huddled together like litters of young puppies, he raises his spear, and, bringing it through the roof of grass, impales from four to six muskrats on the prongs.

Hickman is the acknowledged champion "ratter" of South Jersey, and when ratting is good he has been known to kill as many as three thousand rats in a winter. He has had the good fortune to kill several Albinos in his years of ratting, and he always received a big price for them. Muskrat skins are worth from fifteen to twenty dollars per hundred, but during the war the furs were worth twenty-five and thirty dollars per hundred. Some of the ratters make five hundred and six hundred dollars in a winter's work. -Philadelphia Times.

FORMATION OF HAIL.

The Agency of Electricity in Making the Icy Pellets.

The formation of hail through electrical action, according to the new theory of Sig. Marangoni, is a very interesting, and even wonderful, process. The wind draws out a cloud into a long, narrow strip. In that form, owing to the great amount of surface exposed to the air, the cloud evaporates very rapidly, and rapid evaporation produce intense cold.

Dry particles of snow are then formed, and these, by friction with the water drops, quickly become charged with negative electricity. But the water-drops themselves carry positive electricity, and since negative attracts positive, a film of water is formed upon each snow particle and is instantly frozen into a layer of ice.

At this thickness its outer surface re-

mains moist, the water not freezing so rapidly there, whereupon the electrical charge changes from negative to positive, and the particle is repelled by the water-drops and driven to parts of the cloud. Here the increased cold covers it with snow again, and I was about to enter a protest, but friction charges it anew with negative

Repulsion is now once more changed for attraction, and the particle rushes back into the cloud, receiving upon its surface another film of water, which is
