SENATOR PEPPER says the Populists will rally on silver for the great battle of 1896. What's the matter with woman suffrage? Can it be that the Pops are going to abandon that fad because the women of Denver went back on Governor Waite and Populism in the late election?

AN EXCHANGE says that the logical policy of the Republican party is to work for the restoration of the McKinley tariff law. The party should remember the luck it had with that law in previous campaigns. Its "logical" policy is to make good use of its power, and it will duplicate the folly of the Democrats if it undertakes to restore a tariff schedule that was condemned by the people at the polls twice in succession.

THERE is something suspicious about the intense admiration of the Negaunee Iron Herald's editor for Sam Stephenson lately. He didn't feel that way toward Sam when the publication of the tax list for this county was given to The Iron Ore of Ishpeming, on the recommendation of Mr. Stephenson. Has Griffey forgotten the emphatic way he spoke of "Our Sam" when the Ishpeming paper gathered in that juicy plum a little over a year ago? If he has there are others who have not.

NOTWITHSTANDING the depth of the snowfall in this peninsula during the rigid season, the Copper Country News favors having one of the two United States senators chosen from this part of the state, but is much troubled to decide whether it should be Judge Hubbell or Sam Stephenson. Something always bothers The News, but it is pleasing to note that it is willing to admit that the deep snow up here doesn't debar us from trying to get a senator. Perhaps its fruitless endeavor to get the new insane asylum located in the lower peninsula may have had an educational influence on that sheet.

LITTLE JUDKINS, who publishes a weekly almanac at Houghton, and who never had an opinion of his own or the courage to avow it in the course of his useless existence, is much concerned about the policy of THE MINING JOURNAL. The little chap's solicitude is not reciprocated. It is of no consequence to this paper, or the public at large, what his views are on any subject. He couldn't understand the policy of a fearless newspaper if he tried and should not risk his sanity by attempting such a thing. The preparation of chewed-over editorials is the highest mental effort of which Little Judkins is capable.

GRIFFEY, of The Iron Herald, ties himself up in a knot in the endeavor to break the force of Mr. Johns' reply to his untruthful charge, that the Prohibition vote in the first assembly district of this county was manipulated in the interest of the Democratic candidate for representative in the state legislature. There was no ground for his charge further than the fact that some Prohibitionists in Negaunee voted for Mr. Hoch. But Griffey is accustomed to making charges without being sure of their truth. He may get over it in time, but it will require a little corrective experience to break him of the evil habit. His lies don't hurt much, however, for nobody takes any stock in his campaign roortakes. Still, he ought to quit lying when the fight is ended and his mendacity can accomplish nothing, even for his party. It is a pity to waste such a talent in that direction as he possesses to no purpose.

THE Democrats are making a great fuss over Senator Sherman's statement that he would not favor any great increase in duties, and wanted only such duties as would insure a fair rate of wages for the workmen of the country. There is nothing in this different from the true Republican's position on the tariff. Exactly that doctrine of protection is set forth in the Minneapolis platform, which a majority of the people of this country have just very emphatically indorsed at the polls.—Minneapolis Journal.

But which Senator Sherman has repudiated by denying the authenticity of that same interview and disavowing the statements regarding the tariff which it attributed to him. Of course whatever position Senator Sherman takes is the true Republican position on any public question, but the organs should wait to ascertain what his views really are before declaring unreservedly for what some newspaper may assert them to be.

WE NOTE that some of the papers which felt so good over the "landslide" are inclined to be dubious about a quick return of the country's prosperity. They should not have any doubts on that point. The Democracy has been laid out cold and its free trade program

can no longer affright the people. With the exception of the tariff law which was repealed by the Democratic congress, all the laws on the statute books materially affecting the country's business interests are of Republican origin, and even the tariff law that takes the place of the one repealed is a fairly good protection measure—so much so, in fact, that the free trade element of the Democratic party is intensely disgusted with it. Good times are coming, and with a rush—there can't be any doubt about it, for all the essential conditions to their return have been fulfilled unless the ante-election statements of the papers that have suddenly become skeptical on that point were misleading. If we can't have prosperity now how big a majority would it be necessary for the Republicans to have in the country a large and in congress to fetch 'em?

A WALL STREET VIEW OF IT. A Wall street organ opines that "as to legislation on banking and currency matters, the recent election assures progress in the direction of sound banking and honest money. Cheap money theorists have been overthrown in all directions," it declares, "and the country can view the future with greater complacency than it has been able to do for two years past."

The "honest money" cry has fooled the people for years, but they are not in a mood to be humbugged by it much longer. Wall street favors a financial system that enables the holders of large accumulations of money to juggle with the nation's business interests as they please, producing panics when they will and allowing the country to be prosperous for intervals when that suits their selfish purposes. But that is not what the people want. The masses need and should have protection from these sharks, and it can only come through a system of finance that will take from the money-lenders the power they now possess through its quick responsiveness to the demands of business, regardless of the manipulations of the magnates of Wall street.

What the country needs today more than anything else is "cheap money"—not money that is cheap by reason of any doubt of its value, but cheap in the sense of being available for use at a rate of interest that those who are engaged in trade and industrial enterprises can afford to pay. A dollar that will pay debts and buy what its possessor desires to purchase on a fair basis of exchange is "honest" enough for anybody. Is it necessary that our "dollar" shall be only obtainable at a rate of interest that ruins the borrower to be "honest" enough for the money lenders?

The dollar of today is a dishonest dollar for the great mass of the American people, for they have to pay too much for it in labor, too much for it in interest if they borrow it, too much for it in property if they desire to realize on anything they own to meet pressing necessities. It is dishonest in its effect on the wage-earner, for it is too difficult to obtain in exchange for labor, on the business man because he has to pay too high a price for its use, and on the people generally by reason of the impairing effect its inherent dishonesty has on the prosperity of the nation.

Is the dollar which enables the banker to get two dollars worth of your property or labor in interest when you have to borrow it from him an "honest" dollar? Assuredly not. The honest dollar is the dollar that performs its legitimate functions impartially, giving no undue advantage to either the lender or borrower. That is the dollar the people want, the dollar they have not been given by either the Democrats or Republicans, but the dollar they are bound to have before they cease their agitation for it. It is the dollar the Republican party will give them if it has the wisdom to perceive its opportunity and the honesty to make proper use of it, and if it fails them in this particular that party's great victory in the elections of this year will give it no enduring advantage, for it will thus show itself as incapable of meeting the wishes of the people as the party which has just been overthrown has done during its brief control of both the legislative and executive branches of the government.

There are a multitude of voters in this country who are but lightly bound by the ties of party in these days. They care very little what party may be in power, but they care greatly for the good of the nation and of the welfare of the masses of its people. That class of voters turned on the Democratic party in the late elections and shattered it because it had failed to give the masses the relief they demanded from the oppressive exactions of the money owners and money lenders. They will keep a close watch on the party restored to control of congress by their votes in the elections just held, and if it disappoints them they will treat it as they did the Democracy on election day this year. They have the power to tear down where they have built up, and they cannot be deluded or misled by meaningless platitudes about an "honest dollar" into sustaining any party that ignores their demands and legislates against their interests.

No. 7 arrives at West Superior 9:20 a. m. Duluth 9:30 a. m. and makes close connections with morning train of the C. St. P. & N. W. for St. Paul, Minneapolis and all points west.

Trains 1 and 2 have Drawing Room Buffet Dining Cars between Houghton and Mackinaw City and Wagner Buffet Sleeping Cars between Mackinaw City and Detroit.

Trains 7 and 8 have Wagner Buffet Sleeping Cars between Sault Ste. Marie and Duluth.

WINTER TIME CARD.

It Will Go Into Effect on the South Shore Road Tomorrow.

LITTLE CHANGE IN TIME OF PASSENGER TRAINS.

New Train by Daylight to Ewen and Back-Shop Force is Cut Down.

SUMMARY OF SCHEDULE.

The winter time card for the South Shore line goes into effect tomorrow. The changes in times of passenger trains are not great, but better connections are made and more convenient access to certain portions of the peninsula afforded. The trains for Detroit and lower Michigan, for Chicago and Wisconsin points, for Duluth and the west and Sault Ste. Marie and the east through Canada are unchanged. A short train is put on between Sault Ste. Marie and Soo Junction to connect with the train to and from Detroit, so that passengers can now get in and out of Sault Ste. Marie on the day train as well as at night. A new train is also put on from Nestoria to Ewen, connecting with the morning train out of this city. There are slight changes made in local trains. Following is a list of all the trains leaving this city in either direction, with their times of departure:

 Train No. 1, daily from Detroit and for Chicago and the copper country: Arrive, 2:45 p. m.; leave, 3:05 p. m. (unchanged).

 Train No. 8, daily except Sunday, for Houghton and the copper country and Ewen and intermediate points: Leave, 8:55 a. m.; arrive at Houghton, 1:25 p. m.; Red Jacket, 2:40 p. m.; at Lake Linden, 2:50 p. m.; at Ewen, 1:35 p. m.
 Train No. 11, for Republic and intermediate points: Leave (week days), 12:05 p. m.; leave (Sundays), 6:05 p. m.

GOING EAST.
 Train No. 2, daily, from the copper country and for Detroit: Arrive, 1:15 p. m.; leave, 1:30 p. m. (unchanged).
 Train No. 3, daily, from Duluth and for Sault Ste. Marie and east: Arrive, 4:30 a. m.; leave, 4:45 a. m. (unchanged).
 Train No. 4, daily except Sunday, from the copper country, Ewen and intermediate points: Arrive, 6:45 p. m. (unchanged).
 Train No. 10, from Chicago via Republic: Arrive, 10:55 a. m.

The most important change, as already indicated, is the day train for Ewen. Heretofore persons having business anywhere west of Nestoria had either to take the Duluth express at 4:45 a. m. or No. 1 at 3:05 p. m., the latter connecting at Nestoria with a mixed train which ran as far west as Ewen and then tied up over night. The connection for Ontonagon was very bad, involving several hours wait at Sidnaw. Now one can take the train out of here at 8:55 a. m., reach Ewen at 1:35 p. m., and on the return leave Ewen at 1:50 p. m. and reach here at 6:05 p. m. This train also makes a good connection at Sidnaw for Ontonagon.

Reducing the Force.
 Orders were received yesterday to stop all new work on the South Shore railroad shops and to lay off all men not needed for running repairs. The car shop had just completed the first, or trial, car of a lot of twenty-five flats and expected soon to start on some logging cars of new and improved pattern. The force has been cut down about one-half, but the local officials do not believe the reduction can last long, as the road must have cars to do its business and its present supply is rather too small than too large for its winter's work.

From the peculiar character of its chief traffic the South Shore must have many more wheels in service than a road doing a general business through an agricultural country. In summer it runs thousands of ore cars which must lie idle in winter and last season borrowed ore cars, wherever it could. With the close of navigation it calls home its box cars, many of which must lie idle in summer or be lent to other roads. The rapid growth of the lumber industry along its line has made a demand for log cars and it is the undiminished increase of this sort of the traffic, coupled with the fact that its supply of that sort of cars is rather scant, that gives hope that the reduction of force in the shops here will not be of long continuance.

The reduction of train crews in consequence of the close of navigation, which has been going on for some weeks, has nearly or quite reached its end. This reduction is of course the regular thing at this season and it is reckoned upon by all interested. But it was hoped that business would justify the retention of the full shop force this winter. And as said before the necessity of a certain amount of new equipment and of repairing the old for next summer's ore traffic gives promise that the shop reduction will not last long.
